HOUSE BILL NO. 186 HD1 RELATING TO COFFEE BERRY BORER BEETLE

Chairperson Gabbard and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 186 HD1, relating to coffee berry borer beetle. The Department supports this measure provided it does not impact the Department's priorities submitted in the Executive Budget.

The Department's Coffee Berry Borer Pesticide Subsidy Program has helped support coffee farmers on the island of Hawaii to purchase and use two insecticide products that can be effective, in combination with other Integrated Pest Management techniques, in controlling the Coffee Berry Borer. The two products are *Botanigard* and *Mycotrol-O* with the active ingredient of *Beauvaria bassiana*, a fungus that is very specific for insect pest control and is not associated with off-target complications. Both insecticides contain the exact same amount of the active ingredient at 11.3% but one of them is OMRI approved, *Mycotrol-O*, for use on organic farms. This assures that all farmers have access to a product that will aid in combating the pesky beetle.

HB186 HD1 is needed because the original bill enacting the legislation would have sunset on June 30, 2019. The bill adds an additional 2 years to the program which will enable most coffee farmers who want to use the product but who have not yet become aware of the program. The Hawaii Department of Agriculture is continuing to



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reach out to coffee farmers statewide and making them aware that this cost share program exists. The more farmers that have access to the product(s), the more the Coffee Berry Borer will be reduced and assist in area wide management of the pest. This program is available to coffee farmers throughout the islands and comes at a time when the pest insect has been recently discovered on the island of Maui. Moving this bill forward will allow further research to continue into Integrated Pest Management of the Coffee Berry Borer.

You have several bills on today's agenda dealing with invasive species, including HB 186, HD1; HB 481, HD1; HB 1301, HD2; and HB 1339, HD1. Although I am reluctant to single out one bill over another, and defer to your good judgment as to the merits of each, I do want to urge that funding to fight the coffee berry borer beetle (HB186) and little fire ants (HB481) should be approved if at all possible.

Beyond that, I primarily want to thank you for the attention that this issue is getting from you. The Council of Mayors has identified invasive species as a top-priority that deserves all our attention. Even our best efforts are often inadequate to protect our islands from harmful pests, and limited resources make it imperative that we work together in pursuing solutions to what often seem intractable problems.

With the possible exception (so far) of the parakeet problem, it seems that Hawaii County has suffered a disproportionate share of the damage caused by invasive species, including coffee berry borer beetle, little fire ants, coqui frogs, rapid ohia death and probably others. But all our islands, and all our constituents, are at risk. My primary request to you would be "Please don't give up." As a county, we do not have the resources or expertise to fight these devastating invaders on our own. We need as much assistance from you as you can offer.

I am a Kona coffee farmer in the North Kona District of Hawaii Island and am a member of the Kona Coffee Farmers Association. I strongly support the passage of HB186.

The threat of Coffee Berry Borer (CBB) creates a danger that Hawaiigrown coffee will join sugar and pineapple as lost heritage agriculture crops for the State of Hawaii. CBB is now present on three of our islands—Hawaii, Oahu and Maui.

The most effective way to reduce the damage caused by CBB is the application of the fungus Beauveria bassiana. The current HDOA-administered subsidy program for Beauveria bassiana is assisting farmers to develop more effective systems to mitigate CBB damage and to protect the economic viability of Hawaii-grown coffee.

The extension of the current HDOA subsidy through June 30, 2021, and additional funding are reasonable steps toward saving the coffee growing industry in Hawaii.

Aloha Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Riviere, and Members of the Committee:

I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interest of our diverse agricultural community.

Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 186, HD1, which extends the sunset date for the Coffee Berry Borer Pesticide Subsidy Program.

Coffee is one of Hawaii's signature crops; one that helps bring fame and tourists to Hawaii. Coffee Berry Borer (CBB) threatens the entire Hawaiian coffee industry. While the full tally is yet to be made, farms on Hawaii Island have experienced deep losses. Some have failed. Moreover, large quantities of coffee have been downgraded due to insect damage, reducing the value of the remaining crop. CBB is a serious threat to Hawaii's agriculture industry and the state's economy. While CBB is battled worldwide, no other coffee growing origin shares Hawaii's high labor costs and restrictions on pesticides that may be used elsewhere to fight this destructive pest. This places the industry at a competitive disadvantage when compared to the rest of the coffee-growing world.

Fighting CBB is a priority in other coffee-producing countries. The USDA has expressed its support targeted toward research, education and mitigation. The industry's response has been immediate and multi-faceted. A non-profit CBB task force has been formed, including growers, processors, HDOA, UH, USDA and county government. CTAHR and HDOA have been responsive and effective in their combined efforts. Industry has committed countless private sector dollars and has leveraged both State and Federal funds. The State must continue to do its part.

A recent CTAHR economic analysis estimates FY2013 crop losses due to CBB at \$7.68 million, with a resultant \$571,000 annual loss in state tax revenues. The extension of the CBB Pesticide Subsidy Program should be viewed as a modest investment one of the state's largest and most important agricultural industries.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this measure of great importance.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 186 HD 1 RELATING TO COFFEE BERRY BORER BEETLE

The ILWU Local 142 supports H.B. 186 HD 1, which extends the sunset date of the Coffee Berry Borer Beetle Pesticide Subsidy Program until June 30, 2021, for the purchase of pesticides containing Beauveria bassiana to combat the coffee berry borer, and appropriates funds.

The ILWU represents almost 200 workers at Kauai Coffee. They are part of a highly valued industry that not only plays a key role in Hawaii's agricultural economy, but also has a positive impact on Hawaii's tourism industry.

Currently, there is evidence that the coffee berry borer beetle has been found in all four counties. As a consequence, it becomes more important to continue and to ramp up our efforts to better manage the beetle if not eradicate it entirely. Therefore, continuing the current program and providing adequate funding to at least maintain the on-going efforts is imperative.

Passing H.B. 186 HD 1 would also support the Administration's attempt at achieving greater sustainability by increasing the production levels of all crops that are grown locally. Passing this bill will provide for the two-year extension, that would also achieve the five-year period for implementing the original pesticide subsidy program, since it took longer to develop and make the program available to assist coffee growers.

The ILWU urges passage of H.B. 186 HD 1. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this important matter.

Above that percentage and my profits would diminish further, but the high cost of the chemicals to deal with this pest creates a 'damned if I do' or 'damned if I don't' scenario. My neighbors, for example, have already decided they cannot afford to spray without financial help, which exacerbates my problem. Please extend the subsidies to June 30, 2021, so that I can continue to produce Kona Coffee. This help will be greatly appreciated.
