I. Background and Summary

The Young Women's Christian Association of O'ahu (YWCA) has a mission "to empower women, eliminate racism and to promote peace, justice, freedom and dignity for all people." The YWCA supports women in building the assets they need to be self-sufficient. These assets may include education and knowledge, a well-paying job, a safe place to live, financial stability, and relationships of reciprocating support.

The proposed project will restore elements of the flagship headquarters, the YWCA Laniākea, at 1040 Richards Street, Honolulu. This facility is home to several programs that improve self-sufficiency and prevent homelessness, including Dress for Success Honolulu and the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership. The facility also supports the greater community with meeting rooms and event space, health and wellness facilities, a restaurant, and a beautiful outdoor courtyard.

Originally built in 1927, Laniākea is listed on both the National and State of Hawaii Registers of Historic Places. The name "Laniākea" translates as "open skies" or "wide horizons," which is appropriate as our goal is to open up new horizons for the women we serve.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The project goal is to renovate architectural elements of Laniākea in order to address safety issues and restore the historic splendor of this building. Laniākea is a three-story building constructed of site cast reinforced concrete bearing walls and structural slabs with a grid of integrated bond beams. Damage to the foundation is the result of leaks and/or high humidity within the crawl space. The deterioration must be addressed or it will compromise the structural integrity of the building. Treating, and sealing/painting concrete surfaces will help protect against weathering and future spalling.

The project objectives are as follows:

- 1. Repair and treat concrete to ensure structural integrity of the building.
- 2. Rehabilitate exterior through concrete repair and painting.
- 3. Preserve unique architectural elements of Laniākea, including the balustrades, iron fencing, windows, main entry and lobby.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose is to ensure that the YWCA Laniākea continues as a place of learning and leadership for women. Within the bustling downtown area, Laniākea is a place of respite, where a woman can come to find a friendly face as well as practical resources and assistance. Women come here to develop the social, life and financial skills they need to build independent lives and avoid homelessness.

Further, the YWCA provides economically disadvantaged women with hands-on work experience and opportunities to develop marketable skills Laniākea. Women are invited to provide community service in various areas of our work, such as supporting the front desk and member services, helping with events, and working at the Dress for Success boutique. Through these experiences, women develop interpersonal skills, learn phone etiquette, learn about merchandising and retail sales, build computer skills, and benefit from being part of a vibrant community.

Current programs and services of the YWCA are:

- The Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership, providing business services to women entrepreneurs, both nascent and established, many of whom are socially and economically disadvantaged. Last year, business training and counseling resulted in 16 new business start-ups and 34 jobs created.
- **Dress for Success Honolulu**, providing gently used career attire to low-income women. Since 2002, more than 6,000 women have been "suited" for job interviews at our Dress for Success.
- **Dress for Success Career Center**, which helps low-income women find and keep good jobs and move up in the workforce. The Center has a fully-equipped computer lab where women can search for jobs, create resumes and attend online trainings.
- Re-Entry and Transitional Housing for female ex-offenders at the YWCA Fernhurst. Residents develop life skills, make friends and build a social network, learn to manage their money, and learn to grow and prepare their own food as part of healthy lifestyles. Last year, 91 women stayed at Fernhurst Residence as part of these programs.
- Health and Wellness Programs serving over 2,000 people each year. From swim
 lessons for toddlers to weight training for seniors, the YWCA encourages every
 individual to achieve their personal potential, regardless of age, experience or physical
 ability.
 - 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The primary target population for YWCA programs is low-income women and families. These women may be female immigrants, including many for whom English is a second language,

survivors of domestic abuse and/or female ex-offenders. The women we serve often have a combination of debilitating life experiences, including lack of education, alcohol or substance dependency, childhood abuse, poverty, bouts of homelessness and other challenges. Most program participants are between 31-50 years of age and about one-third Native Hawaiian. Many are single parents.

