Garden Island Resource Conservation and Development (GIRC&D,), Inc. is a community-based nonprofit corporation whose mission is to prudently use natural and human resources to improve and enhance Kauai County's economy, social fabric, and fragile island environment. GIRC&D, Inc. was incorporated in January 1991; authorized by Congress in February 1992; and received its 501(c)3 IRS designation in August 1993. A 9-member volunteer Board of Directors, representing diverse facets of the Kauai community, directs the organization. Since its inception, GIRC&D has worked to fulfill its vision: "The community working together towards a harmonious relationship with the environment." Currently our board umbrellas 26 projects via seven committees: Agriculture, Community Development, Cultural Awareness, Forestry, Infrastructure, Parks and Recreation, and Invasive Species. GIRC&D has managed over \$2.5 million in grants for the County of Kauai, State of Hawaii, Federal and private foundations and donors.

The Kokee Resource Conservation Program (KRCP), a project of GIRC&D since 2006, will complete the proposed project. KRCP was created in 1998 as a pilot program to provide natural resource management for selected areas of the 26,000 acre Kokee and Alakai region. The program has thrived with the help of grants and partnerships. KRCP has removed over 11,091,500 invasive weeds from 10,983 acres with 29,280 volunteers putting in 155,429 hours (including repeat acres and repeat volunteers). In the course of transecting for weeds, new populations of many listed Hawaiian endangered plants have been found.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

KRCP will preserve selected areas of native forest ecosystems in Kokee, Waimea Canyon, and Na Pali Coast State Parks by removing non-native invasive plants. The project will involve the public as volunteers and partnerships with other conservation agencies, which greatly leverages the funding.

This project seeks to preserve one of the most valuable and unique forests in the state of Hawai'i, important to the United States for the large number of endangered species found

there. Preservation of the structure and composition of native montane mesic forest in the watershed is the primary goal, and the continual suppression of invasive weeds should maintain native dominance in selected areas of this region.

A further long-term conservation outcome is that forest conservation can be folded into the life of the community. In order to insure the success of forest restoration and long-term threat-abatement, an educated volunteer workforce, under the guidance of trained and knowledgeable field staff, is essential. Koke'e's native forests, containing many culturally precious plants that do not occur anywhere else in the world, need to be recognized by residents of Hawai'i for both their global rarity as well as the personal heritage they represent for all Hawaiians.

KRCP's service learning projects in the forest, involving education and preservation of native Hawaiian plants, will encourage the continued perpetuation of the Hawaiian culture through "malama 'āina", to care for the land. KRCP provides a "tide pool" of conservation talent, since many KRCP student interns and volunteers go on to jobs in conservation occupations. Seven are currently working for DLNR on Kauai alone. All grow into ardent advocates for environmental stewardship. Any community needs a "wilderness", and one that is uniquely Hawaiian and supports the culture will continue to attract community volunteers committed to its preservation.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The much-visited Kokee, Waimea Canyon, and Nā Pali Coast State Parks encompass 12,386 acres on northwest Kauai. This ecologically rich region contains many native plant communities, including the rare Koa/'Ōhi'a Montane Mesic Forest. There are more than 100 endangered species and an additional 31 rare plant taxa found in scattered locations throughout the Kokee plateau. One-third of the federally listed endangered and threatened species are endemic to Hawai'i and three-fourths of the nation's extinct plant and bird species once lived only on our islands.

Kokee's ecosystems are threatened by aggressive weeds, which invade and literally displace the native forest species. Invasive weed control has been identified as a high priority in the recovery plans of nearly all the endangered species on Kauai, and unless there is a strategic and sustained effort to control these weeds, the core native forests will be irreversibly converted to non-native vegetation.

The State Parks budget does not include funding for natural resource management for these 12,386 acres of forested natural area in northwest Kauai; it generally only provides funding for developed acres such as caretaker positions to mow lawns, clean toilets, collect and haul trash, and other maintenance of developed facilities. This is a huge gap of funding since the state is mandated to protect endangered species and their habitat, and the cost of removing invasive weeds can average \$1,000 per acre, totaling \$12 million for these parks.

