A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BEACH MANAGEMENT FOR THE NORTH SHORE OF OAHU.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The legislature finds that the northwest-facing 1 SECTION 1. shoreline on the north shore of Oahu, stretching from the 2 Kawailoa to Waiale'e ahupua'a is a spectacular coastline of 3 primary importance to state residents and visitors from around 4 the world for its beautiful sandy beaches, famous surf breaks, 5 recreational opportunities, marine resources and wildlife, and 6 Several important north shore beaches are at increasing 7 vistas. risk of erosion and deterioration from a combination of high 8 energy waves, winter surf, tsunami events, sea level rise and 9 climate change, coastal erosion, and intensive use by people 10 accessing the shoreline. Estimates indicate that nearly half of 11 all visitors to Oahu visit the north shore during their stay. 12 Most of the shoreline beach parks and coastal access areas along 13 the north shore have infrastructure that is inadequate to handle 14 the high number of residents and the millions of visitors who 15 are attracted to these beaches each year, causing additional 16 erosion and damage to natural resources. 17



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Recently, homes in the Ke Nui road area on the north shore 1 have been damaged and are still at risk from high surf and 2 eroding beaches which cause significant disruption and call for 3 both immediate and long-term government action for beachside 4 In addition, some key sections of Kamehameha 5 homeowners. highway, including sections along Laniakea beach and Chun's 6 reef, are currently subject to erosion due to high surf, storm 7 events, and loss of sand. The Pupukea marine life conservation 8 district, which stretches from Waimea bay to Shark's cove, is 9 experiencing high levels of shoreline erosion due to poor 10 management, severely eroded walkways due to lack of 11 infrastructure and planning, and parking lot and road collapse 12 due to sink holes and over-use. Other areas along the coastline 13 are also at risk from the lack of overall planning for 14 protection of the beaches, beach access areas, and shoreline 15 uses. Since Hawaii's beaches and coastline are part of the 16 public trust, held by the State for the benefit of the people, 17 the State has a fiduciary duty to affirmatively protect beaches 18 and coastal access. 19

20 The legislature finds that long-term protection of the21 northwest-facing north shore beaches from the Kawailoa to





Waiale'e ahupua'a, which are subject to a common wave regime and 1 share common beach erosion characteristics, requires a 2 comprehensive assessment and modern management plan that 3 recognizes the risks of climate change and sea level rise. The 4 large number of government, business, private, and community 5 entities involved in the north shore would benefit from 6 participating in the development and implementation of a 7 comprehensive beach management plan for this vulnerable area. 8

In 2010, the University of Hawaii sea grant college program 9 successfully produced a beach and dune management plan for 10 Kailua beach, which provided an extensive analysis of the 11 current state of this important beach and recommended management 12 measures for federal, state, and local government, as well as 13 community partners, in response to threats such as climate 14 change and sea level rise. This study serves as a useful 15 prototype for the implementation of beach management plans at 16 other locations and demonstrates the effectiveness of location-17 specific beach management policies and practices, which will 18 greatly benefit the north shore. The north shore's northwest-19 facing coastline is more than five times longer than the 2.6 20



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mile stretch of Kailua beach surveyed and will require greater 1 funding and resources to accomplish such comprehensive planning. 2 The purpose of this Act is to provide funds for the 3 University of Hawaii sea grant college program to create, with 4 substantial community input, a north shore beach management plan 5 covering the area from the Kawailoa to Waiale'e ahupua'a. 6 SECTION 2. (a) The University of Hawaii sea grant college 7 program shall create a north shore beach management plan for the 8 area of the north shore of Oahu that stretches from the Kawailoa 9 to Waiale'e ahupua'a. The beach management plan shall be 10 completed before the end of calendar year 2018. The University 11 of Hawaii sea grant college program shall ensure the inclusion 12 of substantial community input in developing the plan. The plan 13 shall consider innovative means to address erosion of private 14 property, including recommendations to set homes and vehicular 15 traffic back from the beach, and to address recreational access, 16 vistas, and traffic issues relating to the receding coastline. 17 The plan under subsection (a) shall also include 18 (b) consideration of: 19

18	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general	
19	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much	
20	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for the	
21	Universit	y of Hawaii sea grant college program to create a



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comprehensive north shore beach management plan for the north
shore of Oahu stretching from the Kawailoa to Waiale'e ahupua'a
pursuant to this Act.
The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.

6 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2016.
