

### I. Background and Summary

### 1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

Since its inception in 1973, Pacific Gateway Center (PGC), a community-based non-profit, has been devoted to empowering immigrants, refugees, (includes human trafficking victims) and low-income residents. Innovative strategies and commitment to providing programs and delivery of social services, economic development and education and training initiatives have helped us achieve our mission of leading these disadvantaged groups to self-sufficiency. Founded by 3 churches in Kalihi (St. Elizabeth's Church, Kaumakapili Church and Aldersgate Church) in response to the influx of Vietnamese refugees to Hawaii after the Vietnam War, PGC's greatest strength has been its adherence to a strong, clear mission.

PGC is Hawaii's Refugee Resettlement Agency, partner agency in Hawaii to USCRI (United States Committee for Refugees and Immigrants) in Washington DC for past 20 years. PGC resettles primarily trafficked victims in farm labor.

PGC administers federal programs such as Reception and Placement, Matching Grant, and Per Capita Programs to refugees (includes human trafficking victims). In general, these programs provide comprehensive case management with a goal of achieving early self-sufficiency. Programs provide basic and core services, cash assistance, enrollment in public benefits, community and cultural orientations, medical, legal, immigration services. 808HALT.com, an outcome of PGC's award as a Rescue & Restore awardee, has online educational outreach videos translated in several languages related to human trafficking. We also provide immigration and notary services and are now attempting to renew its BIA (Board of Immigration Appeals) recognition and having on staff a BIA accredited representative.

Special PGC programs (social enterprises) include its Hawaii Language Bank (interpreters and translators in 30 languages) to ensure language access to the limited-English proficient; Culinary Business Incubator with 11 certified prep and baking kitchens to support small food start-ups that help about 100 entrepreneurs per year of which over 50% are low income; 83 No. King historic Chinatown building for business incubation of The Pig & the Lady, whose owners are a refugee Vietnamese family, and to create jobs; fully-funded ESL and citizenship programs; Nā Kūpuna Makamae, an education and resource center for the elderly, located at the restored, historic Pumping Station in Kakaʻako.

PGC Farms in Kunia currently support 27 trafficked farmers and their families (over 100 with family derivatives) with federal funding assistance; refugee farms are located on Oʻahu, Kauai, and the Big Island. PGC successfully resettled last year one (1) human trafficking survivor on Maui. Support includes land prep, technical assistance, marketing, food manufacturing (value-added products) and financial literacy. ESL and tutoring support for children of trafficking survivors are also offered.

PGC operations are primarily based in Kalihi at 723-C Umi Street, Honolulu but services are also offered at its historic 83 No. King Street building where The Pig & the Lady Restaurant is housed at Lemongrass Café on the ground floor; a culinary educational incubator on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, and English-as-a Second Language and Citizenship classes on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor; at Nã Kūpuna Makamae, an education and resource center for the community's kūpuna located at the historic pump station at 653 Ala Moana Boulevard, and PGC Farms located on leased land in Kunia.

All of our programs collectively service over 5,000 clients per year. Since I/I/2010, we have served close to 700 refugees and their families.

### 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The requested funding for \$ 152,820 is for capital improvement to the architecturally historic 83 No. King Street building (See Attachment A "Historic Building"). The TMK to this property is RP 1-1-7-002-008-0000-000 and it is listed in the Hawaii State Register of Historic Places as part of the designation *Chinatown Historic District*.

### The goals of this request are to:

- A. Ensure proper stewardship of this historically significant building where maintenance and attentive conservation are needed to protect and uphold the exterior and interior of building; and
- B. Uphold the intent of the building and of funders of the building to advance PGC's mission to provide immigration services and job creation to immigrants, refugees, and low-income.

### The **objectives** of this request are to:

A. Correct and stabilize on-going issues with severe water leakage throughout the building on all 3 floors. Most recently, the torrential rains of July 2016 created waterfalls along the Diamond Head side of the building and flooding on all 3 floors necessitating MD Restoration to professionally extract all water (See Attachment B "Water Damage"). Since 2015, PGC has expended \$5,701.17 in roof and gutter repairs and such repairs are without warranties because of the age of the building. The building's brick walls illustrate water marks along the brick walls as evidence of the severe seepage.

PGC has filed 2 claims with insurance carrier, Insurance Factors, for water intrusion but each occurrence was below the \$5,000 deductible. However, with the rainy season, each occurrence of leakage continues to incur damage to the building as well as disruption to business operations of both the restaurant and the school.

The City and County of Honolulu under the HART program installed a new gutter and downspout system in 2015 since it is part of the façade of the building.

