A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE KAHO'OLAWE ISLAND RESERVE COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Through Act 340, Session Laws of Hawaii 1993, 2 the legislature found that the island of Kaho'olawe was of 3 significant cultural and historic importance to the native 4 people of Hawaii. The legislature also found that, due to 5 extensive erosion and other ecological problems, the presence of unexploded ordnance, the existence of archaeological and other 6 cultural and historic sites, and the presence of native and 7 8 endangered flora and fauna, a new management regime was needed 9 to effectively meet the unique challenges of restoring, preserving, and determining the appropriate use of Kaho'olawe. 10 The Kaho'olawe island reserve commission is funded 11 predominantly by a dwindling trust fund created in 1994 during 12 the federal cleanup of unexploded ordnance on Kaho'olawe. 13 14 Although it was a considerable amount, the federal appropriation

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1 As stated in the federally mandated Kaho'olawe island 2 conveyance commission final report to Congress in 1993, "In the 3 short term, federal funds will provide the bulk of the program support for specific soil conservation projects and related 4 activities. In the longer term, however, state revenues will be 5 needed to continue and enhance those activities initiated with 6 federal funds." For over twenty years, federal funding has 7 allowed the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission to establish 8 many innovative programs that emphasize ancestral and 9 traditional knowledge, use a cultural approach of respect for 10 and connectivity to the environment, and integrate ancient and 11 modern resource-management techniques. 12

In 2004, the management and control of the Kaho'olawe island 13 reserve was transferred from the United States Navy to the State 14 of Hawaii, with the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission as the 15 state agency designated to oversee the use and restoration of 16 the reserve. During the past ten years, the Kaho'olawe island 17 reserve commission has been able to develop innovative 18 19 restoration projects that are effective in the extremely harsh conditions of Kaho'olawe and will serve as the foundation for the 20 21 future restoration of the island.



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A fiscal audit of the Kaho'olawe rehabilitation trust fund performed by the office of the auditor in 2013 reported two key findings. First, and more importantly, the trust fund will be depleted imminently. Second, the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission lacks a comprehensive and quantifiable restoration plan with performance measures to gauge whether objectives are being met.

Also in 2013, the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission 8 embarked on the development of a 2026 strategic plan for 9 Kaho'olawe, marking fifty years of occupation of Kaho'olawe by 10 the people of Hawaii and laying out a pathway for the future use 11 and management of the Kaho'olawe island reserve. After a two-12 year effort that engaged Hawaii's residents through numerous 13 community meetings and focus-group sessions held on multiple 14 occasions on each of the islands, the multi-organizational 15 Kaho'olawe strategic planning working group developed an island-16 wide, community-based strategic plan, entitled "I Ola Kanaloa", 17 or "Life to Kanaloa", that addresses the future restoration, 18 management, and uses of Kaho'olawe for the State, the people of 19 Hawaii, and a possible future sovereign Native Hawaiian entity. 20 Pursuant to section 6K-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the 21



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management and control of the Kaho'olawe island reserve will be
 transferred to a sovereign Native Hawaiian entity upon its
 recognition by the state and federal governments. This event is
 anticipated to occur within the timeframe of the 2026 strategic
 plan.

6 Without additional funding, the Kaho'olawe island reserve 7 commission will not be able to continue its innovative 8 management regime. The Kaho'olawe island reserve commission's management and control of Kaho'olawe is not only restoring the 9 ecological damage on Kaho'olawe and protecting its endangered and 10 rare flora and fauna, but is also ensuring that the people of 11 Hawaii who visit the Kaho'olawe island reserve can do so 12 13 meaningfully and safely.

14 The purpose of this Act is to provide funds to the 15 department of land and natural resources for the Kaho'olawe 16 island reserve commission to effectively meet the unique 17 challenges of restoring, preserving, and determining the 18 appropriate uses of the Kaho'olawe island reserve for the people 19 of Hawaii.

20 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much



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thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
 2018-2019 to fund nineteen full-time equivalent (19.00 FTE)
 permanent positions in natural and physical environment (LNR906)
 for the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission.

6 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department7 of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.

8 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 11 2018-2019 for LNR - natural and physical environment (LNR906) 12 13 for the Kaho'olawe island reserve commission for the purposes of promoting water sustainability and photovoltaic powered 14 desalinization on the island of Kaho'olawe. 15

16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
17 of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
18 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
