The 'Aha Pūnana Leo, established in 1983, is the sole statewide provider of Hawaiian medium early education. It is a constitutional mandate to protect, preserve and perpetuate the Hawaiian languge, recognized as an official language of Hawai'i along with English.

Ms. Rawlins is uniquely qualified to represent Hawaiian medium early learning providers. She will be responsible for assuring the protection of the Traditional and Customary Right (State Constitution Article XII, Section 7) of family use of Hawaiian for parents raising children in the Hawaiian language. She will also ensure that others wanting an education through the medium of Hawaiian are provided access with support for increasing the number of Hawaiian speaking teachers which has been the number one barrier to expansion of programs. She has been a tremendous asset to our organization having led the organization for nearly 20 years as our Executive Director.

The 'Aha Pūnana Leo is the national leader in indigenous American language early education. We have assisted many tribal organizations in creating Pūnana Leo models as a way to reverse language loss. We have been visited by Navajo, Ojibwe, Mohawk and Cherokee to name a few tribes. We have testified before Congres as expert panelists on Native American languages in education. The US Department of Health and Human Services issued an Information Memorandum in 2015 to clarify the support for teaching tribal languages in Head Start and Early Head Start.

Ms. Rawlins administers the Pūnana Leo's efforts to collaborate and establish working relationships with others around the world who seek to revitalize and support native languages in their homeland. Her skills, knowledge and disposition are distinct assets that make her very effective in establishing and maintaining our organization's initiatives.
