## H.B. 306 H.D. 2, S.D. 1 RELATING TO CONTINUOUS ALCOHOL MONITORING FOR REPEAT OFFENDERS

Senate Committees on Judiciary and Labor & Ways and Means

The Department of Transportation (DOT) **supports** the intent of H.B. 306 S.D. 1 relating to continuous alcohol monitoring for repeat offenders. This bill will mandate drivers charged with operating a vehicle while under the influence of an intoxicant within 5 years of a prior conviction or while being investigated to be fitted with a continuous alcohol monitoring device.

The DOT realizes the beneficial purpose this bill provides as it relates to the repeat offender of drivers arrested for operating a vehicle under the influence of an intoxicant (OVUII). The Administrative Driver's License Revocation Office adjudicated 1,071 repeat offenders in 2015. This represented 17 percent of the number arrested for OVUII. These drivers continued to drive and place others at risk on the roadways. In 2015 of the 93 traffic fatality deaths that occurred, 51 of those that died had positive findings for alcohol and/or drugs.

The DOT recognizes that an initiative such as this could reduce the number of fatalities that are alcohol related. However, the DOT has concerns that this bill might discourage the offender from installing the ignition interlock because the offender would have to pay for two devices. A primary objective of the DOT is to ensure drivers are not able to start their cars after they drink. Repeat offenders who may have alcohol dependency issues will not stop drinking. The continuous monitoring device should be combined with a treatment program to change their behavior.

There are many issues that remain unaddressed in this proposed bill. A few of these issues are:

- Who will be the monitoring authority for the program?
- Who will initiate the action to have the bail forfeited?
- Not enough is known about the SCRAM. Is there an installation fee? Is there an equipment rental fee? Is there a special modern that is required and what are the costs? Is there a download fee for each time a download is conducted? How often is the data downloaded?

• The definition of continuous monitoring is too restrictive and only allows for one type of monitoring system.

The DOT requests that other technologies be given consideration for the monitoring of repeat offenders instead of limiting the process to a single vendor. The DOT also recommends that this bill be referred to the Impaired Driver Task Force for review and to make amendments and recommendations for the 2018 Legislative session. The DOT supports the intent of HB 306 SD 1, but has concerns to the many unanswered questions in the effort to reduce alcohol-related traffic deaths.
