HOUSE BILL NO. 790 HD1 RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Chairperson McKelvey and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 790 HD1. The purpose of this bill is to protect the state's environment and residents from unintended impacts of large-scale pesticide use, requiring mandatory reporting of pesticide use, and establishing notification requirements for outdoor applications of pesticides. The Hawaii Department of Agriculture has strong reservations about this measure.

The bill's requirement for prior public notification of outdoor pesticide applicants of any pesticide, whether restricted use pesticide or not, exceeds EPA label requirements without apparent scientific basis. The Bill's requirement for recordkeeping and annual pesticide use reporting for all outdoor applications to the Department for public posting will necessitate hiring of additional Department staff to enforce this reporting activity. Hiring of new staff and maintenance of such a databank would be a strain on existing state funds and would divert limited staff resources from primary enforcement responsibilities. The commercial agricultural entities required to submit this pesticide use information may claim that some of the required information is confidential business information protected from public disclosure under section 92F-13(3), HRS, of the Uniform Information Practices Act, also known as the State public



records law. If the determination is made that the confidentiality claim is justified, that information could not be publicly disclosed.

The Department submits that language in this bill seems to target a segment of the farming community. Although the expressed mission of this bill is to protect children from exposure to pesticides, this bill targets only one segment of the community that uses pesticides. Cases involving potential pesticide exposures to children or near schools were primarily due to pesticide use by homeowners and landscapers. This bill does not seem to address the primary route of exposure that poses the highest risk.

Beginning in January 2017, large farm entities across the state will be participating in the Good Neighbor Program, reporting use of restricted use pesticides to the Department on a monthly basis. Also, contrary to language in this bill, those farming operations participating in the current Kauai Agricultural Good Neighbor Program have, voluntarily, released their RUP spray amounts to the Department by the 15th of the following month in which they were used. The amounts applied are then posted on the Department website, refuting the claim that records are "...only published on the department's website months after the reported pesticide applications". The Department recommends allowing the statewide voluntary program time to become established in order to address the reporting aspect of this bill.

Dear Chairs Creagan, McKelvey, Lee, and Members of the Committees:

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony on HB 790 HD 1, relating to environmental protection. My testimony is submitted in my individual capacity as a member of the Kaua'i County Council.

This measure proposes, among other things, to establish disclosure and public notification requirements for outdoor application of restricted use pesticides in various sensitive areas or by large-scale, outdoor commercial agricultural operations. The intent of this Bill is to protect the State's environment and residents from the unintended impacts of large-scale pesticide use by implementing the recommendations of the Joint Fact Finding Study Group's report. While I support the intent of HB 790, HD 1, not having tracked the issue carefully since the 2017 Legislative Session began, I feel comfortable sharing the following information and concerns:

As one of two Councilmembers who first conceived of a joint fact-finding process as a substitute for the environmental impact statement that was required in the original Bill No. 2491, I am grateful to Department of Agriculture Chair, Scott Enright, Kaua'i Mayor Bernard P. Carvalho, Jr., and former Managing Director Nadine K. Nakamura (who was a Councilmember during the deliberation on Bill No. 2491) for resurrecting the joint fact finding process from the court's invalidation of Ordinance No. 960 and ensuring that the Joint Fact Finding Study was brought to completion. I would also thank the facilitators and participants of the Pesticide Joint Fact-Finding Group (JFFG). While the process was not perfect, a lot of good work was done, and I believe the basic recommendations are sound. Still, translating the recommendations to specific regulations remains a challenging task. It is very important to achieve the goal of protection without unduly

burdening the regulated industry. If regulations go beyond actual protection and cause effort and costs without a corresponding improvement in protection, or if the protection can be secured in a less costly or disruptive way, it is incumbent on those seeking regulation to give consideration to the impacts of proposed regulations on the industry.

Second, disclosure of pesticide applications should be reported on a weekly basis by field so that the location of the spraying is clear. Without identifying in a timely way where the pesticides are applied, the information collected will not be helpful in determining the amount of exposure to spraying, which is a key factor in determining causation or effect — or the lack thereof. When Bill No. 2491 was pending before the Kaua'i County Council, then Councilmember Nakamura and I successfully secured an amendment to the Bill to require disclosure of pesticide use by field on a weekly basis. Certain representatives from the seed companies informed us that because the seed companies keep information by field, it would not be difficult to provide it as part of their disclosure.

