The Hawaiian Humane Society aims to promote the human-animal bond and the humane treatment of all animals by providing adoptions services, animal care and sterilization procedures, foster care, community outreach and educational programs, and 24-hour animal admissions and emergency response. Founded in 1883, we are the leader in animal welfare issues in Hawaii.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Since 1883, the Hawaiian Humane Society has been an integral part of life on Oahu from protecting over-worked carriage horses to rescuing over-bred dogs from puppy mills and the crafting of legislation to strengthen Hawaii's animal-protection laws. In 1900, our humane officers responded to 849 cases of animal mistreatment including 285 overworked horses and mules.

Today, the Society's ten humane officers respond to thousands of calls annually to assist animals in neighborhoods across Oahu and are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to rescue to any animal in need. So much progress has been made as pets have migrated from our backyards into our living rooms and have become full-fledged family members. And as human populations in West Oahu communities have grown so has their love of animals. At 61%, West Oahu has the highest percentage of pet owners compared to the rest of Oahu with a rate of 55%.

The location of the Moiliili campus does not provide easy access to people living in West Oahu and other areas outside of Honolulu's urban core. Therefore people who need or want Hawaiian Humane Society services may currently find it too inconvenient or are simply unable to access them.

The establishment of a Hawaiian Humane Society campus in West Oahu will provide underserved communities with greatly-needed programs and services including animal admissions, adoptions, humane investigations and rescues, lost

& found, animal care and sheltering, youth education and a community off-leash dog park for the benefit of countless animals and people for generations to come.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

> Our more than 130-year history of helping Oahu's people and animals is a testament to how the Hawaiian Humane Society has enriched the community by offering a safe harbor to lost and abandoned pets, encouraging responsible pet ownership, educating our youth, expanding families through pet adoptions, rescuing pets from abuse and neglect and reuniting lost pets and owners across Oahu.

95% of Oahu residents who were polled in 2015 by Honolulu research firm Ward Research believed that animal companionship was imperative to their quality of life. In the last 5 years, the Hawaiian Humane Society has placed homeless animals with more than 30,000 families. We're not just a bricks and mortar facility - we're a part of thousands of families across the island.

Due to projected human and animal population growth in West Oahu, planners Helber, Hastert & Fee projected that by the year 2030 52% of animals admitted to the Hawaiian Humane Society would be better served by a second campus in West Oahu. As the only animal welfare organization on Oahu that does not turn animals away, the Society recognizes the responsibility to extend our reach to provide vitally needed services in West Oahu.

Some of the programs and services our campus will offer include:

- Animal rescues, animal care and pet adoptions to place pets into loving homes, reunite families with lost pets, rescue lost, abandoned, abused or neglected animals and prevent future animal cruelty.
- Educational initiatives to reach at-risk youth with mentoring and values development programs, provide public education to break the cycle of violence linking animal abuse and family violence, and provide humane education programs for schools and community groups.
- Emergency pet fostering program to provide care for animals who are too young for adoption, pets of victims fleeing domestic violence, pets of disaster victims and pets of active duty military personnel on deployment.
- Animal transport services to and from the Hawaiian Humane Society's spay/neuter clinic in Moiliili. The clinic provides free or low-fee spay/neuter surgeries for free-roaming cats and pets of homeless and low-income populations to help reduce animal overpopulation and improve the health and wellbeing of animals.

• Meeting spaces, community events and an off-leash dog park to serve as a gathering place and animal resource center for pets and their people.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The Hawaiian Humane Society serves the island of Oahu with a population of 950,000 people. In a recent Ward Research survey, 27% of Oahu residents (approximately 256,000 people) had some form of contact with the Hawaiian Humane Society in the preceding 12 month period. 65% of that contact was an inperson visit to the Moiliili campus.

A second campus in West Oahu would better serve nearly half of Oahu's population of both people and animals. As the majority of Oahu's future growth is forecasted to occur in West Oahu, this number will continue to expand.

With just one campus our animal admissions were more than 25,000 in FY2016. By a conservative estimate, we project servicing approximately 83,000 people a year and nearly 14,000 animals at our planned West Oahu campus. Based on the research of mainland animal welfare organizations who have added a second campus, these projections will likely be surpassed once our doors have opened.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The West Oahu campus will provide more convenient access to Hawaiian Humane Society programs and services for the growing population who reside west of Aloha Stadium.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

The construction of a Hawaiian Humane Society campus in West Oahu will provide greatly needed programs and services for underserved communities including animal admissions, adoptions, humane investigations and rescues, pet lost & found, animal care and sheltering, youth education and a community off-leash dog park.

This grant of \$1,000,000 will help underwrite Phase One of the West Oahu Campus Construction providing the infrastructure necessary to proceed with this important project. Phase One includes site work costs for grading, drainage and

backfill, site access/ingress and egress, and additional work necessary to comply with building codes.

2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service:

The planning for this project is well underway. Site work on the campus will begin in December 2017 and take approximately six months to complete. The Society anticipates opening the West Oahu campus to the public in January 2019.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and

The success of our project will be defined by a timely completion within the outlined budget. Hawaiian Humane Society President & CEO, Pamela Burns, will continue to work with the board of directors and project contractor to ensure that construction is moving forward as planned. While our goal is an ambitious one, we feel confident that we will achieve our objectives.

Once the campus is open to the public, the programs and services will be evaluated for impact and effectiveness by gathering feedback from the public. The Hawaiian Humane Society has commissioned surveys of the community every three years since 1993 to help ensure that we are providing the highest quality service for the community's animals and people and addressing our community's most critical animal welfare issues. The Society's most recent survey conducted in 2015 indicated that 87% of residents who had contact with the Hawaiian Humane Society reported that contact to be positive.

The Society also maintains monthly statistics on all animal admissions and adoptions and will perform ongoing analysis of the operations of both of our campuses to ensure that we are maximizing opportunities to provide services across the island.

The Hawaiian Humane Society has been Oahu's leader in animal welfare issues since our establishment in 1883. In fiscal year 2016, we provided shelter and care for 25,074 animals, found new families for 7,615 homeless pets, performed 8,347 spay/neuter surgeries, provided humane education to 23,204 youth across Oahu and worked with 7,664 community volunteers.

In order to better serve Hawaii's animals and people, the Society recently completed renovations and an expansion to our existing campus in Moiliili. The project included the construction of a new veterinary clinic and admissions center, two new dog adoption pavilions and a new cat adoption building. These new buildings were designed to optimize the behavioral, psychological and socialization needs of the animals, ease of cleaning, maintenance and disease control, and improve the overall experience for animals and the people who visit them. The project was completed on time and on budget.

Our West Oahu campus is also being designed to reduce animal stress and promote positive behaviors and provide the best possible experience for visitors. The successful completion of construction to our existing campus combined with our long-standing history of providing programs and services in our community give us the confidence that our second campus in West Oahu will provide a significant benefit for animals and people.

In 2015 a five-acre parcel on Fort Weaver Road was donated by D.R. Horton to the Society and planning for the campus began. In July 2016, the due diligence on the property was completed and the Hawaiian Humane Society formally accepted the gift of land and committed to building a West Oahu campus.




