Annual report to the Hawaii Legislature on the Safe Routes to School Program

Introduction:

Section 291C-3 Hawaii Revised Statutes requires the Department of Transportation (DOT) to report annually on the status and progress of the safe routes to school (SRTS) program.

The federal SRTS program was created by Section 1404 of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) in 2005 and is a federally-funded program administered by the DOT. It is designed to encourage elementary and middle school aged children to be physically active; make walking and bicycling to school a safe, routine activity; and facilitate planning, development, and implementation of projects and activities that will improve safety and reduce traffic, fuel consumption, and air pollution in the vicinity of schools.

Act 317 signed into law on July 10, 2012 created county-level SRTS programs and established a state SRTS program special fund. A surcharge fee from moving violations is deposited into the SRTS program special fund. The DOT is responsible for managing and distributing funds in the SRTS program special fund.

SRTS Federal Program:

A summary of all SRTS non-infrastructure and infrastructure projects funded with SRTS federal funds obtained under SAFETEA-LU is shown in the attached Table 1 and Table 2, respectively. All ongoing infrastructure projects are in the design phase. For ongoing projects, the amounts shown are the amount of funds awarded and may not reflect the actual cost of each project.

One non-infrastructure project and two infrastructure projects were awarded this year during the fourth round of Call for Applications. The Campaign to Utilize Safe Routes to Wilson Elementary project will develop and distribute school-specific SRTS materials, and expand the JPO program at Wilson Elementary School. The Kailua Bicycle Boulevard Keolu Drive to Kailua Road project will install a bicycle boulevard, widen an existing walkway, and install traffic calming measures, wayfinding signage and new pavement markings near Kailua Elementary School and Kailua Intermediate School. The Kalaheo School SRTS Phase 1 project will install sidewalks and pedestrian crossings near Kalaheo Elementary School.

SRTS Program Special Fund:

In accordance with Chapter 19-109 of the Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) entitled "Safe Routes to School Program Special Fund," the amounts shown in the attached Table 3 have been

distributed to counties to support county-level SRTS programs. Chapter 19-109 of the Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) can be viewed at http://hidot.hawaii.gov/highways/files/2014/03/Chapter-19-109-HAR-Standard-final-Signed.pdf.

The following is a summary of recent county SRTS efforts that used funds obtained from the SRTS Program Special Fund. Counties may have implemented additional SRTS activities that were funded by other sources and therefore not included in the summary.

The City and County of Honolulu is currently in the design phase to install pedestrian improvements near Fern Elementary School, and is developing a process to allow schools to apply for county SRTS funds. The County of Hawaii is partnering with PATH – Peoples Advocacy for Trails Hawaii, a non-profit organization, to implement a youth bicycle and pedestrian safety program, and work with stakeholders on SRTS issues and best practices. The County of Kauai funded a portion of the design of a shared use path near Kapaa Elementary School. The County of Maui installed speed feedback monitors near Lihikai Elementary School, and a channelizing curb system to separate the pedestrian shoulder from the vehicular travel lane near Iao Intermediate School.