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and Members of the Committee:

The Chamber of Commerce Hawaii ("The Chamber") **opposes** HB 790 HD1, which establishes disclosure and public notification requirements for outdoor application of restricted use pesticides in various sensitive areas or by large-scale, outdoor commercial agricultural operations.

The Chamber is Hawaii's leading statewide business advocacy organization, representing about 1,600+ businesses. Approximately 80% of our members are small businesses with less than 20 employees. As the "Voice of Business" in Hawaii, the organization works on behalf of members and the entire business community to improve the state's economic climate and to foster positive action on issues of common concern.

While we appreciate the intent of this measure to ensure public safety, we do believe this bill is not necessary and will only result in additional cost to farmers and the state, and be ineffective in its goal. This bill would also negatively impact commercial agricultural operations and the overall farming community.

We also do not think that this bill which allows counties to add regulations is beneficial to the public. Counties do not have the expertise or resources to regulate pesticides. That authority should remain with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Hawaii Department of Agriculture.

We believe that these safeguards are effective. Last year, the Hawaii Department of Agriculture (HDOA) conducted an analysis of school related pesticide complaints for approximately the prior ten years. Through this analysis, it was determined that allegations of pesticide exposure causing widespread harm are **inaccurate**. The report clearly demonstrated that all but one complaint (that involved a turf operation) were from home use products. According to HDOA, there have been no drift incidents in Hawaii impacting schools from any farms including large-scale agricultural operations.

Aloha Chair McElvey and members of the committee,

CropLife America (CLA) represents the manufactures and registrants of pesticide products that are used for agriculture production. We recognize the need for these valuable crop protection products to be used in a manner that is protective to schools, children and sensitive environmental areas. But we are opposed to HB 790.

While we find many part of this bill to be egregious to farmers, we ask the Chair to – at a minimum – delete section 149A-G on p. 15 which is an attempt to circumvent the authority of the State Department of Agriculture to regulate pesticides.

Farmers in Hawaii – large and small - have been working the land for generations. They have an interest and a responsibility to keep their land safe and healthy for use both today and in the future. Restricted Use Pesticides (RUPs) are tools they use to protect their land from weeds and pests and are part of important Integrated Pest Management (IPM) strategies embraced by the agricultural community. If RUPs could not be safely used, farmers would not use them.

RUPs are restricted in that they may only be applied by or under the supervision of a trained and certified applicator and are not available to the general public. These special applicators are required to follow certain special rules, such as applying only during certain times or at certain locations or leaving untreated buffer areas. That doesn't mean RUPs are necessarily more toxic than other pesticides. Unlike other pesticides, applicators must be recertified by the Hawaii Department of Agriculture every 5 years which helps ensure that these pesticides are applied safely and according to label instructions.

A strong state pesticide regulatory program is essential to assuring the public that valuable pesticide products are used properly. We believe that the legislature has an opportunity to provide that support to the Hawaii State Department of Agriculture through HB 889 which provides them with the funding to strengthen their capacity to regulate pesticides in the state.

Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and Members of the House Consumer Protection & Commerce Committee,

DuPont Pioneer is a seed company with farming operations in three locations in Hawaii. DuPont Pioneer employs approximately 300 people in a wide range of job types on Oahu and Kaua`i. Our farm management practices include the application of science and technology, and innovative farming techniques that include the responsible use of pesticides. Farmers understand the importance of good stewardship practices, including judicious use of pesticides and management practices that reduce pests.

We are opposed to HB 790, which narrowly targets a small group of pesticide users. The larger agricultural users of pest control products are amongst the most highly trained and skilled users, following labels and regulations specific for each product. HB 790 ignores the substantial data generated and rigorous Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approval process, before any new pesticide product can be used. Many pesticides approved for use in organic farming go through this same rigorous EPA approval process for safe use.

Bill 790 creates the "Kauai Good Neighbor Agreement" as a mandatory statewide program. Each EPA registered pesticide product has a specific set of conditions for application, with labels for some products stating required buffer zones. Currently, science-based buffer zones have been established through EPA evaluation and assessment that vary in distance based on product and type of use. Based on federal requirements, tenants of HB 790 are unnecessarily burdensome.

