House Bill 2179 appropriates funds for the administration and operation of the Aha Moku Advisory Committee and for community outreach. **The Aha Moku Advisory Committee (AMAC) supports this measure.** Currently, funding for AMAC will be exhausted by the end of June, 2016.

The Aha Moku System encompasses the eight main Hawaiian Islands and supports the traditional and generational knowledge of the people who are connected to each of the 46 moku and 606 ahupua'a. The system was brought forward by John Kaimikaua, a noted Moloka'i historian through translations of ancient oral chants from the 9th century, a time where sustainability and protection of resources ensured existence. It was a time where the focus of the people of the land was on survival. Those resource practices were handed down through the generations and many are still used today. The Aha Moku today is centered around sharing that knowledge with those who are now part of ahupua'a communities – the focus is on natural and cultural resource sustainability that is site-specific. Communities take care of their resources where they live.

The purpose of the Aha Moku is to bring forth the voices – concerns and recommendations for solutions – from the people of an ahupua'a on natural and cultural resources to the attention of the Department of Land and Natural Resources. The perspective is a Native Hawaiian traditional one that shares generational knowledge of methods handed down practitioner to practitioner of ways to protect, preserve and sustain the land, ocean, watershed and every natural resource within a site-specific ahupua'a.

On behalf of ahupua'a communities, the Aha Moku advises the Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources (BLNR) on issues pertaining to natural resources. But more than advising the Land Board, Aha Moku has been able to bring ahupua'a voices to the attention of the divisions of DLNR who then communicate directly with the communities. This continues to progress and is on-going successfully as reflected in the Legislative Report submitted each year. (Attached)

However, the challenges facing the Aha Moku continue to be daunting due to the instability of funding. When the Legislature created the Aha Moku in 2007, appropriations were directed to come from general funds.

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However, funds were never released and though each appropriation request was supported unanimously by legislative committees each year, at the end of session, the finance committees in the Senate and House gave instructions to take the appropriations out of general funds and place them in trust funds, without specifying which Trust would administer the funds. The assumption was that OHA would carry the Aha Moku. But OHA was never meant to perpetually fund the Aha Moku. Aha Moku is open to the public trust. OHA deals only with the Native Hawaiian population, yet they helped to kick-start the Aha Moku when the funds were not released by the legislature by funding it the first year in 2013. They continued to fund twice more until 2015. OHA is no longer able to help with funding.

The Aha Moku is in the process of community outreach educational efforts on the benefits of the Aha Moku System in its relationship with DLNR, OHA and many other non-governmental agencies, Native Hawaiian Organizations, groups and communities. It is continuing in the organization of ahupua'a communities so people can better understand the protection methods of sustaining the resources in their communities, neighborhoods and where they live. Everyone who lives in Hawaii is a Stakeholder in the fortification of our lands and oceans. Aha Moku is a strong partner in safeguarding our assets and ensures that this protection continues on with the next generation and the dignity of future generations to come. However, we need kokua! We need the funding and support of the Legislature to ensure that our work with DLNR continues – the work that has benefitted all who live in Hawaii.

We humbly ask that House Bill 2179 be passed by the House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources, and Hawaiian Affairs.

House Bill 2179 appropriates funds for the administration and operation of the aha moku advisory committee and for community outreach. **I strongly support this measure.**

I have been part of the Aha Moku process since its beginning in 2004. I and almost 200 other native Hawaiian resource practitioners from all eight of the main Hawaiian Islands, who have seen the degradation of our lands, oceans, watersheds and forest areas continue to be destroyed, altered and many forever lost to future generations because of the often well-meaning, but ineffective laws and policies that regulated our lands.

We worked hard, often against tremendous odds and hardships to put aside our island territorial differences to focus on the protection and sustainability of our lands. We needed to find a way so that our grandchildren would have clean strong lands and oceans – like we do, like our grandparents did. This is a legacy we all need to pass on. Since 2004, we have persevered. We have gathered our families and communities and found the way to work with the state to protect our environments. The Legislature strongly supported our grass roots efforts and we were able to restore a traditional resource system that brought our people together with the greater public trust communities in a way that we can all benefit from. However, although the Legislature strongly and unanimously support the aha moku every year since 2006 when the first Act that created the Aha Moku was passed; and, even though funds were appropriated every year for its operation, NO funding was ever released! And, even though we have proven that we work well with DLNR, to whom we are attached, that was still not enough – NO funding was ever released!

Now, we beg this committee to support this measure. If the legislature does not help us this time, and fund the aha moku, our office will be shut down by June 30, 2016. Please pass this measure in this committee. Mahalo nui loa.

House Bill 2179 proposes to appropriate funds for the administration and operation of the Aha Moku Advisory Committee and for community outreach. **The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports House Bill 2179 provided that its passage does not adversely impact priorities indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget request.**

The Department notes that included in the Executive Supplemental Budget request is \$126,514 (\$39,000 in general funds and \$87,514 in trust funds) for the Aha Moku Advisory Committee, to fund an executive director, travel and community outreach. House Bill 2179 whereas provides a total of \$500,000 in general funds for the Aha Moku Advisory Committee.

The Department also notes that a similar measure, Senate Bill 2161 has been amended in the Senate by adding community outreach as a permissible use of the appropriated funds in SECTION 2 and removing the appropriation in SECTION 3 for community outreach. The Department supports these amendments
