I. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa, a 501-c-3 organization, was established in 2003 with the motto of "E Ho'ohanohano a E Ho'omau...To Honor and To Perpetuate." The 'Ohana was the vision of Kalaupapa leader Bernard Punikai'a and embraced by residents to advocate for the community, help descendants to learn about their Kalaupapa ancestors, develop educational programs and work in collaboration to preserve this important history.

From 1866-1969, approximately 8,000 people – 90 percent of them Native Hawaiians – were taken from their families and relocated to the Makanalua peninsula, commonly known as Kalaupapa, because of government policies regarding leprosy (now called Hansen's disease). For most of that time, these individuals – many of whom went on to live remarkable lives and became leaders at Kalaupapa -- have been left out of their own history, their names forgotten and their accomplishments ignored.

Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa is bringing the people of Kalaupapa back into the history that they helped to create and presenting a more accurate portrayal of their lives with schools and the public.

The 'Ohana is made up of Kalaupapa residents, family members, descendants and longtime friends of the community. Since organizing, the President of the 'Ohana has been a Kalaupapa resident and the 'Ohana Board of Directors is mostly composed of Kalaupapa residents and family members, the majority of whom are Native Hawaiians.

The 'Ohana has created an array of programs and projects to serve our mission:

- *Developed "The Restoration of Family Ties" which has helped nearly 700 families reconnect to their Kalaupapa ancestors and enabled nearly 300 descendants, teachers and students to visit Kalaupapa;
- *Started a Schools Outreach program that has visited more than 35 schools from elementary level to UH-Manoa;
- *Produced two award-winning traveling exhibits about the history and people of Kalaupapa that have visited every island;
- *Published a book, "Adjourned With a Prayer: The Minutes of Siloama and Kanaana Hou Church, 1866-1928," to show a more accurate history of Kalaupapa as written by the people themselves;
- *Produced an award-winning DVD, "The Pride of a Nation," that is being shown to visitors at the Molokai Museum & Cultural Center with plans to show it to visitors to Kalaupapa National Historical Park;

The biggest project of the 'Ohana is to establish The Kalaupapa Memorial which will list the names of everyone taken from their families and isolated there. Of the estimated 8,000 people sent to Kalaupapa, fewer than 1,000 have identifiable tombstones. The Memorial will ensure that everyone's name is forever remembered, paying tribute to the people of Kalaupapa while providing a place of pride and healing for the thousands of descendants who live in Hawaii and beyond.

The 'Ohana submitted a bill known as The Kalaupapa Memorial Act to Congress that was signed into law in 2009 by President Barack Obama, authorizing Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa to establish the Memorial.

Since then, a location for the Memorial – the preference of Kalaupapa residents -- has been determined. A 65-year lease for the land has been granted to the 'Ohana by the State Board of Land and Natural Resources, a Conceptual Design has been created, environmental studies are nearing completion and plans for Phase II of Planning and Design for the Memorial are underway that will result in the final design.

In addition to producing the final design of the Memorial, the 'Ohana is now developing ways to move into the future, increase our sustainability and make the information we have gathered over the years that is related to the Memorial more accessible to the public.

2. The goals and objections related to the request;

"The Kalaupapa Legacy Project" will take the 'Ohana into the future with full-time leadership and a Strategic Plan for the next five years that will produce a final design for the Kalaupapa Memorial and provide the public with more hands-on opportunities to learn about the lives of the people of Kalaupapa whose names will be listed on The Memorial.

The Kalaupapa Memorial will become one of the most visited landmarks at Kalaupapa. Located in the original settlement of Kalawao, across from St. Philomena Church ("Saint Damien's Church) and near Siloama Church, the Memorial is already attracting attention. Family members visit an ahu that marks the center of the Memorial and tourists are told about the significance of the Memorial.

By transitioning from a part-time Executive Director to a full-time Executive Director with a Board-approved plan for the future, the 'Ohana will be equipped to oversee the Memorial and assist families seeking information about their ancestors whose names are engraved on it.

Phase I of Planning and Design for the Memorial, made possible by a \$100,000 grant from Maui County, culminated with a Conceptual Design (attached for your perusal) which has been enthusiastically supported by Kalaupapa residents and others. Phase II will include architectural renderings, engineering studies, cost specifications and installation technology.

By creating a searchable database from the massive amounts of information gathered by the 'Ohana from public resources, producing a book with all the names to be listed on the Memorial and redesigning the website as a constantly updated clearinghouse, the Legacy Project will not only disseminate more information to the public, but increase awareness of Kalaupapa and The Memorial.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The Kalaupapa Memorial will help return to history the thousands of people sent to Kalaupapa because they were thought to have had leprosy. The Memorial will also help the descendants – most of them Native Hawaiians -- learn a history of Kalaupapa not often presented in the schools and enable them to find pride in ancestors they might not have known about.

