Subject: House Bill 637 HD2 Relating to the State Building Codes

I am Gaur Johnson, Chair of the State Building Code Council (SBCC). This bill was only recently discussed during the past two meeting of the SBCC on February 14<sup>th</sup> and March 14<sup>th</sup> of this year. The SBCC was not consulted in regard to, nor was it aware of, this bill prior to it being introduced. As a result of our discussions, the SBCC provides the following testimony in **OPPOSITION of House Bill 637 HD2**.

This bill proposes changing HRS 107-24(f) and HRS 107-28 for the purpose of expediting the review, update, and adoption of the Uniform Plumbing Code as it relates to the Hawaii State Building Codes. Essentially the language shortens the required time frame for adoption of the State Plumbing Code by the SBCC and the counties.

This measure will not be effective in actually changing the timely adoption and update of the State Plumbing Code. The delay in updating the State Plumbing Code and most other codes considered by the SBCC is due to a lack of funding of the executive director and executive assistant positions and other expenses required to complete the Hawaii Administrative Rule making process after the SBCC has approved the technical language of amendments to the national standards such as the UPC. Technical review of the 2012 UPC has occurred and has been approved more than a year ago by the council, however, there are no funds to complete the Hawaii Administrative Rule making process. This means that county adoption timelines have not been triggered. Details regarding the challenges that the SBCC has faced due to insufficient funding since its formation in 2007 are provide in the SBCC's annual report to the legislature (Department Communication 27). <u>I hope that the proponents of this bill will attend future SBCC meetings and coordinate</u> with the council so that we can discuss and jointly pursue effective means for making the <u>code adoption process timelier to best serve the state of Hawaii.</u> Current and previous members of the SBCC understand the frustration that the proponents of this bill must feel but the proposed measure will not accomplish their goal. The current timeline in HRS 107 is realistic and attainable if the council is fully funded so that we can carry out the obligatory Hawaii Administrative Rule making process. This timeline was established during the formation of the council based on what is typical for most other states and local jurisdictions across the nation.

Indeed, it is not practical for the 100% volunteer technical experts who comprise the council to complete this task at a faster rate than is currently specified in HRS 107 especially when funding has not been forthcoming for the executive director and executive assistant positions and other expenses required to complete the Hawaii Administrative rulemaking process.

Thank you for allowing the SBCC to provide this information and testimony in **OPPOSITION** of HB 637 HD2.

Subject: House Bill (HB) 637, House Draft (HD) 2 Relating to the State Building Codes

I am Manuel P. Neves, Chair of the Hawaii State Fire Council (SFC) and Fire Chief of the Honolulu Fire Department (HFD). The SFC and the HFD offer the following comments on HB 637, HD 2, which proposes to expedite the review, update, and adoption of the most current Uniform Plumbing Code (UPC) through amendments to the state building codes.

The bill requires that the State Building Code Council (SBCC) review and adopt amendments to the UPC within one year after it is published by the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials.

Presently, the 2006 UPC is the adopted state plumbing code. Although the amendments to the 2012 UPC have been completed, funds have never been appropriated to the SBCC for staff to guide the UPC amendments through the administrative rule process and provide notice of public hearings. As a result, only the fire, energy, and elevator codes

are on the most current edition, as they have dedicated staff in other state departments to accomplish this task.

We hope this bill sheds light on the necessity for the state to fund the SBCC so all building codes can be updated to the most current edition.

The General Contractors Association of Hawaii (GCA) is an organization comprised of over five hundred general contractors, subcontractors, and construction related firms. The GCA was established in 1932 and is the largest construction association in the State of Hawaii. The GCA's mission is to represent its members in all matters related to the construction industry, while improving the quality of construction and protecting the public interest.

**GCA is opposed** to the passage of this measure as it will require the State Building Code Council to give preference to adoption of Plumbing and water code amendments over any other pending reviews of other model codes, such as the electrical code, fire code and building codes. H.B. 637, HD2, Relating to the State Building Code, would require the State Building Code Council to adopt provisions of an updated Uniform Plumbing Code within one year after it is published by the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials. The bill would also require the various county councils to act within one year of the updated uniform plumbing code is adopted by the State Building Code Council. Current statutes allows the Council to review and adopt any changes as appropriate to new model building codes within eighteen months of publication by the various associations that review and adopt model codes.

While we understand the need to conserve water and to implement practices that promote water efficiency, the expeditious adoption of the Uniform Plumbing Code will not resolve such conservation efforts. Furthermore, current codes allow for water conservation measures to be implemented including gray water proposals. The Department of Health has Guidelines of

permitting gray water use available at <u>http://health.hawaii.gov/wastewater/files/2016/03/14\_Gray\_Water\_GL.pdf</u> The current review process of eighteen months is already tight, given the number and complexity of codes that the Council reviews and adopts. The Council composed of the county planning and building officials and various interested parties usually meets once a month and has no staff and must rely on the staff of the Department of Accounting and General Services clerical and administrative support. The solution to adoption of all codes subject to the Building Code Council's jurisdiction is funding, which has not been provided since the Council's inception in 2007.

Given the critical and often technical nature of the work required to review and evaluate changes proposed in revised model codes, the GCA believes that the review and adoption process is already short and that the Council should be given the discretion as to how and when the various reviews should proceed. The Council also needs time to insure that all interested parties have a chance to comment. Moreover the Council is in the process of adopting the Uniform Plumbing Code together with other Codes to address the recent adoptions of national codes, however have been stalled due to lack of funding, particularly for publication of public hearing notices.

