Application for Grants and Subsidies

I. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Ko'olauloa Health Center (KHC) was organized in 2003 by community members in response to the need for affordable, quality, culturally appropriate health care for the residents of Ko'olauloa. Since opening its doors thirteen years ago as a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), it has been making attempt to increase the number of residents served as well as expanded its services to address the unique needs of the residents in the community. For example, KHC is the only dental provider in the region. Over the past three years, on average, KHC has served 5,700 patients through 18,000 encounters per year.

KHC is one of three organizations in the 35-mile service area of Ko'olauloa that provides primary medical services. Of the three, KHC is probably the only one that accepts all patients, regardless of ability to pay. This area has the greatest shortage of primary medical doctors and dentists in the entire State of Hawaii, as determined by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Resource, Health Resources Services Administration (HRSA).

The goals and objectives related to the request;

Goals and objectives. The goal for this project is to construct a facility for KHC in the Hau'ula region so that it can continue to meet the needs of the community by providing comprehensive quality health care by the residents of Ko'olauloa. Currently, KHC is leasing clinical and office space at the Hau'ula Kai Shopping Center. KHC has agreed to partner with the Hau'ula Community Association (HCA) to build a multi-use facility. KHC is on a month-to-month lease with the Weinberg Company, and we would have to vacate on one month's notice with no other commercial space in the area to accommodate the current needs.

The objective is to construct a new structure at 54-256 Hau'ula Homestead Road that was transferred to from the State to the City and County of Honolulu by an executive order for park use. The City and the State are both aware of the desire to construct a facility and other appurtenances that will benefit the community and the region in the future. Both KHC and the HCA have met with officials to request leasing of the property from the State. At this time, an environment assessment must be performed before the State will rescind the Executive Order and consider leasing to KHC.

Our vision is to have several nonprofits establish services that will compliment a primary care clinic including social and economic support. HCA would like to develop. The additional space will allow for increases in providers including

dentists. Currently, KHC does not have space for dental chairs at its Hau'ula Clinic. Space for preventive care is also included in the current plan. In addition, due to the site being away from the tsunami zone, the facility will be designed to serve as a shelter and evacuation site for disasters.

The primary goal is to expand our services and allow greater access to health care services to meet the current and future needs of the community.

State the public purpose and need to be served;

Koʻolauloa was designated a Medically Underserved Area (MUA) by HRSA in 2003, and has the highest Health Personnel Shortage Area (HPSA) scores in the entire state for primary medical and dental care. This means that the Koʻolauloa community has the most severe shortage of primary care doctors and dentists than any other community in the entire State of Hawaii.

In addition, over 51% of Koʻolauloa residents live below 200% of the Federal Poverty level, and KHC is the only FQHC in Koʻolauloa, and the only organization that will provide medical, dental, behavioral health and pharmaceutical services regardless of ability to pay. No other organization in the community utilizes a sliding scale fee and has eligibility workers on staff to assist with securing government health insurance and social service benefits.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

Poverty. Ko'olauloa is home to 21,406 residents. Of these residents, 51% or 9,287 are low/moderate income. However, this statistic is skewed by a small population of high income residents and a large number of vacation rentals in the community. In census tract 102.01 alone, over 57% are low/moderate income residents. Hau'ula Elementary School compromises of approximately 90% native Hawaiians or other Pacific Islanders and approximately 90% of the student population is on the free/reduced lunch program.

Health disparities. The major health care needs of area residents include asthma, poor dental health, drug abuse, obesity, high teen birth rates, diabetes, stroke, obesity, asthma, low immunization rates, low medical utilization rates, inadequate prenatal care, high percentage of mothers with pre-existing medical conditions, and the need for community based support for the elderly.³ Substance abuse is a continuing concern, with high rates of smoking and binge drinking. These rates are even higher among Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders.

KHC patient population. Over 24% of KHC patients are uninsured, and over 40% are insured by government insurance programs (Medicaid/QUEST or

Medicare). It is interesting that patients at the Hau'ula Clinic are reluctant to travel to our Kahuku clinics. Although the distance is approximately five miles, there seems to be some kind of social/cultural barrier.