B. Create direct access or bridge to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of the building for the public seeking and needing immigration services. The current design of the building offers ADA compliance and access to PGC's 3<sup>rd</sup> floor where classes and services take place by means of an elevator located near the rear of the kitchen accessible either through the dining area or through the loading zone entrance on Smith Street. This arrangement precludes walk-in traffic because of lack of immediate accessibility to 3<sup>rd</sup> floor facilities from the main entrance to the building, and an onerous explanation on how to access the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor that creates confusion for the public. It also presents issues for The Pig & the Lady Restaurant with non-employees meandering through the restaurant areas (dining and kitchen), even when escorted by PGC staff members.

The proposed "bridge" will provide access directly from the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor (there is a stairwell at the main entry) that will lead directly to the bridge that will connect to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor entry. For those needing ADA access, the elevator in the back of the kitchen is always available.

This proposed access way was part of the approved and permitted original Facilities Improvement – Phase 2 of the City and County of Honolulu Contract No. F28624 (see Attachment #C, "Bridge" that show a small section and a plan view of the bridge. It only shows intent so it needs further development by an architect and renewed permit). However this access way was not built as originally conceived due to lack of construction funds.

The estimate for the construction and repair work requested by this proposal is provided by JC Building Group, Inc., License #BC 31142 (see Attachment #D, "JC Building Group Proposal"). Principal owner, James Chan, was contracted to do all the renovations to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor that were funded by the Atherton Foundation in 2013 and completed in 2014 so PGC is familiar with the quality of his company's services and ability to come in on budget and on time. Furthermore, he is a former English language learner and student of PGC when he first arrived as an immigrant to the United States, and a PGC is proud of this client success story.

PGC hopes to increase the number and flow of immigrants and refugees with direct immigration services, e.g., help with USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services) forms, e.g., replacement of green cards, petitions for family members, travel documents, work authorization, citizenship and naturalization, affidavits of support for immigrants, DACA (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals). These services are currently being conducted at our Umi Street site in Kalihi which is not as geographically close to our immigrant constituents and is not near direct buslines.

PGC acquired BIA (Board of Immigration Appeals) recognition status in 1992. BIA permits non- profits with a BIA accredited representative (non-attorney representative) to provide immigration legal services on behalf of the organization's clients before the EOIR (i.e., Immigration Court or the Department of Homeland Security) for nominal charges. Non-profit organizations that are BIA recognized and accredited become critical due to the shortage of qualified legal representatives available to low-income. PGC lost its BIA accredited representative in 2007 but is now positioned to renew its BIA recognition with an application for a qualified BIA representative for accreditation to better serve our immigrant population. There is only one other BIA recognized and accredited organization in Hawaii. The 83 No. King is the most ideally-situated site for these enhanced immigration services.

At our Kalihi site on Umi Street, we currently serve close to 20 clients monthly. We believe that providing easily-accessible services in heart of Chinatown coupled with effective marketing of nominal fees for services and of BIA accreditation and recognition will enable PGC to minimally double its client base.

### 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The current condition of the building is such in which severe water seepage will undeniably recur with future heavy rains.

Repair and construction work as described in the proposal by JC Building Group, Inc., will:

- A. Alleviate hazardous public safety issues for both employees who work in this building as well as the heavy traffic of people who eat at The Pig & the Lady Restaurant and access 3<sup>rd</sup> floor PGC activities. The restaurant serves close to 2,000 people per week and employs 50 part-time and fulltime employees. PGC has approximately 150 students per year, many of whom are seniors and susceptible to fall if safe floor conditions are not present;
- B. Create direct access to critically-needed PGC immigration services by PGC constituents; and
- C. Ensure stewardship of this historic, iconic property documenting the vibrant history of Honolulu's Chinatown and of Oʻahu. This venerated building is an integral part of the Chinatown community's tangible past, present, and future where entrepreneurial activities, economic development and services for the disenfranchised have thrived and prospered to the present day.

The property is currently a 4,155 square foot rectangular-shaped property with a 3-story concrete, brick-and-mortar-constructed commercial building. PGC acquired the building in 2004. Improvements to this 130-year old building are continually being made to maintain its historical significance, preserving and maintaining both its interior and exterior. A grant from the Atherton Foundation supported the renovation of the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor (2013 – 2016) and the Historic Preservation Committee of the Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation provided an award on December 5, 2014 for to ensure conservation of the original façade and front parapet of the building.

The original building, the Yim Quon Building, was erected in 1886 following the 1886 fire in Chinatown. It was one of the first masonry buildings to be erected after the fire. This building survived the second Chinatown fire of 1900 because employees of Honolulu Iron Works climbed onto the roof and kept the flames at bay with fire hoses.

The building was named after Yim Quon who immigrated to the Kingdom of Hawaii from Hong Kong in 1872. He became a naturalized citizen of the Kingdom in 1890. He was the owner of a shoe store, a bakery, and a dry goods store.

