## I. Background and Summary

## 1. A brief description of the applicant's background.

The Hawaii Heritage Center (HHC) is a 501-C-3 tax exempt, non-profit, educational, eleemosynary organization incorporated in October 1980 in the State of Hawaii. HHC was founded to increase knowledge, understanding, and appreciation for Hawaii's unique multi-cultural heritage. Its mission is implemented through interpretive historical and cultural exhibits, public forums and workshops, publications, multi-media productions, stage and television performances and presentations, immigrant heritage archives, and the historical and cultural Chinatown walking tour. Its public programs seeks to educate and enrich the lives of Hawaii's children and adult residents and visitors to Hawaii.

Honolulu's historic Chinatown has been "home" to Hawaii Heritage Center for over 35 years. HHC has sponsored and undertaken educational historic and cultural preservation activities in the State of Hawaii with projects on Oahu, Hawai, Kauai, Maui, Molokai, and Lanai. It's "Myriad Worlds: 200 Years of the Chinese in Hawaii" and "Boricua Hawaii: The Puerto Ricans of Hawaii Past and Present" have traveled to San Francisco and Puerto Rico respectively for several months. During the past 25 years, irreplaceable, culturally important, and unique items related to Hawaii's immigrants have been donated to HHC thereby creating an archival program. These include Hawaii's English language newspapers from 1850 to 1950, Oahu Market's Young Family collection of household and Cantonese opera artifacts, and original Chinatown business signs from the early 1900s.

HHC undertakes nearly all its projects in partnership with public and private agencies and organizations. Ethnic organizations who have co-sponsored projects with HHC include: Calendonian Society (Scots), Camoes Players (Portuguese), Chinese Chamber of Commerce, German Benevolent Society, Greek Orthodox Church, Hana Trinidad Filipino Performing Arts Group, Hawaii Chinese History Center, Polynesian Cultural Center (Samoans), Portuguese Genealogical Society, Puerto Rican Heritage Society of Hawaii, United Chinese Society, United Puerto Rican Association, US-China Friendship Association, and other organizations. Educational agencies who have assisted or co-sponsored activities with HHC include: Chaminade University, Hawaii State Department of Education, Hawaii Pacific University, Honolulu Community College, Kapiolani Community College, Kauai Community College, Maui Community College, University of Hawaii College of Continuing Education, University of Hawaii Department of Philosophy, and others.

HHC is supported by donations, membership, grants from public and private entities, and many volunteers. Grants to HHC have been received from the National Park Service Japanese Confinement Sites Project, Hawaii Council for the Humanities, a state based program of the National Endowment for the Humanities; McDonalds, Taubman, Bank of Hawaii, First Hawaiian Bank, Alexander and Baldwin, Aukahi, Belt Collins; Chris Hart & Partners, Cultural Surveys Hawaii, Hawaiian Electric Company, Kuiwalu, Outrigger Hotels & Resorts, Peter Vincent & Associates, Scientific Consultant Services, Spencer Architects; Hawaii Community Foundation, Atherton Foundation, Larry & Bea Ching Foundation, other businesses and entities, and numerous individuals. HHC has never received any operating funding from the State of Hawaii or other government agency.

HHC's multicultural exhibits gallery, Chinatown Tour orientation area, and offices are located at 1040 Smith Street in Honolulu's Chinatown. HHC owns real property at 1168 Smith Street where it hopes to build a permanent facility to present, educate, and enrich the lives of Hawaii's children and adults and Hawaii's visitors on the contributions of Hawaii's multi-cultural people to our State's growth and development.

## **2.** The goals and objectives related to the request.

The Hawaii Heritage Center seeks an \$700,000 CIP grant-in-aid from the Legislature to design and construct a new facility in Honolulu's historic Chinatown, an area that has served as a transition zone for nearly all immigrant groups that have come to Hawaii. This project will qualify as a grant, pursuant to Chaper 42F, HRS.

The new building will be ADA accessible, LEED silver and include areas for public education, exhibits, archival research and resource, Chinatown tour orientation, community meetings, and restrooms.

The construction of a new permanent facility will enable HHC to accommodate an expansion of programs and activities presenting multi-ethnic historical and cultural interpretive exhibits and educational public programs. School children, adult residents, and visitors will see interpretive exhibits on the Chinese, Filipinos, Germans, Greeks, Hawaiians, Irish, Japanese, Jews, Koreans, Portuguese, Puerto Ricans, and Scots as well as Hawaii's newest immigrants from Cambodia, Vietnam, Burma, Laos, and other parts of the world.

#### 3. The public purpose and need to be served.

This project seeks to educate and preserve for present and future generations Hawaii's unique multi-cultural heritage through interpretive historical exhibits, public forums and presentations, workshops, publications, performances, media productions, and archives. There is no such "one stop" facility presenting the contributions of diverse ethno-cultural groups to the growth and development of Hawaii.

HHC's current facility at 1040 Smith Street has insufficient space to accommodate more diverse ethno-cultural exhibits. Currently only 5% of HHC's exhibits can be displayed. Archival materials are stored and not accessible to the public. The new building will immediately increase the number of cultural exhibits available to the public and allow accessibility to the archives collection.