Women may be seeking economic stability after a lifetime of welfare dependency. Some are building professional skills to move up and leave the stress of working multiple low wage jobs. Some intend to start a new business. Income is the most basic building block of economic security for women. To borrow a phrase from the Half in Ten Campaign, the YWCA seeks to replace poverty with opportunity, and help each woman achieve success.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Laniākea is located at 1040 Richards Street in downtown Honolulu. The strategic location of Laniākea, in the seat of both the business and government districts, enables the YWCA to address community challenges from the heart of activity on O'ahu. This is truly "the place to be" for women's issues. Readily accessible by bus, the YWCA supports women and families in the urban core, in surrounding areas and throughout the island.

The YWCA will contract Fray Heath of Heath Construction Services, Inc. to serve as project manager. Mr. Heath will monitor and evaluate the progress of the project and provide progress reports and necessary feedback to the YWCA Facilities and Finance Committees.

U.S. Small Business Administration, Office of Women's Business Ownership grant for \$150,000 for the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership. The fifth year of this multi-year contract began on October 1, 2016.

<u>Department of Human Services TANF Maintenance of Effort contract for \$100,000</u> to help reduce dependency on government benefits for TANF-eligible families. The YWCA has renewed this contract each year since 2010.

<u>Hawaii State Legislature Grant-In-Aid for \$520,000</u> for structural and safety repairs to the YWCA Laniākea.

As of December 31, 2016, the total unrestricted current assets of the YWCA of O'ahu was \$1,621,286.

The YWCA has the leadership, administrative and resource capacity to accomplish this project. The organization owns and operates three facilities on O'ahu, including Lāniakea, its downtown headquarters; Fernhurst Residence, a transitional home in Makiki; and Kokokahi in Kāne'ohe.

In recent years, the YWCA has invested in its facilities, using organizational resources, public grants and private funding. We fulfilled capital improvement grants from the Hawai'i State Legislature, Hawai'i Historic Foundation, Harold KL Castle Foundation and Atherton Foundation. Recently completed projects include:

- A comprehensive audit of the Laniākea facility to assess deficiencies and develop a plan for improvements, at a cost of \$54,839 to the YWCA.
- · In-house repairs to fitness area, lobby, second floor loggia, conference area and gym at a cost of \$89,370 to the YWCA.

- Strategic improvements (within the last five years) to support program services and revenue generation at a total cost of \$1,991,601. These projects were funded by various sources, including significant investment by the YWCA.
 - o Information Technology upgrades
 - o Air Conditioning upgrades plan, and tiered installation
 - o Landscaping upgrades
 - o Energy efficient light installation (LED)
 - o Renovations to lobby restrooms
 - o Conferencing hall AV upgrades
 - o Development and upgrades to Dress for Success Career Center
 - o Renovated program areas for Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership
 - o Technology and communications (IT infrastructure) repairs and upgrades
 - o Security systems and cameras installation and upgrades
 - o Rehabilitation of the Midkiff Gymnasium roof at the YWCA Kokokahi

B. Facilities

The YWCA Lāniakea is a beautiful 70,000 square foot facility located on Richards Street in downtown Honolulu. Built in 1927, Lāniakea was designed by Julia Morgan, best known as the architect of San Simeon, Hearst Castle. The landscaping was also designed by a woman, Catherine Jones Richards, who worked on the Honolulu Academy of Arts and Punchbowl National Memorial Cemetery.

The open-air corridors and lush courtyard provide a Hawaiian sense of respite and care in the bustling business district of downtown Honolulu. The facility is easily accessible by city bus, and offers ample street and nearby garage parking. Laniākea has a handicap accessible entryway and many ADA amenities. All areas affecting programs are fully ADA-accessible.

The YWCA is the sole owner of the Laniākea property at 1040 Richards Street in Honolulu. Site control is not an issue.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

The Project Manager will be Fray Heath, President of Heath Construction Services, Inc. Mr. Heath is well qualified to lead this project, having received his education at UCLA with a degree from the School of Engineering specializing in Structural Engineering and Mechanics. He graduated Cum Laude in 1971. He has been a general contractor and project manager in Hawaii since 1977. Recent projects managed by this firm include a \$1.5 million renovation to The Pacific Club and a \$13 million renovation to NIKETOWN retail store in Waikiki.