The story of this building includes another important Chinese merchant and entrepreneur, Lee Chong, who came to the Hawaii territory from San Francisco in 1885 (See Attachment E "Building History"). Chong founded one of the largest Chinese grocery and merchandise establishments in the territory. In an English translation of a Chinese text of an advertisement of the Yuen Chong Company in the Mun Lun School's 25<sup>th</sup> Commemorative Volume published in 1936, Yuen Chong Company described itself as a firm that

specializes in Chinese and Western groceries and tinned goods, and Chinese and Western fine quality liquors. We are also the agent for Shanghai's Tian Chu seasonings; the flavors are exquisite and delicious. Our prices are honest.

In celebration of the business' 53<sup>rd</sup> anniversary, Yuen Chong announced in February 1939 the grand opening of its new, modernized Yuen Chong Building located at 83 No. King Street.

The daily business that occurred at 83 No. King Street became an integral part of Chinatown's commercial activities during the period.

Lee Chong sought to re-style and modernize the building and selected Honolulu's first Chinese architect, Yuk Tong (Y.T.) Char for the job. Char was very prolific and re-designed or rebuilt many buildings in Chinatown during the 1930's. His reputation preceded him with his notable body of work that included Waikiki Lau Yee Chai Restaurant (1929; demolished), Hilo Chinese Church (1937), Palolo Old Men's Home for Chinese (1937), and the landmark, iconic Wo Fat Chop Sui Restaurant (1938). Earlier works included the Mun Lun Chinese School, Chinese Chamber of Commerce Building, C.Q. Yee Hop Storefront and Restaurant, to name a few.

Y.T. Char was born in Waipahu on August 19, 1890, son of farmers, Fat Char and Chong Shu. His parents immigrated to Hawaii from Kwangtung (today known as Guangdong) province in China in 1890 and 1888, respectively. A census taker at the time recorded that Y.T. Char's parents were working on a banana plantation in Kalihi Uka. He attended and graduated from the Mills Institute (currently Mid-Pacific Institute). He continued his studies at Cornell University's College of Architecture in 1915.

Architect Char had his offices located at 221 Sumitomo Bank building but relocated his office to 83 No. King Street, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, as announced in the <u>Hawaii Chinese Journal (T'an Shen Hsin Pao)</u> of February 3, 1939.

Following a series of successive owners, PGC acquired and become the landowner of the property in 2004. The Atherton grant is making possible a window display at the building site facing No. King Street that will share the history of the building with key documents and photographs for the community's enjoyment. This display is scheduled to open in February/March 2017.

### 4. Describe the target population to be served;

The population of the State of Hawaii in 2015 is 1,431,603 with the vast majority residing (998,714) residing in the City and County of Honolulu. Hawai'i has the third largest immigrant population per capita in the United States, representing 18% of the total state population (2012 stats). Hawaii is ranked 7<sup>th</sup> highest poverty rate in the nation, and, according to the Federation for American of Immigration Reform, Hawaii's immigrants are more likely to be poor than their native-born counterparts.

The target population to be served by this proposal is situated mainly in the Kalihi-Palama-Iwilei-Chinatown a contiguous neighborhoods ending in Chinatown, where most of the clients of PGC reside. They have been identified as areas of priority due to high level of public housing residents, unemployment, and poverty. Each of these areas is comprised of approximately 95% minority groups. It is a persistent poverty area of since 1953, with the building of public housing units. (Summer Economics) CS2006: The History of Public Housing). The government placed 66% of all public housing in the total State of Hawaii within 4 census tracks with a resident population of 24,422. The focus with the census tracks includes Mayor Wright Housing (unemployment rates 10.8%), Towers of Kuhio Park (unemployment rate 8.2%). This gives an example of the unemployment rates in the public housing in the neighborhoods of Kalihi Valley Homes, Hauiki Homes, Pauiki Homes, Pauhala Home I, II, III, and IV, Kaahumanu Homes, Kalanihuia, Kuhio Home, Kamehameha Homes, Kam IV, Kukui Park Terrace Hale Po'ai (E), Marin Towers, Iwalani, Halia Hale and Hale Puahi (Hawaii Public Housing Authority Annual Report 2014-2015, Department of Human Services State of Hawaii) making it the most persistent poverty stricken area of Oahu and has been in that state for over 50 years. It is ethnically diverse with the majority being Hawaiian/part Hawaiian, Samoan, Micronesian, Chinese and Vietnamese. Fifty-seven percent of the families receive public assistance and 72.4% live below the poverty level. The Hawaii Statewide GIS Program (Hawaii Statewide Office of Planning, 2012 American Community Survey). The population speaking a language other than English is 62.1%.

### 5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The 83 No. King building will most directly impact all residents in the City and County of Honolulu who need PGC services on the island of Oʻahu. However, PGC is a statewide organization and can provide services to residents on all islands.

