

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that poor mental health 2 is a growing national concern for college students. College 3 counseling centers are increasingly understaffed. According to 4 a 2011 Government Relations Update by the American Psychological 5 Association: Since the mid-1990s, there has been a noticeable 6 (1) 7 increase in the number of students seeking help for 8 serious mental health problems; Depression and anxiety are consistently the most 9 (2) 10 common mental health disorders treated at college 11 counseling centers; 12 The numbers of students struggling with eating (3) 13 disorders, substance abuse, and self-injury have 14 increased; and Because of the growing need for services, over 15 (4) 16 seventy-six per cent of college counseling directors

reported that they reduced the number of visits for

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1		non-crisis patients to cope with the increasing	
2		overall number of clients.	
3	In a	ddition, a 2016 survey by American College Health	
4	Association reported that over a twelve-month period:		
5	(1)	Nearly fifty per cent of college students reported	
6		feeling hopeless;	
7	(2)	Over thirty-six per cent of college students reported	
8		feeling so depressed that it was difficult to	
9		function; and	
10	(3)	Almost ten per cent of college students seriously	
11		considered suicide.	
12	The	legislature further finds that at the University of	
13	Hawaii at Manoa:		
14	(1)	College is a ripe environment for certain disorders to	
15		manifest;	
16	(2)	The average enrollment is twenty thousand students;	
17	(3)	There are only seven and one-half tenured track	
18		psychologist positions (7.5 FTE), even though the	
19		national guideline is one licensed psychologist for	
20		every one thousand to one thousand five hundred	
21		students;	

1	(4)	The non-urgent waitlist for individual psychotherapy
2		services at the University of Hawaii at Manoa's
3		counseling and student development center begins by
4		September of each year, and at peak times, a wait for
5		an initial intake appointment can range from five days
6		to two and a half weeks;
7	(5)	The counseling and student development center is
8		losing staff as a result of uncompetitive pay, since
9		staff members are leaving to work in private practice;
10		and
11	(6)	There is a need for a case manager to help with
12		consistent follow-ups for student mental health
13		clients.
14	The	purpose of this Act is to advance students' mental
15	health tr	eatment by appropriating moneys to:
16	(1)	Establish and fund three full-time psychologist
17		positions (3.0 FTE); and
18	(2)	Establish and fund one full-time case manager position
19		(1.0 FTE),
20	at the Un	iversity of Hawaii at Manoa.

1 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 5 2018-2019 for the University of Hawaii at Manoa to hire three full-time equivalent psychologists (3.0 FTE) to provide student 6 7 mental health services. 8 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University 9 of Hawaii at Manoa for the purposes of this Act. 10 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 11 12 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 13 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 14 2018-2019 for the University of Hawaii at Manoa to hire one full-time equivalent case manager (1.0 FTE) to provide student 15 16 mental health services. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University 17 of Hawaii at Manoa for the purposes of this Act. 18

1 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