For the above reasons, the GCA recommends that this measure be <u>held</u>. Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this measure.

Aloha Chairs, Vice Chairs, and Members of the Committee:

Hawai'i Green Growth strongly supports HB637 HD2 to review and reform plumbing codes. Adoption of newer codes will promote more efficient designs that take into consideration advances in geological and environmental science. In many cases, these newer codes will expand water reuse and recycling which will support fresh water conservation and recharge.

The quantity and quality of fresh water directly impacts the health, welfare and quality of life of Hawai'i's residents and the affects the economy. Based on global climate disruption, increasingly severe weather and natural disasters, and projected long-term decline of rainfall, there is an urgency to invest in Hawai'i's freshwater supplies. Water conservation is among the least expensive and most efficient ways to increase the available supply of fresh water.

Hawai'i Green Growth partners agreed that fresh water security, including **HB637 HD2**, is an important priority to support implementation on Hawaii's *Aloha*+ *Challenge* 2030 sustainability goals. The *Aloha*+ *Challenge* is a joint leadership commitment launched by the State Legislature (SCR69), Governor, four County Mayors, Office of Hawaiian Affairs and Hawai'i Green Growth public-private partners. This statewide framework outlines six ambitious 2030 sustainability goals in the areas of clean energy, local food, natural resource management, solid waste, smart sustainable communities, and green education and workforce. # Testimony of The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i Supporting H.B. 637 HD2 Relating to the State Building Codes Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental and Military Affairs Committee on Government Operations Thursday, March 16, 2017, 2:45PM, Room 224

The Nature Conservancy of Hawai'i is a private non-profit conservation organization dedicated to the preservation of the lands and waters upon which life depends. The Conservancy has helped to protect nearly 200,000 acres of natural lands in Hawai'i. We manage 40,000 acres in 14 preserves and work in 19 coastal communities to help protect the near-shore reefs and waters of the main Hawaiian Islands. We forge partnerships with government, private parties and communities to protect Hawai'i's important watershed forests and coral reefs.

The Nature Conservancy supports H.B. 637 HD2 that would expedite the review, update and adoption of the Uniform Plumbing Code as it relates to the Hawai'i State Building Codes.

We appreciate that the State Building Code Council (SBCC) does not have sufficient staff and funding and that the Committee on Consumer Protection and Commerce has recommended an appropriation to the SBCC to help address this situation.

Easily available fresh water is not a limitless resource here in the middle of the Pacific. In recent years, several locations in the state experienced prolonged drought. The University of Hawai'i's Rainfall Atlas catalogues fewer trade wind days and declining rainfall over the past century. Temperature records were broken across the state in recent summers and increased heat brings greater evaporation of surface water and soil moisture. Native 'ōhi'a and koa forests that are proving to be better at capturing and retaining rain water and moisture are being impaired by non-native plants like strawberry guava, ginger and albizia.

In response to these conditions, we must plan and implement mitigative and adaptive measures to ensure the resilience of our natural and human systems. One important strategy is to ensure that we have healthy Hawaiian forests that act like a sponge, collecting rain and moisture and delivering fresh water into streams and aquifers. Additionally, we must improve efficiencies and reuse of our fresh water resources. Newer plumbing codes promote:

- More efficient designs, resulting in money saved and water resources conserved; and
- Expanded water reuse and recycling in many cases.

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# Testimony of Michael G. Buck on H.B. 637, HD2 Relating to State Building Codes Senate Committee on Government Operations and Senate Committee on Public Safety, Intergovernmental, and Military Affairs Thursday, March 16, 2017 Conference Room 224

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of HB 637, HD2. I am a member of Hawaii's Fresh Water Council, who unanimously recommended key strategies and policies with an ultimate goal of creating 100 million gallons per day (mgd) in additional, reliable fresh water capacity by 2030. One of the key strategies to achieve this statewide water goal is to increase water conservation by 40 mgd over the next 15 years.

This measure encourages the conservation and efficient use of water resources by expediting updates of the Uniform Plumbing Code. The Uniform Plumbing Code establishes the minimum requirements and standards for the erection, installation, alteration, repair, relocation, replacement, addition to, use, or maintenance of plumbing systems, for the protection of the public health, safety, and welfare. HB 637 HD2 requires:

- The State Building Code Council to review and adopt the amendments to the Uniform Plumbing Code within one year of publication by the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials; and
- The counties to adopt the amendments made to the Uniform Plumbing Code within one year after they adopted by the Council.
- H.B. 637 HD2 provides that if the amendments to the Uniform Plumbing Code are not are not adopted by a county in the one-year, the Code shall become the applicable as an interim county building code.

H.B. 637 HD2 will expedite the adoption of the revisions to the Uniform Plumbing Code published by International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials and help advance Hawai'i's water security goals. For these reasons, I strongly support H.B. 637 HD 2 and urge its passage.

We support adoption of the Uniform Plumbing Code today because it would allow for the systematic re-use of gray water in Hawai'i. Re-using non-potable water in homes and businesses is one of the most significant steps we can take to protect our drinking water resources for the future. The UPC outlines exactly how to install purple pipes to maximize water re-use while also protecting public health and safety.

As this Committee knows, water is life. And for an island community like ours, we cannot import our water from other places. We must do absolutely everything we can to protect and conserve our water resources for future generations. Thank you very much for this opportunity to provide testimony on this important issue.
