Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 453, which proposes to establish a grant program within the department of agriculture to assist farmers and ranchers in meeting the costs, including audit costs and other expenses of complying with the federal Food Safety Modernization Act, U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations, and state food safety laws. My name is Kyle Datta and I am General Partner of Ulupono Initiative, a Hawai'i-based impact investment firm that strives to improve the quality of life for the people of Hawai'i by working toward solutions that create more locally produced food; increase affordable, clean, renewable energy; and reduce waste. Ulupono believes that self-sufficiency is essential to our future prosperity and will help shape a future where economic progress and mission-focused impact can work hand in hand.

Ulupono <u>strongly supports</u> **HB 453**, which provides grants to farmers for compliance with food safety regulations, because it aligns with our goal of creating more locally produced food.