Reporting provisions requiring notifications for each application would be very onerous and difficult to carry out. Bill 790 would negatively impact integrated pest management practices on our farms that allow us to respond quickly and only as needed. Integrated pest management practices rely on scouting for pests to monitor populations, tracking tolerable pest levels on crops, use of biocontrol and other organic pest control methods,

and targeted response only when needed. We handle pesticides in a manner that is safe and consistent with state and federal requirements.

DuPont Pioneer supports all types of agriculture and we encourage policies that enable farmers to thrive. This bill divides the farming community and narrowly targets a small group of well-trained pesticide users. Expansion of mandatory buffer zones could result in unintended consequences to the typical farms in Hawaii that are often 2 to 5 acres. The potential for extension of this bill to other farms and businesses would negatively affect other entities that use organic and conventional EPA registered products to control weeds, insects, and diseases.

HCIA is a Hawaii-based non-profit organization that promotes modern agriculture to help farmers and communities succeed. Through education, collaboration, and advocacy, we work to ensure a safe and sustainable food supply, support responsible farming practices, and build a healthy economy.

HCIA **opposes HB 790, HD 1**, which establishes disclosure and public notification requirements for outdoor application of restricted use pesticides in various sensitive areas or by large-scale, outdoor commercial agricultural operations.

Despite allegations of agricultural pesticides causing widespread harm in Hawaii, the evidence does not support these allegations or the need for additional requirements as outlined in HB790, HD1. Recent studies conducted by the Hawaii Department of Agriculture and Department of Health underscore that pesticide use in agriculture is not the cause of incidences related to school evacuations or surface water contaminations. The Kauai Joint Fact Finding Study Group also found no evidence of health or environmental impacts associated with pesticide use.

The toxicity of each pesticide to humans and the environment is carefully evaluated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency before allowing it to be sold for use. EPA's regulatory oversight of all pesticides manufactured in, imported to, and used in the U.S. includes not only the science-based review and decision-making process but also oversight to ensure compliance with all federal laws and regulations related to pesticides. To require additional notifications and reporting is unnecessary and places increased costs on farmers, at a time when agriculture is already besieged by other challenges.

Kauai's large agricultural operations have already been voluntarily disclosing their pesticide use through the Kauai Good Neighbor Program and have been for the last three years.

Regarding the proposed language in 149 A-G, HCIA believes that including language that may be interpreted as preempting state jurisdiction over pesticide regulation puts all of agriculture at risk. Without a consistent statewide pesticide policy, farmers will be subject to additional pest

pressures and increased costs for crop protection due to une-qual county regulations. Additionally, this measure will hinder the State's ability to control invasive species.

We respectfully request that HB 790, HD 1 be deferred. Rather than create new and arbitrary laws that will make it more difficult for farmers to stay in business in Hawaii, we support the concepts in other pesticide-related bills introduced this session that would give the Hawaii Department of Agriculture increased funding and capacity to more effectively perform their roles, including pesticide education. We believe that a strong state pesticide regulatory program is essential to assuring the public that pesticide products are used properly.

Aloha Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and Members of the Committee:

I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau strongly opposes HB 790 HD1, which would, among other things, allow each county to arbitrarily regulate farmers' use of pesticides, and establish onerous, unmanageable, and unjustified requirements on Hawaii's farmers.

Although HD1 modified the applicability of the notification and disclosure portions of the bill so that it *appears* to only target a segment of the farming community—large growers—in fact, the bill will apply to and affect all farmers statewide because HB 790 HD1 gives authority to each county to enact any pesticide use restriction, despite a lack of scientific basis and independent of federal, state, and other Hawaii counties' regulations.

Although the purported mission of this bill is to protect children and the community from exposure to pesticides, the bill really only targets Hawaii farmers' use, which has not been identified as a source of health problems in the community. The bill expressly excludes threats from misuse and accidents in the home, potential exposures from schools and other institutions' use of pesticide products within their own facilities, and all uses of structural pesticides and those for killing termites.

