<u>HB 2460</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT. Establishes a State Law Enforcement Training Academy within the Department of Public Safety to train all candidates for law enforcement positions in the State. Appropriates funds.	PBS, JUD, FIN
<u>HB 2099</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO LAW ENFORCEMENT. Defines "person in custody" as used in the offense of sexual assault in the second degree and third degree to mean a person who is stopped by or under the control of a law enforcement officer for official purposes. Effective 01/01/2017.	PBS, JUD
<u>HB 2102</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO TRAINING. Requires police commissions to establish and police officers to complete training programs on cultural competency and implicit bias and racial and ethnic sensitivity. Requires DPS to establish and public safety officers to complete training programs on cultural competency and implicit bias and racial and ethnic sensitivity.	PBS, JUD
<u>HB 2629</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS. Authorizes county police departments to enroll firearms applicants into a criminal record monitoring service used to alert police when an owner of a firearm is arrested for a criminal offense anywhere in the country. <u>HB 2385</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO COURT ORDERS TO PROVIDE MEDICAL TREATMENT IN CORRECTIONAL FACILITIES. Allows for a declaration to be filed with the petition as an alternative to an affidavit; expands the court's ability to continue the hearing on the petition for good cause; gives the court more flexibility in deciding when a guardian ad litem is necessary; changes the time requirement for filing for a court order for medical treatment from a period of within two days of an examination of the person to within five days; redefines the persons who must be notified of the petition; clarifies the effective expiration date of the order for persons who return to custody after release; and provides the ability for the department to seek an extension of an order to treat if necessary. <u>HB 2387</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY. Includes misdemeanor offenses under chapter 134 (Firearms, Ammunition and Dangerous Weapons), Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the offenses that disqualify parolees from the provisions of Act 139, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012.	PBS, JUD
<u>HB 2389</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE FEDERAL REIMBURSEMENT MAXIMIZATION SPECIAL FUND. Allows the use of the Federal Reimbursement Maximization Special Fund for corrections workforce recruitment and retention.	PBS, FIN
<u>HB 2391</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO THE RELEASE OF CERTAIN MISDEMEANANTS. Defines the circumstance for the Director of Public Safety to release pre-trial and sentenced misdemeanants at community correctional centers.	PBS, JUD
<u>HCR 31</u> <u>Status</u>	REQUESTING HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO ASSIST THE STATE IN NEGOTIATING WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE ACQUISITION OF THE FEDERAL DETENTION CENTER, HONOLULU.	PBS, FIN
<u>HR 8</u> <u>Status</u>	REQUESTING HAWAII'S CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION TO ASSIST THE STATE IN NEGOTIATING WITH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE ACQUISITION OF THE FEDERAL DETENTION CENTER, HONOLULU.	PBS, FIN

DECISION MAKING TO FOLLOW

- The date and time of the hearing; and

PAPER: 8 copies (including an original) to Room 422 in the State Capitol;



Testimony submitted will be placed on the legislative website. This public posting of testimony on the website should be considered when including personal information in your testimony. **Those wishing to provide oral testimony will be limited to three minutes.**