The Kalaupapa Legacy Project will support the Memorial by providing the public with a deeper look into the lives of the people of Kalaupapa on different levels. The Memorial itself will become a destination, especially for family members in search of their roots. The Legacy Database, similar to Ancestry.com but limited to information about Kalaupapa, will enable family members to find for themselves information on their ancestors. The Memorial Legacy Book will be available for sale in bookstores and online, including at The Kalaupapa Bookstore so visitors to Kalaupapa have something substantial to take home.

The redesigned website will be a repository of the many materials produced by the 'Ohana over the years, ideal for teachers and students as well as anyone with an interest in the history of Kalaupapa.

The leadership transition will ensure that the Memorial will be interpreted by family members who have been trained in the history of Kalaupapa. With family members serving as docents at the Memorial, the stories will resonate with visiting descendants as well as tourists.

4. Describe the target population to be served

Because 90 percent of those sent to Kalaupapa were Native Hawaiians, the impacts of the Kalaupapa Legacy Project stretch across Hawai'i and beyond to the Continent of the United States and the rest of the world. In addition, Kalaupapa has received global attention because of the legacies of Saint Damien and Saint Marianne.

5. Describe the geographic challenge

Kalaupapa is Hawai'i's most isolated community, accessible only by small planes or a cliff trail. In addition, visitors can only enter Kalaupapa with special permission.

Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa, with the support of the Kalaupapa community and working with the Department of Health, assists with making arrangements that enables families, teachers and students to visit Kalaupapa.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities

The Kalaupapa Legacy Project is composed of products that will be of timeless value to family members, schools and the general public while providing for a leadership transition to take the 'Ohana into its next chapter:

Leadership Transition – A full-time Executive Director will be hired to replace the parttime Executive Director who will stay on in an advisory capacity to ensure for a smooth transition. The 'Ohana Board of Directors will bring on a Consultant to develop a Strategic Plan that will provide a blueprint for the organization for the next five years.

Final Design of the Memorial – The funding from the Kalaupapa Legacy Project will be added to \$100,000 already secured for Phase II of Planning and Design of the Memorial along with an estimated \$100,000 in pro-bono professional services from architects, landscape architects and cultural specialists who make up the Memorial Design Team which produced the Conceptual Design for the Memorial.

Legacy Database of Names – Over the past 10 years, the 'Ohana has compiled digitized lists of information on more than 7,100 of the people of Kalaupapa obtained from public resources found in Hawai`i and other locations. The 'Ohana has transcribed the Kalaupapa Admissions Register, Marriage Records, Birth Records, Death Records, church minutes, US Census Records, the Kalaupapa Cemetery Directory and about 1,000 photographs. Currently, family members contact the 'Ohana Executive Director who searches these records for information about their ancestors and provides them with a detailed summary.

By assembling this information into a searchable database accessible by a passcode available through memberships, family members will be able to search for this information on their own – and perhaps happen on names of ancestors they did not know had been sent to Kalaupapa.

The Legacy Memorial Book – For many people who visit The Kalaupapa Memorial, the Legacy book will become a must-have resource to take home and, for those unable to visit Kalaupapa, the book will become a real connection to the Kalaupapa Memorial.

The book will list all the names that will be listed on the Memorial along with photographs, quotations from residents and family members and stories about the significance of the Memorial.

The Legacy Website – The website will become a go-to source for teachers, students and anyone with an interest in the history of Kalaupapa as well as the activities of Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa.

The Final Design of the Memorial will be approved by Kalaupapa residents and shared with others who play a key role at Kalaupapa, including the National Park Service and the Department of Land and Natural Resources. Any possible cultural impacts will be addressed in the ongoing Section 106 consultation process as previously agreed to by the 'Ohana, NPS and the State Historic Preservation Division. The Design process is being overseen by a nationally renowned architect who has helped develop some of the nation's most important Memorials.

The Legacy Database will be available online, possibly offered by a one-time fee or free as a part of an 'Ohana annual membership. The database will be accessible by a passcode. Feedback from users will be sought to improve the database and offer more ways for families to reach out to one another.

The Legacy Book – Key Kalaupapa residents and family members will review the final draft of the Legacy Book. The Kalaupapa historian will be involved in preparing the book to ensure factual accuracy.

The Legacy Website – The website will have contact information so comments on improving the site can be sent to the 'Ohana and accessed by the Executive Director for possible changes or additions. The number of hits will show the effectiveness of the site.

Executive Director – The Executive Director will be assisted temporarily by the current part-time Executive Director working as a Senior Advisor and overseen by the 'Ohana Board of Directors. The Senior Advisor will provide comments to the Executive Director who will undergo an annual review by the 'Ohana Board.