HFB respectfully opposes this bill for the following reasons:

Pesticides are being used safely and are already strictly regulated

 Pesticides are only registered by the U.S. EPA after thorough vetting for safety, including ensuring protection of communities and sensitive populations. EPA has the expertise to evaluate pesticide products and conducts comprehensive

- evaluations and periodic re-evaluations of each pesticide before allowing it to be sold and used.
- Farmers in Hawaii, like those in California and around the world, use pesticides to protect their crops. These products are strictly regulated by the U.S. EPA and the State Department of Agriculture and are being used safely.
- If there are *any* allegations that a farmer is not adhering strictly to the many mandatory safe usage rules, DOA, and often EPA enforcement agents, arrive promptly at the farm to conduct an exhaustive investigation, enforce corrective actions, and penalize violators.

Unjustified, arbitrary, and non-uniform farming requirements will cause more Hawaii farmers to go out of business

- For many reasons completely out of their control, farmers in Hawaii are already at an overwhelming disadvantage compared to mainland and foreign farmers.
 Hawaii is one of the most difficult places in which to farm for a living.
- Unjustified, arbitrary, and non-uniform farming requirements will cause more farmers to go out of business at a time when the public is demanding more food security and sustainability, and protection of agricultural land from urban development.
- Hawaii is one of the best places on earth for proliferation of destructive and dangerous insects and diseases. Farmers and others must use Integrative Pest Management practices that include the judicious use of pesticides, when appropriate.
- HB 790 HD1 sets an arbitrary threshold for use of certain types of pesticides, triggering State disclosure and notification requirements; however, this threshold does not necessarily exclude smaller farmers from the onerous requirements since the bill doesn't account for acreage. In other words, the amount of pesticides used depends on many factors, including acreage and presence of pests at any given time.

There is no evidence to support the need for this bill – where is the problem?

- Many of the claims made in this measure are inaccurate and misleading. The entire bill contradicts EPA's findings and regulatory programs allowing for safe use of pesticides. It also contradicts facts and data from Hawaii.
- Among others, this statement is false, "...the number of large-scale, outdoor commercial agricultural operations in Hawaii has been increasing." In fact, commercial farms in Hawaii have suffered serious setbacks recently, with several long-standing productive large, medium, and small farms going out of business.
- There is no evidence to support the claims made in this bill. There is no
 justification for these additional and overwhelmingly burdensome requirements
 on our farmers.
- Monitoring studies at Waimea Canyon Middle School, and other Kauai locations, show that the air quality is well within the strict health-based screening levels established by regulatory authorities. The often-cited school incident at Waimea Canyon Middle School that caused students to be evacuated, was determined by state officials NOT to be caused by pesticides.
- The Hawaii DOA and DOH have undertaken environmental monitoring studies to obtain more data to add to previous studies, which all demonstrated that pesticides are *not* causing health or environmental impacts in our state.

- The cost of sharing product and specific use information, mandatory no-pesticide zones, and potential litigation will substantially increase farmers' costs without any increase in public safety.
- Other states have considered some of the requirements proposed in this bill and have rejected them due to the lack of benefit to the public and prohibitive cost to farmers and the state.
- A DOA review of the few pesticide drift incidents in Hawaii over the last decade or so, that impacted a school, found that *farmers' use of pesticides was not the problem* (in one case, a turf grower misapplied a product, the others were homeowner-related). The proposed buffer program would not protect schools from incidents like these which were caused by homeowners' misapplication of products.
- The *voluntary* Good Neighbor Program for large agricultural operations has been successful on Kauai and there is no justification for making it mandatory.

Arbitrary buffer zones are unnecessary and hurt agriculture

- The EPA conducts a thorough scientific analysis of each pesticide before allowing it to be marketed and used. If needed, EPA already mandates specific buffers or other use restrictions as part of the legally enforceable product use requirements.
- Hawaii farms are very small in comparison to mainland farms. Taking a portion
 of a farm out of production could have devastating effects on the farm's ability to
 remain viable.

Counties are not equipped to make and enforce pesticide laws

- In order to have safe and productive farms and ranches to provide food, flowers, and other agricultural products, not to mention the beautiful vistas Hawaii's residents and visitors expect, farmers must conduct their work under uniform and scientifically valid pesticide regulations.
- The U.S. EPA and the Hawaii Department of Agriculture have the expertise and resources to ensure that pesticides are regulated properly and that pesticides are used safely. The counties do not have this expertise nor the resources to put into place an effective regulatory and enforcement system.