To manage these unique ecosystems in a sustainable manner for the conservation of biological diversity, threat abatement of invasive species is crucial in this generation. The alarm needs to be sounded that much of the mesic, accessible forest is being lost on our watch. KRCP's work is essential to the survival of special native plant communities and endangered species in Kokee. This project will increase stewardship of the environment by resident and visitor volunteers.

The protection of Hawaiian native forest in accessible areas is critical to Hawaiian practitioners, critical for future generations, and critical to world biodiversity

4. Describe the target population to be served; and
This project provides a framework for Hawaii residents to volunteer to preserve their
native forest. At least 500 volunteers will directly benefit. The project will also increase
eco-tourism and voluntourism. Visitors who volunteer make a more meaningful
connection to Hawaii. Forest stewardship by volunteers leverages funding and creates
public commitment for conservation. When visitors work together with local volunteers,
a deeper connection is made between people and place, creating a special spirit of aloha.

The larger benefit is that visitors to Kokee, a million a year, and future generations will be able to experience preserved native ecosystems, and those educated will spread the knowledge through their communities. Hawaiian practitioners will benefit because the special plants significant for Hawaiian culture will be preserved in accessible areas.

In a global sense this unique natural resource serves a much wider community, as Hawai'i is known as "the endangered species capital of the World". Therefore KRCP serves as educators and stewards for not only the over 65,000 residents of Kauai, but for the state-wide, national and international communities as well.

KRCP links Kauai's State Parks and Forest Reserves to the community by providing public education about native forest processes as well as encouraging local citizens, local school groups, and college interns to participate as volunteers in the conservation project. The personal connection between local citizens and local public lands is the most significant impact of our volunteer program, by implementing conservation through applying education. KRCP's hands-on approach of volunteers working in the forest is the best way to learn about real solutions to saving the fragile ecosystems of this island.

KRCP attracts volunteers from all islands of Hawai'i, the continental US, and countries around the world. Volunteers come from all walks of life, diverse ethnic groups, and all ages from 5 to 75 years. The dedication of our volunteers is highlighted by the fact that many people and many groups volunteer multiple times each year and/or return year after year. This thriving program has about 68% repeat volunteers and volunteer groups, providing an inspiration to community service. The awareness and commitment that the KRCP volunteer program creates have made a huge contribution to sustaining native forest and making its future protective management possible. Our work helps to guarantee the preservation of this precious but disappearing resource for generations to come.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The geographic coverage is northwest Kauai, in Kokee State Park, Waimea Canyon State Park, and Na Pali Coast State Park, including Kalalau.

 The project will be completed incrementally and continually throughout the year, with 25 acres projected to complete each quarter, totaling 100 acres.

All weed control operations will utilize current mapping data gleaned from the new remote sensing survey which details weed distribution and density across the region. Field personnel will continually collect spatial and numerical data during control operations using Garmin GPS units. Data will be downloaded and compiled in ArcGIS 9.3.1. These platforms are widely compatible with conservation organizations operating in the Pacific. This data contributes towards a baseline data set for surveys and evaluations conducted every 5 - 10 years. Volunteer and contributed labor data is also collected.

The outcomes are achievable because of the strategies used and the partners involved. The Kauai Watershed Alliance's (KWA) broad reaching Kauai Watershed Management Plan, completed in 2005 by The Nature Conservancy (TNC), combines the resources of State, Federal, business and private agencies towards the preservation of these native wilderness regions. Costing over 5 million dollars over six years, the plan is ambitious but the need is such that all partners anticipate its complete implementation. Part of the plan focuses on preventing the most problematic, habitat-modifying weeds from invading the most ecologically intact forests. KRCP is implementing a portion of the invasive weed control objectives of the Plan. Other partners besides KWA and TNC are

DLNR, National Tropical Botanical Garden (NTBG), the Plant Extinction Prevention Program (PEPP), USF&WS, KUPU and the Hawaii Youth Conservation Corps, Kaua'i Invasive Species Committee (KISC), Plant Pono, Kauai Forest Bird Recovery Program (KFBRP), and Hawaii Department of Education.

KRCP is addressing these concerns with work on the ground to preserve selected areas of these upland forests and involve the community in resource conservation.