IV. Experience and Capability

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

Valerie Monson has been serving as Executive Director for Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa since 2008. Monson is former award-winning reporter at *The Maui News* who has been interviewing and writing about the people of Kalaupapa for more than 25 years. She is a founding member of Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa and has served as 'Ohana Executive Director since 2008, managing the programs, preparing publicity materials and supporting the Memorial Committee. Valerie will continue as Executive Director and lead the search for a new Executive Director for the 'Ohana. Once the ED has been hired, Valerie will step down and serve as a Senior Advisor to make sure of a smooth transition

Don Stastny, a nationally renowned architect, will coordinate the process for Phase II of Planning and Design of the Kalaupapa Memorial that will result in a Final Design. Stastny has coordinated the design process for other Memorials in the United States, including the Flight 93 and Oklahoma City Memorials. He has been providing advice to the 'Ohana for nearly six years and coordinated the Phase I design process for the Kalaupapa Memorial.

Tessa Munekiyo Ng, of the highly respected planning firm of Munekiyo & Hiraga, Inc., has overseen the Chapter 343 process, the environmental assessment required by the State of Hawaii so that the 'Ohana may be awarded a 65-year lease from the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) that was unanimously supported by the Land Board.

Jason Umemoto, a landscape architect for more than 20 years who co-owns his firm, will advise on the design of the area leading to the Memorial. Umemoto is also the greatnephew of the late Ed Kato, who was born in Kipahulu, sent to Kalaupapa in 1938 and was named Maui County's Outstanding Older American of the Year in 1996.

Hitoshi Hida, retired architect of Group 70 International, will continue to serve as consultant on the design process of the Memorial. Hida came up with the idea of two interlocking circles for the Conceptual Design of the Memorial.

Anwei Skinsnes Law, an award-winning author and historian who has been studying the history of Kalaupapa for more than 40 years, will continue to compile and research the names for listing on the Memorial as she has been doing since 2007. The 'Ohana currently has more than 7,100 names in our database.

Tamara Lester, an award-winning graphics artist with more than 25 years of experience who owns her own company on Maui, will redesign the website that she originated in 2008 and has continually updated since.

Tom Pierce, a noted land use attorney who also specializes in nonprofit organizations, will provide legal advice.

Carbonero CPAs and Management Group of Maui will handle bookkeeping.

B. Facilities

Through an Executive Order issued by the Director of the Department of Health, Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa was assigned a house at Kalaupapa to serve as an office and, in the future, as a home base for the caretaker of the Kalaupapa Memorial. The Executive Order also gave the 'Ohana special permission to drive to Kalawao for 'Ohana business without a resident escort, as is required by all other visitors.

The 'Ohana has its own 11-passenger van, completely refurbished in 2014, donated by a supporter. The van is used to transport family members and Memorial consultants around Kalaupapa.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

The applicant shall describe the proposed staffing pattern and proposed service capacity appropriate for the viability of the request. Executive Director – This person must exhibit leadership qualities, be able to carry out administrative functions of a nonprofit organization, continue the current programs of Ka 'Ohana O Kalaupapa and develop new ones. The Executive Director should establish a

trusting relationship with the residents of Kalaupapa and work to maintain partnerships with the Department of Health, National Park Service and other entities that have a role at Kalaupapa. It would be of benefit if this person was a descendant of Kalaupapa.

Senior Advisor – This position will be handled by the current 'Ohana Executive Director to provide advice and background to the new Executive Director, ensuring a smooth transition into the future.

Fundraising Strategist – This consultant must be equipped to develop a Capital Campaign strategy for the major fundraising for the Kalaupapa Memorial.

The 'Ohana Board of Directors will provide strategic direction and support in developing policies and procedures as the 'Ohana evolves into its next phase of non-profit development, providing guidance and support to the Executive Director.

The 'Ohana Executive Director and Historian, who have extensive experience in planning workshops about Kalaupapa, are in the process of developing a docent training program that will lead interested participants in a retreat that focuses on the history of Kalaupapa and the lives of the people with input from various experts. The goal is to have docents be involved with family visits to Kalaupapa and to begin providing leadership in other ways to relieve duties of the Executive Director.

C. Compensation

The applicant shall provide the annual salaries paid by the applicant to the three highest paid officers, directors or employees of the organization by position.

The organization has no employees. The 'Ohana Executive Director, who is also Secretary for the Board of Directors, was paid \$36,000 for 2016 as an Independent Contractor. No benefits were included.

The proposed GIA would allow the 'Ohana to hire staff which is necessary for the non-profit organization to transition into its next phase of its life cycle. The Memorial project will require the organization to transition from being a volunteer board to a fully functioning non-profit organization with paid staff to support the programs being planned in conjunction with the development of the Memorial.


