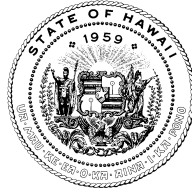
Chair Luke, Vice Chair Nishimoto, and Members of the House Committee on Finance:

I am Major General Arthur J. Logan, State Adjutant General and the Director of the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency. I am testifying in support of House Bill 2755 HD1.

The increasing potential for security breaches and cyber-attacks threaten the executive branch's information and communications networks. The development of incident response plans will guide the state departments and agencies to mitigate and recover from cyber-attacks.

The changes reflected in House Draft 1 are consistent with the duties of the State's Chief Information Officer and the State's cyber security, economic, education, and infrastructure security coordinator as outlined in the Hawaii Revised Statutes.

HOUSE BILL NO. 2755, H.D. 1
RELATING TO INCIDENT RESPONSE

Chair Luke, Vice Chair Nishimoto, and Committee Members:

I am Todd Nacapuy, Chief Information Officer (CIO) of the State of Hawai'i, testifying in **support** of House Bill No. 2755, H.D. 1., which requires the CIO to develop and maintain an incident response plan to cyber attacks for each Executive Branch department and sets out the scope of an incident response plan.

The new language in H.R.S. Section 27-43.5 proposed by H.B. No. 2755, H.D. 1., is but one of several key requests pending in this Legislature that will significantly improve the cyber security of State government.

Proposals in other measures include: 1) additional language to Section 27-43 proposed by H.B. 2278, H.D. 1, to improve information technology governance and security, as requested by the Legislature in Act 119, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2015; and 2) skilled positions requested in the Executive Budget to carry out provisions of this statute and to perform the cyber security function beyond normal working hours, since cyber security is a 24/7/365 effort.

In addition to supporting this bill, we respectfully request that this committee consider proposals in other bills that collectively are critical to building the Office of Enterprise Technology Services' cyber security program, which protects all three branches of government that today share a common access point to the Internet where most cyber threats originate.
