TESTIMONY ON SENATE BILL NO. 1217 - RELATING TO INSURANCE.

TO THE HONORABLE ROSALYN H. BAKER, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Gordon Ito, State Insurance Commissioner ("Commissioner"), testifying on behalf of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs ("Department"). The Department takes no position on the bill, and submits the following comments on this bill.

The purpose of this bill is to prohibit insurers from discriminating against any health care provider who is acting within the scope of that provider's license or certification.

Section 2706 of the federal Public Health Service Act, as added by section 1201 of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, prohibits such discrimination. Pursuant to section 431:2-201.5 (conformity to federal law), Hawaii Revised Statutes, these provisions already apply to Title 24 (insurance).

We thank this Committee for the opportunity to present testimony on this matter.

The Hawaii Society of Naturopathic Physicians would like to express their support for SB 1217. This bill would make Hawaii state law consistent with federal law1 and eliminate health plan discrimination against whole classes of health care providers. Passage of SB 1217 would improve access to care for Hawaii's people, increase options for patients, and improve health outcomes.

In Hawaii, health plans and insurance companies limit types of health care providers allowed to provide services to their members, excluding several non-MD licensed providers. Exclusion of provider types who are licensed as primary care providers (PCPs) to provide the Essential Health Benefits (EHBs) outlined in the Affordable Care Act (ACA) is in direct conflict with the nondiscrimination section of the ACA (Section 2706).

Beyond the matter of compliance with the federal law, evidence shows that including specific non-MD health care providers, such as licensed naturopathic physicians (NDs), can reduce costs, improve health outcomes, and increase access to care.2 Unfortunately, traditional contracting arrangements in Hawaii exclude naturopathic physicians from their health plans requiring patients to pay out of pocket for their primary care needs when they choose to see a naturopathic physician as their primary care provider. Naturopathic physicians are almost exclusively denied in-network status with health insurance companies in Hawaii, and patients are often denied out-of-network reimbursement for primary care services provided by naturopathic doctors, despite the fact that the services being provided by NDs are identical to PCP services performed by MD or DO providers.

Naturopathic physicians (NDs) are primary care physicians that practice integrative healthcare. NDs attend accredited four-year medical schools and are trained in the same biomedical sciences as MDs, with a focus on prevention through lifestyle modification and natural treatments. Naturopathic medicine is a comprehensive system of health care that combines conventional medical diagnostics with safe and effective natural treatments. In addition to preventing disease and decreasing health care costs, studies show that naturopathic physicians have excellent outcomes with chronic diseases such as diabetes, obesity and hypertension – three of the most costly chronic conditions effecting the population of Hawaii today.3,4



As growing demand for health care services adds stress to an already overburdened health care system, efficient utilization of all health care professions trained to provide essential health benefits is necessary to ensure affordable access to care. As the economic impact of preventable chronic disease continues to grow and tax our health care system, prevention should be at the forefront of modern medicine. It is time to focus on modifiable health risk behaviors that can be prevented and treated using therapies in which

NDs specialize, including lifestyle, diet, and nutritional counseling, exercise and stress management.

For these reasons, the HSNP supports SB 1217 and requests that your committee vote in favor of the measure.

Dear Chair Baker, Vice Chair Taniguchi and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on SB 1217 which seeks to establish statutory insurance recoupment timeframes. HMSA offers comments on and an amendment to this measure.

Network-based managed care plans are essential for an efficient health care system. To that end, it is imperative for plans to have a provider network of the highest quality with providers who can readily meet the standards of our pay-for-quality program. And, providers who appreciate the value of our patient-centered medical home model of health care delivery.

We are concerned that this Bill may impede quality management of our provider network. We may find it necessary to review every provider claim, rather than select providers whose patterns do not require close scrutiny. This would result in additional administrative cost to the system.

That said, should the Committee wish to pass this measure, we would suggest an amendment to appropriate sections of Section 2 of HB 1217 as follows:

(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), this section shall not be construed to require that a mutual benefit society contract with any health care provider [willing to abide by] who meets the terms and conditions for participation established by the mutual benefit society.

We believe this amendment may help alleviate some of the concerns we raised.

Comments: I am a HUGE supporter of alternative medicine and naturopathy. It is the first line of prevention and treatment if not the ONLY prevention and treatment our entire family seeks when in need of medical care even though I have to pay out of pocket for every visit because we are on Quest. I refer at least 2 people every day with or without insurance coverage to naturopathic physicians every day within my own practice. Please help keep and make it even more accessible to everyone. thank you!

My name is Michael Traub ND. I am a naturopathic physician practicing for the past 30 years in Kailua Kona. I am a past president of the American Association of Naturopathic Physicians (AANP). I am a member of the AANP's Committee on Section 2706, and cochair of the Nondiscrimination Committee of the Integrative Healthcare Policy Consortium (IHPC). IHPC is a national coalition incorporated in 2003 comprised of 2 dozen organizations and institutions ("Partners for Health") representing more than 420,000 licensed, and state and nationally certified healthcare professionals. Our mission is to advocate for an integrative healthcare system with equal access to the full range of health-oriented, person-centered, regulated healthcare professionals.

I have been working towards a federal law prohibiting discrimination against licensed healthcare providers for the past 15 years. I was involved in lobbying for the nondiscrimination provision (Section 2706) to be included in the Affordable Care Act, and I have remained very active in both national and state efforts to have this law implemented as intended by Congress. As a result, I have been recognized as an authority on the subject.

Even before Section 2706 became effective on January 1, 2014, there have been problems with it being misinterpreted by federal agencies, leading to very spotty implementation and compliance on the part of insurers. In Hawaii, HMSA, Kaiser, UHA and HMAA have all failed to implement the law as it was intended. That is why SB1217 is needed. Similar legislation has been introduced in California and New Mexico.

I would urge you to vote in favor of SB1217 and to establish legislative enforcement of Section 2706 that is consistent with Congressional intent.

Background

Discriminatory practices, in terms of both access and reimbursement, are a commonplace battle for non-MD healthcare providers and the patients they serve. Examples include whole categories of providers being reimbursed at different rates than other providers for the same covered service, insurers applying caps on covered services based solely on licensure, denying specific forms of care otherwise covered under a plan on the basis that it was provided by a particular provider type, and being categorically excluded from participation in a network's plan.

Assessment

The ACA provides for "dual" enforcement authority by the federal government and state authorities for Section 2706. Health and Human Services has been reluctant to press this issue with states: therefore it has been largely left up to states to pass legislation or rules to enforce 2706. Some type of enforcement is essential for this bill to be effective.

Action needed

I would ask that you consider the following as possible amendments to SB1217:

- Apply Section 2706 to all group or individual plans, third-party administrators that manage benefits for self-insured plans, workers' compensation, auto insurance carriers, and all Hawaii health care programs
- Require that co-payments, deductible structures, conversion factors, and covered essential health benefits apply equally to all covered providers, and are not to differ based solely on profession
- Prohibit the unequal application of fee structures, reimbursement rates, network adequacy and approval processes based solely on provider type
- Stipulate that the expense of any care service delivered by a licensed provider and paid for by a policy-holder shall be applied to the deductible, empowering consumers to control their healthcare spending prior to the point plans assume risk
- Require denials of care to have a transparent rationale, applied uniformly across provider types, clearly articulating authorization on determinations, criteria, and the insured's right to appeal
- Bring all other Hawaii health care laws relative to provider non-discrimination into conformity with the ACA
- Enforce non-discrimination language, with noncompliance resulting in suspension of plan participation in state public health programs for up to two years
