Honorable Congressmen and Committee Members:

This serves as additional testimony for HAPA. Previous testimony submitted by Dave Messer, PA-C, President HAPA.

SB 2103, submitted and passed in 2012 added language to HRS 457 that helped to clarify that nurses could execute prescribed orders written by physician assistants acting within their scope of practice. When the bill passed "Sunset" language was attached. This is fairly standard procedure which allows for a "trial period" to assure that there is no negative impact to the public from the bill. The change has been in effect for more than 4 years and there has been no demonstrable or documentable harm, but rather benefit. The change made by Act 255, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, has provided clarity and improved communication for all health care providers and specifically, licensed practical nurses, registered nurses and physician assistants.

In reviewing public testimony, it can be seen that the only opposing testimony in 2012 and in 2015, has been received from two individual Advanced Practice Nurses, who testified against the original bill in 2012 and again, against SB 805 in 2015. They do not represent the nursing community at large.

Both individual APRN testifiers object that physician assistants should not be included in the definitions of the nurse practice act in terms of who a nurse can carry out prescribed medical orders from, because it should be stated under their own HRS 453.

This has raised concern among members of HAPA who question why these testifiers would single out physician assistants (PAs) in such a discriminatory fashion. Why not the other providers listed? Dentists, physicians, osteopathic physicians, or podiatrists? All are listed as noted below.

HRS 457 currently states the following:

§457-2 Definitions

"The foregoing may include, but shall not be limited to: implementation of basic nursing procedures in the plan of care; observing and caring for individuals at all levels of the health spectrum, giving counsel and acting to safeguard life and health and functioning as a part of the health care team, under the direction of a dentist, physician, osteopathic physician, registered nurse, osteopath, or podiatrist licensed in accordance with chapter 448, 453, 457, 460, or 463E, or under the orders of a physician assistant licensed pursuant to chapter 453, practicing with physician supervision as required by chapter 453, and acting as the agent of the supervising physician;

There is no merit in their argument that PAs should not be included in HRS 457. If PAs are to be excluded then why not dentists, physicians, osteopathic physicians and podiatrists?

This was not supported by the Hawaii Board of Nursing who testified on SB 805 in 2015 to Senate HTH, CPN and House HLT committees with the following language:

Dear Representative McKelvey and Committee Members:

The American Academy of Physician Assistants (AAPA) is the national professional organization for PAs that advocates on behalf of the profession and patient care provided by physician-PA teams and analyzes laws and regulations that impact PA practice. AAPA represents a profession of more than 108,000 PAs across all medical and surgical specialties and has extensive experience with state regulation of PA practice.

AAPA **supports SB 805** which repeals the sunset provision in Act 255, Session Laws of Hawaii 2012 authorizing licensed practical nurses and registered nurses to carry out the orders of a PA. The provisions are set to sunset on July 1, 2017, if the provision is not repealed.

PAs practice in every healthcare setting, including interdisciplinary teams and various settings that inevitably may require licensed practical nurses and registered nurses to carry out orders by PAs. In order to provide high quality efficient care, PA orders should be able to be executed by LPNs and RNs without hesitation.

Reverting to the previous language of HRS 457 eliminates PAs from the list of providers that nurses can execute prescribed orders from and may lead to confusion as to whether nurses can carry out the orders of a PA. Without data or evidence indicating that the 2012 law has led to any negative impact on public health, we strongly recommend repealing the sunset date for this act. The direction of this bill is consistent with state law in many states across the country which allows LPNs and RNs to carry out the orders of PAs.

We encourage you to continue the good intent of the 2012 act by supporting this bill that increases patient access to quality healthcare.

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We have a critical physician workforce shortage in our state. (Ref: Withy report on Physician Workforce Assessment Report to the Legislature). This shortage is particularly evident in our rural populations and in specialties that care for critically injured patients. As a general / trauma surgeon with two decades experience in Hawaii, I have firsthand knowledge of the complications that can develop when patients cannot obtain expedient medical care. Physicians Assistants (PAs) help to fill this critical gap. The training of a PA prepares them well to prescribe medication with the oversight of a physician. They complete post graduate work in pharmacology and medical therapeutics, and have over 4,000 of clinical experience. The PAs I have worked with in Hawaii are superb, and I have not encountered a single problem due to their privilege to give verbal orders to nurses.

I enthusiastically support SB805; if Act 255 is allowed to "sunset" it will create inefficiency and detract from optimal care of our patients.
