Report on Expenditure of Lump Sum Funds

Act 119, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2015 (Section 28)

Act 119, SLH 2015 (section 28) University of Hawai'i Expenditure of Lump Sum Funds

Section 28 of Act 119, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2015 specifies that \$6,360,818 for fiscal year 2015-16 shall be expended by the University of Hawai'i, with the intent being to prepare campuses for the distribution of the same sum of money for fiscal year 2016-17 that shall be based on performance of the campuses.

All funds were distributed to the various campuses for their use. Attachment 1 identifies these expenditures by campus. Roughly \$3 million was spent on direct instruction, to add sections and courses to help students progress to degree and/or certificate attainment. Another \$1.4 million was spent on counseling, tutoring, and mentoring support for students. Roughly \$800,000 was spent on equipment to support instruction, and nearly \$500,000 was spent on recruitment of prospective students.