### Pacific Gateway Center

Pacific Gateway Center (PGC) has developed a proven track record since its founding 43 years ago of innovative intervention, effective strategies and delivery of critical-need services to its targeted populations of immigrants, refugees, and the traditionally disadvantaged.

Such accomplishments can be attributed to the leadership and management of PGC. PGC is governed by its volunteer Board of Directors and PGC's Executive Director who is an exofficio member. PGC's board members are professional and community leaders offering expertise in diverse fields of law, government, business/entrepreneurship, education, international disaster management, and social services.

The organization is led by its Executive Director, Dr. Tin Myaing Thein who has held her role since 1997 and has over 30 years experience committed to community and economic development, human rights, and social justice initiatives both locally, nationally, and internationally. She has recently additional experience in stewardship of another historic building in our community as PGC was named awardee in 2015 to restore the historic pumping station in Kakaʻako. It has been restored to its historic significance and is now the site of Nä Kūpuna Makamae, an education and resource center for our kūpuna.

The Deputy Director serves as Project Coordinator with a Master's degree in education with extensive experience in education, training and working with vulnerable populations and PGC initiatives requiring project management, implementation and evaluation. In 2016, she completed all requirements for the Introduction to Immigration Law Practice towards BIA accreditation and successfully oversaw the renovation of the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of 83 No. King.

This core team will be assisted by a financial staff to ensure fiscal responsibility to the project and other staff members, as needed.

PGC has acquired extensive resources, established meaningful, collaborative community partnerships with social service agencies, government, military, agriculture, immigration law, and education just to name a few. Moreover, PGC has been the recipient of numerous community awards for service.

## Business Structures, School Alone Total \$209,000






Figure 1. Honolulu and the  $\_$  Building located at 75 N King Street.




Figure 2. Dakin Map Company 1891, Sheet 4.



The Pig & the Lady is in full support of your proposal to request funding to:

- 1. Repair the roof as a secure and fixed solution to the flooding issue that our restaurant has endured for the past two years; and
- 2. Create better access to immigrant and English-as-a-Second Language and citizenship classes for PGC clients.

The severe water leakage at 83 N King St. building has been a major safety concern for both our employees as well as our customers. When a major rainstorm hits the island, there is always a significant downfall of rainwater (almost like a waterfall) into our first floor dining room, our first floor kitchen (onto the food sometimes), as well as the second floor area. This poses a severe public safety issue as we wish to avoid any slip-and-fall or other injuries.

The direct access bridge is equally supported by The Pig & the Lady. Currently, PGC English-as-a-Second Language, Citizenship classes as well as immigration services take place on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of this building. This necessitates PGC clients having to go through the loading area and the back kitchen entrance for access to either the elevator or the stairwell. The public going through the busy kitchen poses many potential hazards. Oftentimes, these clients also go through the dining area to get to the elevator in the kitchen, and this can be disruptive to both diners and restaurant employees.

We deeply appreciate and fully support PGC's concern and stewardship of the building and its concerted efforts to try to repair the water leakage and to create a better access to services for its clients.

Dear Dr. Myaing,

We are pleased to learn that Pacific Gateway Center will be submitting a Capital Request grant as part of the to the Twenty-Ninth Legislature, Application For Grants FY 18. We understand that PGC will request for funds specifically to preserve and extend the legacy of the historically significant 3-story building in Chinatown located at 83 No. King Street, Honolulu, HI 96819 as well as to allow more direct access for clients to critically-needed services offered by PGC.

As you are aware, our architectural firm, Fung Associates, Inc. (<a href="www.funghawaii.com">www.funghawaii.com</a>), a design firm considered a leader in preservation work, has been engaged by the Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transit (HART) to support its Historic Preservation Committee that was charged with providing awards to historic sites along the rail routes. The 83 No. King Street building was qualified to apply for funds to preserve the originally-designed façade of the building, and PGC's proposal was selected for such an award in December 2014.

Fung Associates, Inc. has been contacted by PGC on many occasions to provide counsel and guidance on the preservation of this building which shows their commitment to preserving the historic character of their building.

We commend and support PGC on its capital request proposal to:

- 1. Seek a more long-term and stable solution to the severe water seepage after heavy rains. We have been asked for guidance and advice on the enduring problem of severe water seepage after heavy rains that affects all 3 floors and poses a public safety issue, especially slip and falls, because of the heavy public use of the building; and
- 2. Create an easier access from the ground to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor as clients seeking PGC services on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor currently must go through the kitchen of The Pig & the Lady to use the elevator to get to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor where services are conducted. There is no immediate access to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor from the main entryway facing No. King Street. We will be happy to review the drawings to ensure they meet the Secretary of Interiors Standards and Guidelines before submitting them to permit.