Anticipated population growth. Over the coming years, the population of Koʻolauloa is anticipated to increase, and this will bring an even greater need for quality, affordable healthcare in the area:

- Turtle Bay plans an expansion of its facility, including workforce housing for its hotel staff.
- Brigham Young University (BYU) is in the process of expanding its campus to double their enrollment and faculty. Although BYU has its own health center, many students and faculty access KHC family planning services and other healthcare needs not covered by BYU health insurance.
- Hawaii Reserves Inc. has plans to develop additional residential property in Kahuku.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

KHC serves the 35-mile coastal north/northeastern shore community of Koʻolauloa on the main island of Oahu. The service area extends from Kualoa to Waimea Bay.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

Scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

Scope of work and tasks. KHC seeks funding create a health clinic along within a larger community facility on State property situated at 54-256 Hau'ula Homestead Road. The property is approximately 5 acres. The total cost of the project is approximately \$11 million. Current tasks include:

- Conduct an environmental assessment as required by the Department of Land and Natural Resources.
- · Possibly conduct an environmental impact statement.
- Select an architect experienced in designing healthcare facilities through a competitive bid process;
- Work in Team fashion with the architect and engineers to develop plans and specifications for the required infrastructure, facility and appurtenances;

Responsibilities. This project will be directed by Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Terrence Aratani working with the KHC Board of Directors and HCA. The CEO will work with the Chief Operations Officer, Bryan Talisayan. Dotty Kelly-Paddock from the HCA will also be involved for input into the community needs for the facility.

The CEO will work with the Chief Financial Officer, to manage the procurement process and ensure that funds are expended on a timely basis and in compliance with appliciable County, Satae and Federal regulations.

3. Quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request

The CEO and COO, together with the architect, Quality assurance includes the following:

- Bi-weekly status meetings of the CEO, COO, Dotty Kelly-Paddock and project manager. The group will include the architect once the plans and design phase begins.
- Monthly reports by the CEO to the Board of Directors of KHC and to HCA to ensure that the project is proceeding in a timely manner and notify the board of any unanticipated delays, and ensure that the project falls within the budget and scope approved by the Board of Directors.
- Ongoing oversight and evaluation by the architect.
- Oversight by the Chief Financial Officer to ensure compliance and proper documentation of expenditures and accounting procedures.

In addition to the ongoing monitoring of the project, each year KHC undergoes a financial audit by certified public accountants to ensure that the organization complies with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

4. Measure(s) of effectiveness

Effectiveness of this project will be determined by the completion of tasks within the projected timeline and approved budget, as evaluated by the CEO and COO.

3. Other sources of funding for fiscal year 2015-2016

The total cost of the project is approximately \$15 million, and KHC will aggressively seek funding for the balance from the City and County of Honolulu Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program, USDA Rural Development Programs, Harold K. L. Castle Foundation, The Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation and other private sources. KHC will need to have plans and design completed in order to seek other sources of funding.

4. State and federal tax credits

KHC has not applied for or been granted any state or federal tax credits.

IV. Experience and Capability

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

KHC has the skills, abilities, knowledge and experience to successfully implement and complete this project. KHC has renovated existing class rooms at Kahuku High and Intermediate School to be the first school-based student health center in the State of Hawaii.

Board Governance. The Board of Directors has a Building Committee comprised of board members plus the CEO. They will meet at least once a month and are responsible for evaluating all matters regarding facilities, and for reporting to the full Board.

B. Facilities

KHC has expanded over the years, and now operates out of three sites, one is a freestanding structure in Kahuku that KHC owns in fee, a clinic and administrative office leased at the Hau'ula Kai Shopping Center, and the newest addition, the first school-based health clinic in the State located on the campus of Kahuku Middle and High School. These facilities are not sufficient to house all of personnel and resources necessary to provide the medical, dental, behavioral health and enabling services currently needed by the residents of Ko'olauloa. In addition, to better serve the community, the HCA would like to establish a permanent community facility to offer various services within one location.


The planned facility will be ADA compliant and will involve clearing the current land, developing infrastructure and building a facility.