Let's take real and proactive measures to protect children and others from pesticide exposure

- If the purpose of this measure is to better protect children from possible pesticide exposure, we should focus efforts on schools and in homes, where pesticide misuse could more likely occur.
- The State could implement an Integrated Pest Management program at each school. Schools themselves are not required to post notices regarding their own pesticide applications or to notify parents in advance.
- HFB has been requesting adequate funding for programs run by University of Hawaii and HDOA to provide additional education and training to farmers, especially immigrant farmers, on effective Integrated Pest Management systems.
- Since pesticide poisonings are often due to homeowners' lack of diligence in storing products away from their children, DOA and DOH can reinvigorate their pesticide home safety programs to help prevent these accidents.

HFB is extremely concerned that the layering of more and more unjustified and inconsistent restrictions and requirements, along with the threat of frivolous lawsuits, will make it nearly impossible to farm successfully in Hawaii, and will deter young people from entering farming altogether.

Thank you for your careful consideration of our comments in strong opposition to HB **790 HD1**, and for your support of Hawaii's farmers and ranchers.

Chair McKelvey, and Members of the House CPC Committee:

I am Larry Jefts, owner and operator of Larry Jefts Farms, LLC, which is part of our family-run business of farms on Oahu and Molokai, under the administrative umbrella of Sugarland Growers, Inc. We have more than 35 years of Hawaii farm experience on Molokai and Oahu.

As a commercial agricultural entity providing residents with nearly 1 million pounds of fresh produce a week, we use the tools of Integrated Pest Management, general and restricted use pesticides, to include organic pesticides when necessary to grow produce that is competitive with imported mainland produce.

Concerns about pesticide application and safety of employees and surrounding neighbors are a common concern of farmers, families and policy makers. Ongoing discussions about the safety of pesticide applications as a means of reducing the risk of exposure have prompted our comments from a farm perspective.

Responsible and licensed pesticides application is a necessary tool for agriculture production in Hawaii where the year-round tropical climate is ideal for insects, fungus and other plant disease. Even certified organic farms use non-synthetic pesticides to control pests.

As responsible farmers, we use pesticides that are registered by the US EPA, which have been vetted for safety and ensure protection of communities, farm workers and sensitive populations. We follow federal and state requirements for application and reporting.

This bill, which states purchases or use in excess of 10 pounds or 10 gallons annually of restricted use pesticides, unfairly targets large-scale farm production because generally speaking, the larger the farm production acreage, the larger the pesticide application.

Large-scale farms have strict pesticide protocols, licenses applicators and are at financial risk and of losing commercial licenses due to any non-compliance issues.

- Small-scale farms will have less annual use or purchase of pounds or gallons of restricted use pesticides but are often at the greatest risk for non-compliant pesticide applications and increased exposure to risk.
- We suggest that pesticide application be thought of in terms of pounds of production yield.
 Comparatively, organic farmers use far more pesticides because their production yield is less.

We note that HB790hd1 broadens the requirement of mandatory disclosure and notifications to schools, child care facilities and family child and group child care centers. It does not include residential users, who are often the cause of misapplication of products and are in proximity to sensitive populations. It does not include termite building exterminators, landscapers or golf courses in proximity to sensitive populations. All of these entities should be included in the mandatory disclosure and notification requirement if the true intent is to protect the community and workers.

We strongly oppose the bill's proposal to allow the 4 Counties to regulate pesticide disclosure, notification and use including buffer zones. The US EPA and the Hawaii Department of Agriculture have the expertise and resources to ensure the appropriate regulatory oversight of pesticide use that is uniform and standard for all agricultural producers in the State. The Counties do not have the resources or expertise for this.

The loss of responsible and legally approved general and restricted use pesticides due to buffer zones and the prohibition of pesticide application based on what seems to be non-science based rationale will make Hawaii-grown produce non-competitive with produce imported from the mainland and international sources.

This is highly ironic when the State of Hawaii is concerned about increasing its ability to grow food to feed its 1.3 million people, which is anticipated to grow to 1.7 million according to DBEDT's Population and Economic Projections for the State of Hawaii to 2040 report.

A standard distance buffer zone does not fit all. The EPA concluded this in its 2014 response
to the petition to protect children from pesticide drift and stated that it is not scientifically
defensible.

