Application for Grants

I. Background and Summary

This year, Aka'ula School, a private, independent, non-profit organization celebrates thirteen years of serving the children, youth and families of Molokai. Since opening our doors in 2004, we have served over 250 students and their families.

Aka`ula School was started with five goals in mind. The school's founding teachers developed these goals as talking points. The goals were to:

1. Take PRISM (Providing Resolutions with Integrity for a Sustainable Molokai) to the broader community.

In 2003, PRISM had a seven-year history on Molokai at that time and had received recognition and awards at local, state, national, and international levels as an exemplary environmental education program. The program offered a context where Hawaiian students could participate in an atmosphere of challenge with support. Students, island-wide, would have the opportunity to participate in PRISM. (This year PRISM celebrates its 20th anniversary!)

2. Build leadership capacity and positive citizenship.

In 2003, National and Molokai-specific research showed that PRISM students improved their critical thinking and problem solving skills and demonstrated the ability to be contributing community members. Students participating in the program were reported to be more mature, have more poise, self-esteem, and leadership ability, and were more autonomous than their peers.

3. Help Molokai children and families realize their potential.

In 2003, we were committed to building a community where students, their families, and teachers were engaged in learning. We believed in educating the whole child through a balanced curriculum celebrating multiple intelligences and meeting the needs of a heterogeneous learning community. We believed that learning, leading, and decision-making were essential collaborative skills.

4. Offer greater possibilities.

In 2003, we wanted to provide new opportunities to enrich the educational experiences of our students, especially in the areas of family participation and community service.

5. Provide an educational choice to middle and high school students on Molokai.

In 2003, there was no curriculum unique to middle school students on Molokai. We were dedicated to cultivating inquisitive, exploratory learning and to teach young people how to use their skills and voices to make a difference.

These talking points became the foundation of Aka'ula School's vision, mission, and guiding principles, and they remain as relevant today as they were when the school was started.

Aka'ula School's mission is to provide children and youth, grades 5 through 12 with opportunities to engage in the collaborative process of learning, leading, and decision making. Our focus is to provide an approach that embraces multiple intelligences and meets the needs of a diverse learning community. Our over-arching goal is to prepare Molokai's youth with a safe haven of learning and a solid educational foundation, arming our students with the character values, knowledge and skills to become contributing members of the 21st century global community.

Aka'ula School is not a private school of wealth or privilege. Our Molokai campus is humble and modest, born from the need for educational choice. It was purposely designed to address that which traps and marginalizes too many Molokai youth, be it teen pregnancy; teen substance abuse; domestic violence; unemployment; or the pervasive culture of poverty.

Our admissions policy is designed to ensure that all segments of Molokai's community have an educational choice, regardless of economics, ethnicity, academics, or behavior. An average of 85% of our students receive some form of financial assistance to attend Aka`ula School, and 70% of those students receive the maximum amount of financial aid offered. This admissions policy has resulted in the student body of Aka`ula School resembling a cross-section of Molokai demographics. In our thirteen years of operation, the school's population has been predominantly Hawaiian ranging from 70% to 80%, with an average of 60% of all students having been eligible for the public school free or reduced lunch program. The percentage of students with learning disabilities or behavioral issues ranges from 15-25%.

Aka'ula School seeks state funding for capital to be used for the land acquisition of the two-acre campus that the school currently utilizes and rents. Funds granted would be used to permanently establish, improve, and expand the school, including and not limited to the procuring/developing the land, renovating existing buildings, planning, fundraising, legal expenses and any, and all expenditures related to improving and enhancing our capacity to continue to educate and serve the children and youth of Molokai.

Aka'ula School will continue to serve the public of Molokai, delivering creative, innovative and cutting-edge academic curricula and educational opportunities. This will continue to fill the critical community need for quality educational options and choices. Aka'ula School will continue to provide educational services that:

- 1. Promote the essence of our school- PRISM (Providing Resolutions with Integrity for a Sustainable Molokai) a nationally recognized, award winning place-based environmental education model;
- 2. Promote and develop advanced critical thinking and communication skills;
- 3. Promote and develop academic fundamentals, investigative expertise, and scholarly research practices;
- 4. Promote the development and use of leadership and citizenship skills;
- 5. Provide a responsive, safe, bully-free, and non-discriminatory educational environment.

Aka'ula School geographically serves Molokai youth in grades 5 – 12, island wide, including the four Hawaiian Homesteads: One Alii, Kapaakea, Kalamaula, and Hoolehua. Our school is surrounded by coffee fields and located in the former Dole Plantation office building. With funds from the state we can make our permanent home at this location, in the historic town of Kualapuu, centrally located on Molokai, four miles from the Hoolehua airport.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

Currently, the scope of services is raising funds to garner the capital needed for the purchase of the two-acre parcel where our school is situated. This is primarily the responsibility of the volunteer Board of Directors. Once the land is acquired, the Board will need the help and assistance of a project planner, contractors and individuals to complete the development, improvement, and expansion of the school and its services.

The plan to buy this land has been a part of our organization's strategic planning effort for the past five years. Historically, Aka'ula School's Board and Administration conducts a rigorous quarterly and annual evaluation of service effectiveness and business success. The vision is to use income from the retail space in the second building to increase enrollment and fund the school. A portion of the retail space will be used as a business incubator for students to learn entrepreneurial skills using curriculum written by teaching staff.