#### 4. Describe the target population to be served.

The primary target population includes Hawaii's children, college students, adult residents, and visitors to Hawaii. The secondary population are historical researchers, educators, ethnic organizations, and other entities interested in cultural preservation. In 2016 over 2,000 children and adults visited the multicultural gallery. The school children came from mostly public schools on Oahu - from elementary to high school students. College students from Hawaii and mainland universities, many senior citizen groups, business, and community groups visit the gallery and participate in the Chinatown historical and cultural walking tours.

#### 5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The newly constructed facility will be in Honolulu's Chinatown and will benefit children and adults throughout the State and Hawaii's visitors from all parts of the mainland USA and many foreign countries. All major HHC interpretive exhibits will continue to travel to Hawaii, Kauai, Maui, and outlying areas of Honolulu such as Waipahu and Windward areas.

## II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities.

This project's scope will include planning, design, and construction of a new facility in Honolulu's Chinatown. It will be a LEED energy efficient building and ADA accessible. The building will also have multi-use for certain areas - for example, the enclosed parking area will also be used to fumigate exhibits, artifacts, and other materials before they enter the building.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service.

Twelve months after release of the Grant-in-Aid funds, all planning and design work will be completed and building permits will be submitted. HHC estimates that construction will start within three months of receiving building permit approvals and be completed by the 36<sup>th</sup> month after the release of the GIA funds.

3. Describe the quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results.

Quality assurance and evaluation will be the responsibility of the HHC Board of Directors and its CIP Advisory Committee comprised of professionals who are retired or employed in education, construction, architecture, legal, and other fields. The design plans will be reviewed and evaluated by the CIP Advisory Committee and its members will monitor all phases of the construction.

The Hawaii Heritage Center has operated successfully as a self-sustaining and financially viable entity for over 35 years. It is a 501-C-3 tax exempt, non-profit, educational, eleemosynary organization incorporated in October 1980 in the State of Hawaii. HHC was founded to increase knowledge, understanding, and appreciation for Hawaii's unique multi-cultural heritage. Its mission is implemented through interpretive historical and cultural exhibits, public forums and workshops, publications, multi-media productions, stage and television performances and presentations, immigrant heritage archives, and the historical and cultural Chinatown walking tour. Its public programs seeks to enrich the lives of Hawaii's children and adult residents and visitors to Hawaii.

Over its 35 year history the HHC has received grants from the Federal Department of the Interior-National Park Service, international businesses such as McDonalds and Taubman, State Foundation on Culture and the Arts, the Hawaii Council for the Humanities, the State of Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources, Atherton Foundation, EE Black Foundation, Hawaii Community Foundation, Hawaii Government Employees Association (HGEA), UPW, HSTA, Chinese Chamber of Commere, Hawaii Chinese History Center, Chinatown Merchants Association, Alexander and Baldwin, Hawaiian Electric Company, and many other businesses and organizations.

During the past three years, HHC has received grants from:

- 1) Department of Interior, National Park Service, Japanese Confinement Sites Project for a project focusing on the Honouliuli building analysis.
- 2) State of Hawaii, Department of Land and Natural Resources, Division of Boating, grant for the historic sites calendar to include tide charts and boating safety information.
- 3) Various organizations, businesses, and individuals for the Patsy Takemoto Mink exhibit "From a Maui Plantation to Congress."

#### B. Facilities

The applicant shall provide a description of its facilities and demonstrate its adequacy in relation to the request. If facilities are not presently available, describe plans to secure facilities.

Current Hawaii Heritage Center multicultural exhibits gallery, archives, and office is located at 1040 Smith in Chinatown, between King and Hotel Streets, occupying an area of approximately 2,500 square feet. The current gallery can only display 5% of the historical interpretive exhibits in HHC's collections and the archives area does not have the ideal environment for artifacts and other historical materials.

The new building will be located at 1168 Smith Street in Chinatown, an area rich with Hawaii's immigrant experiences. The land is owned by Hawaii Heritage Center. The new facility will have approximately 6,000 square feet of space for educational activities, exhibits, archives, office, and restrooms. The archives will have temperature and humidity controls to provide the optimum environment for artifacts and other historical materials.

## V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

#### A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training



Due to her 30 years of State employment as a Planner, Budget and Program Evaluation Analyst and administrator she brings experience and abilities to this project.

  - d) Allows the state agency to which funds for the grant were appropriated for expenditure, legislative committees and their staff, and the auditor full access to their records, reports, files, and other related documents and information for purposes of monitoring, measuring the effectiveness, and ensuring the proper expenditure of the grant.
- 2) If the applicant is an organization, the applicant meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
  - a) Is incorporated under the laws of the State; and
  - b) Has bylaws or policies that describe the manner in which the activities or services for which a grant is awarded shall be conducted or provided.
- 3) If the applicant is a non-profit organization, it meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
  - a) Is determined and designated to be a non-profit organization by the Internal Revenue Service; and
  - b) Has a governing board whose members have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation.

Pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, for grants used for the acquisition of land, when the organization discontinues the activities or services on the land acquired for which the grant was awarded and disposes of the land in fee simple or by lease, the organization shall negotiate with the expending agency for a lump sum or installment repayment to the State of the amount of the grant used for the acquisition of the land.