Comments: I am writing to urge your strong support of HB 790. This bill requires that the state protect our keiki's health by requiring disclosure and notification of toxic pesticides around schools, healthcare facilities, childcare facilities, elder care facilities, and other environmentally sensitive areas (as in anywhere human life exists). I am deeply concerned with the effects long-term pesticide application and pesticide drift are having on our keiki at schools. According to a 2012 report by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) entitled "Pesticide Exposure in Children," children exposed to chronic, low-level exposure to Restricted Use Pesticides are at a risk of neurodevelopmental disabilities like autism and ADHD, as well as leukemia and asthma. Currently there are at least 27 schools in Hawai'i located within a mile of fields where agrichemical companies like Monsanto and Dow Chemical spray restricted-use pesticides. Our keiki and faculty in these schools are at a heightened risk of exposure to pesticides that drift from these industrial operations. Testimony in support of HB790 2/27/17 Will Caron On Behalf of Young Progressives Demanding Action – Hawai'i

To the honorable chair Angus McKelvey, vice chair Linda Ichiyama and members of the committee,

On the southwestern side of Kaua'i, Waimea Canyon Middle School, a health clinic and a veterans' hospital all line up in front of a GMO test field operated by Syngenta. Steady northeasterly trade winds averaging between 8 and 9 mph blow almost daily across the test fields and into town. In two incidents in 2006 and 2008, students at the Waimea school were evacuated and about 60 were hospitalized with flu-like symptoms including dizziness, headaches and nausea.

A study detected traces of the toxic pesticide chlorpyrifos in the air both inside and outside the school. Chlorpyrifos is one of seven restricted-use pesticides consistently sprayed by the four transnational agribusinesses that use Kaua'i fields to test both their GMO seeds and the chemicals they are designed to be paired with. The companies claimed that chemicals emitted by stinkweed where to blame for the bouts of illness, but that chemical is found in the air at similar concentrations elsewhere on the island and have never caused any health problems. Moreover, the concentrations of airborne pesticides were found at much higher levels in Waimea than elsewhere on the island.

Some of the pesticides in use on the test fields around Waimea are toxic enough to pose a serious health threat to its population of roughly 1,900, even when used according to directions. These are classified as "restricted use pesticides," meaning they are more tightly regulated by the Environmental Protection Agency than "general use pesticides."

In response, the county passed Ordinance 960, which imposed buffer zones prohibiting the use of these restricted use pesticides within varying distances of neighboring properties. On August 25, 2014, the federal district court for Hawai'i vacated Kaua'i County's law. Now it is up to the state to implement this common sense safeguard for the environment and for public health. YPDA Hawai'i supports legislation at the state level aimed at reinstating these buffer zones across all four counties.

Kaua'i is Ground Zero for the intense domestic political battle over genetically modified crops. But the fight isn't really about the merits or downsides of GMO technology. It's about pesticides. The four transnational agribusinesses that are experimenting with genetically engineered crops on Kauai have transformed part of the island into one of the most toxic chemical environments in all of American agriculture.

For the better part of two decades, Syngenta, BASF Plant Science, DuPont Pioneer and Dow AgroSciences have been spraying their test fields near Waimea with some of the most dangerous synthetic pesticides in use in agriculture today, at an intensity that far surpasses the norm at most other American farms, an analysis of government pesticide databases shows. Each of the seven highly toxic chemicals most commonly used on the test fields have been linked to a variety of serious health problems ranging from childhood cognitive disorders to cancer. And when applied together in a toxic cocktail, their joint action can make them even more dangerous to exposed people.

The restricted-use chemicals used most heavily on the GMO test fields of Kaua'i are alachlor, atrazine, chlorpyrifos, methomyl, metolachlor, permethrin and paraquat. The annualized per-acre usage of the bug-killers chlorpyrifos and permethrin on Kaua'i is the highest in the nation and significantly greater

than in California, which leads all mainland U.S. states. In total, the usage of these chemicals on Kaua'i is more than 10 times greater than the national average.

Six of the seven restricted-use pesticides are suspected of being endocrine disruptors, which can cause sexual-development problems in humans and animals, according to the EPA, including atrazine, a Syngenta product. Tyrone Hayes, an endocrinologist at the University of California-Berkeley whose reputation has been viciously attacked by Syngenta, has raised particular concerns about the potential gender-bending effects of even tiny amounts of atrazine.

