
A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE OFFICE OF THE LONG-TERM CARE
OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the executive
2 office on aging reorganization of June 2015, the long-term care
3 ombudsman program was reduced in staff to only the director,
4 making Hawaii the only state in the country with a long-term
5 care ombudsman program staff of one. In 1995, a time when most
6 residents lived in nursing homes, the Institute of Medicine
7 recommended a minimum staffing ratio of one full-time paid
8 ombudsman for every two thousand long-term care residents.
9 Currently, Hawaii has over twelve thousand long-term care
10 residents, most of whom live in the community rather than in
11 nursing homes, which creates greater challenges. Under the 1995
12 Institute of Medicine recommendation, Hawaii should have a
13 minimum of six full-time long-term care ombudsmen.

14 The legislature further finds that the long-term care
15 ombudsman program may utilize volunteers. The long-term care
16 ombudsman program has certified close to one hundred eighty



1 volunteers since the volunteer component began in 2001, using
2 considerable time and resources for recruitment, training, and
3 retention; however, as of 2016, there were only eight ombudsman
4 volunteers. Furthermore, volunteers cannot substitute for a
5 full-time, highly trained, paid staff position.

6 The legislature also finds that in addition to visits to
7 long-term care facilities, long-term care ombudsmen respond to a
8 multitude of complaints, engage in investigations, and provide
9 information, assistance, and referrals to long-term care
10 residents and their families. As of 2016, there were 1,405
11 long-term care facilities on Oahu, forty facilities on Kauai,
12 seventy facilities on Maui, and one hundred eighty-seven
13 facilities on Hawaii, for a total of 1,702 facilities statewide.
14 The long-term care ombudsman program lacks staff to visit each
15 facility on a quarterly basis, let alone facilitate resident and
16 family councils, provide more community education, and work more
17 closely with neighbor island county councils and the area
18 agencies on aging. The legislature additionally finds that the
19 long-term care ombudsman program requires resources to ensure
20 that the neighbor islands' kupuna and their families receive the



1 same equal access to the services provided by the long-term care
2 ombudsman program as Oahu has received since 1975.

3 The purpose of this Act is to support the long-term care
4 ombudsman program on the island of Oahu by establishing a
5 program specialist position and allocate funds for contracted
6 services through the office of the long-term care ombudsman in
7 the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui.

8 SECTION 2. There is established within the executive
9 office on aging's long-term care ombudsman program, one full-
10 time equivalent permanent program specialist IV position on Oahu
11 to support program goals and federal requirements.

12 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
14 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
15 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
16 2018-2019 for the long-term care ombudsman program to support
17 the long-term care ombudsman program on the island of Oahu by
18 establishing one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) permanent
19 program specialist IV position and provide funding for
20 contracted services through the office of the long-term care



1 ombudsman in the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui; provided
2 that the appropriation shall be distributed as follows:

3 (1) Office of the long-term care ombudsman
4 for the city and county of Honolulu \$;
5 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE)
6 permanent program specialist IV
7 position;

8 (2) Office of the long-term care ombudsman
9 for the county of Hawaii \$;

10 (3) Office of the long-term care ombudsman
11 for the county of Kauai \$; and

12 (4) Office of the long-term care ombudsman
13 for the county of Maui \$.

14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive
15 office on aging for the purposes of this Act.

16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2070.