2017 – 2019 - Continue to raise capital funds to purchase the property and to improve, develop, and maintain the property; continue to develop, evaluate, and revise action plan for school improvement and expansion; and continue to deliver educational services and opportunities to Molokai's children, youth and families.

2019- 2021- Start renovations of existing buildings, especially older buildings on the property; start construction of new buildings – a multi-purpose center; continue to develop, evaluate, and revise action plan for school improvement and expansion; continue to raise funds as needed for capital improvements and educational program development and expansion; continue to deliver educational services and opportunities to Molokai's children, youth and families.

2021- 2023- Complete renovations to existing buildings and new facilities and open new facilities to the community; begin to implement increased educational programs and opportunities to a larger student population; continue to deliver educational services and opportunities to Molokai's children, youth and families.

III. Financial

We have operated the school with a lean budget from the beginning to make it as affordable as possible for our families. Our staff makes less than half what they earned as public school employees, but they are willing to do so because they believe passionately in what the school provides the community. The majority of our expenses are constants or at least predictable dependent on enrollment. A little less that half of our annual budget income comes from family tuition commitment. The rest comes from private donations to our annual fund, parent organized fundraisers, student sponsors, and grants. Currently, these funds are designated for day-to-day operations and educational curriculum, equipment and materials. Aka'ula School Staff and Board are committed to seeking funds from donors and granting institutions to augment operational and business expenses once the property has been purchased. The school currently has \$8,000 in its restricted building fund and holds \$50,000 in various stocks that will be sold to support the purchase and renovation of the buildings.

Aka'ula School has neither applied nor was granted any State or Federal tax credits in the prior three years. We are currently exploring our eligibility for governmental tax credits related to our long-term goal of capital development. We anticipate and intend to apply for any, and all, state and federal tax credits from which our organization can benefit.

Aka'ula School has not received any government contracts.

Aka'ula School's bookkeeping, as most non-profits and schools, is on an accrual basis. The school has \$161,665.00 unrestricted net assets as of 12/31/16. This includes remaining tuition for the year and school owned stocks.

IV. Experience and Capability

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

The Aka'ula Board of Directors come from various backgrounds: real estate, entrepreneurs, education. The diverse backgrounds and specialties represented in the Board are conducive to planning and discussing issues relating to acquisition, development, improvement and expansion of the school's facilities and programs. Additionally, Aka'ula School has a strong network of groups and individuals with specialized expertise available to consult, assist, and support our efforts to establish a permanent campus.

B. Facilities

Aka'ula School is located on approximately 2-acres or 68,640 square feet, and know as the Kualapu'u Business Center. It is zoned commercial - Country Town Business. It has two single story buildings. Building one is a one-story plantation style building that was built in 1953. It is 4,020 sq ft. The building has been well maintained throughout the years and is the school's classrooms and administration offices. Also located in the building is the landlord's office and an outdoor Cat Garden (a no kill shelter for cats). Building two is a one-story building built in 2007. It is 4,250 sq ft. It was built for retail and office space. The anchor tenant is the 12-year retail business - Molokai Furniture. This tenant uses 2,000 sq ft. A variety of office and retail business fill the other spaces. Walls and ceilings are insulated for soundproofing and energy efficiency. Single hung vinyl windows are dual pane. The building can be air-conditioned. although, this upcountry area seldom needs air-conditioning. Entry doors are 5 ft double glass. 10' Ceilings and walls are lightly textured and painted. Interior has bamboo millwork around doors, windows and base. Each space has ceiling fans and fluorescent lighting. Each space has category five phone wiring. Solar Power is the main energy source. The grounds are landscaped with rolling lawns and four Elephant Ear canopy trees that were planted in 1950 and provide shade and a welcoming open space. There is plenty of parking, approximately double the County requirements.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

At this time, there is no full-time staff for this effort. This Grant in Aid is for capital to acquire the land that the school is on. The Board of Directors serve as volunteers and donate their time and .

The youth board has two purposes. The first is philanthropic and the second is student activity planning. For every dollar the youth board spends on a school activity, they donate an equal amount to a non-profit organization on Molokai. The board organizes fundraisers to meet these fiduciary responsibilities.

D. Compensation

Board Members and Youth Board Members serve on a voluntary basis. There is no staff for this Grant in Aid. Aka'ula School employs a total of five people who are responsible for delivering educational services; three full-time teachers receiving \$26,000.00 a year, and a part-time teacher receiving \$16,000.00 a year and a part time educational assistant at \$5,000.00 per year.

B. Licensure or Accreditation

Aka'ula is licensed with the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools. The Aka'ula Board and Staff are currently reviewing the viability and feasibility of accreditation in the evolving educational climate and is part of the organization's future plans. Our school operates under the guidance of a nine-member Board of Trustees. A four- member professional staff delivers the day-to-day educational services, leadership, and direction for our students. A seven-member Youth Board of Directors plans and organizes student activities and raises money to donate to local non-profit organization.

C. Private Educational Institutions

The grant will be used to benefit a non-sectarian private educational institution. Aka'ula School is an independent school with no religious affiliation.

D. Future Sustainability Plan

Upon acquisition of the land, renovations and expansion of Aka'ula School, there are plans to create a for-profit arm in the retail building. This will generate monies to fund the school and provide financial assistance to more students and increase enrollment. At the same time it will expand business training opportunities for students through a small business curriculum being created by our staff. Our school will continue to maintain existing leases/rental from businesses currently occupying the business center.
