HOUSE BILL 2558
RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT

House Bill 2558 proposes to require state agencies to participate in a carbon offset program to offset carbon emissions caused by their employees' air travel and would require the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) to establish and administer this program. **The Department supports this measure and provides the following comments.**

Native forest ecosystems, as well as plantations aimed at revenue generation are an integral part of Hawaiian cultural practices; benefit recreational activities, such as hiking and hunting; provide open space and aesthetic beauty; provide invaluable lessons for environmental education; and can provide sustainable income from various forest resources.

The Department recognizes that state employees' air travel produces significant carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gas emissions that lead to adverse global climate effects. Afforestation and reforestation projects involving tree planting endemic, native or non-native trees can sequester substantial amounts of carbon dioxide, as well as provide a variety of ecological, cultural, recreational, educational, and economic functions.

The Department notes that establishing and administering a carbon offset program, as described in this bill, would require a considerable amount of personnel time and initial costs. However, over time fees paid to the Department from respective state employee cost offsets should cover the costs to maintain the program (staffing), and serve as a potential revenue stream to accelerate the amount of trees planted and cared for by afforestation or reforestation projects led by the Department. The Department suggests integrating the compensation of these costs when determining the cost of the offset.