Four of the seven heavily used restricted pesticides are also suspected carcinogens. And between them, the seven have been linked to, among other things, neurological and brain problems and damage to the lungs, heart, kidneys, adrenal glands, central nervous system, muscles, spleen and liver. The public has many other reasons to be wary of these chemicals. One of the suspected carcinogens, the bug-killer permethrin, is also thought to be toxic to the kidneys and liver, as well as to reproductive and neurological systems.

Alachlor degrades into about 20 metabolites, five of which are carcinogenic. At just five parts per billion, alachlor can cause a rare form of cancer of the lining of the nose, according to *Poison Spring: The Secret History of Pollution and the EPA* (Bloomsbury Press, 2014), a personal memoir by E. G. Vallianatos, drawn from his 25-year career in the EPA's Office of Pesticide Programs. Paraquat, a weed killer, is neither a suspected carcinogen nor endocrine disruptor, bit is so toxic that it has been banned in all of Europe because of evidence linking it to Parkinson's Disease. Finally, the bug-killer methomyl, like chlorpyrifos, is a neurotoxin that affects brain functions.

The EPA knows little about the synergistic effects, or combined toxicity, of multiple chemicals when people are exposed to them at the same time. But it recently observed that the joint action of atrazine and chlorpyrifos can result in "greater than additive toxicity." In another example, the combined action of the insecticides permethrin and chlorpyrifos has been shown to be "even more acutely toxic" than the sum of each, according to Vallianatos' book.

Combine these chemicals together and the effects are aggravated, especially in the developing bodies and brains of children and fetuses. In other words, the whole cocktail can pack a bigger punch than the sum of its ingredients.

As if all that weren't bad enough, there's reason to believe that the chemical companies might be violating federal rules about the application of the restricted-use pesticide products on Kaua'i. The rules are supposed to ensure that the pesticides do their damage to bugs and weeds, not kids.

Consider Dow's Lorsban, which consists of about 45 percent chlorpyrifos. Lorsban is the single-most heavily applied restricted-use pesticide product used on the Kaua'i test fields. The EPA prohibits its application whenever the wind blows greater than 10 mph. The average wind speed in Waimea is between 8 and 9 mph, according to the National Weather Service, meaning that on many days the spraying of Lorsban might not even be legal.

When the Waimea school was tested for chemicals several years after the kids grew ill and had to be evacuated, chlorpyrifos—Lorsban's active ingredient—was still present inside and outside the building, although at levels "well below health concern exposure limits." However, some still fear that its use in the fields contributed to the need to evacuate the school.

Although it took scientists 30 years to detect the link between chlorpyrifos and cognitive problems in children, more troubling connections between agricultural chemicals and childhood development are being established. The American Association of Pediatrics contends that "a growing body of epidemiologic evidence" points to "associations between exposure to pesticides in young children and a range of diseases from childhood cancers to autism."

For decades, researchers have been publishing reports about children who died or were maimed after exposure to chlorpyrifos, either in the womb or after birth. While chlorpyrifos can no longer legally be used around the house or in the garden, it is still legal to use on the farm. But researchers are finding that children aren't safe when the insecticide is applied to nearby fields.

Chlorpyrifos belongs to a class of pesticides known as organophosphates, which are designed to interfere with the way insect brains operate. They can also interfere with human brains. A 2000 EPA review of "incidents" caused by chlorpyrifos in an urban setting notes, "Children under six were three times more likely to be hospitalized, five times more likely to be admitted for critical care in an intensive care unit (ICU), and three times more likely to have experienced a life-threatening outcome or death when exposed to an organophosphate than when exposed to non-organophosphate pesticides."

"Toxic exposure during this critical period can have far-reaching effects on brain development and behavioral functioning," said Virginia Rauh, a professor at the Columbia University's School of Public Health. "Some small effects occur at even very low exposures."

In 2008, another Columbia University study of 265 children found that, after pregnant women were exposed to chlorpyrifos, their babies had a lower intelligence rating. In 2011, researchers at the Mt. Sinai School of Medicine in New York linked chlorpyrifos to a reduction in a child's ability to solve problems.

From 1998 to 2011, the CHAMACOS (Center for Health Assessment of Mothers and Children of Salinas) studies were conducted on farm workers near Salinas, California. The studies examined associations between prenatal and postnatal exposure to low levels of organophosphate pesticides like chlorpyrifos and cognitive abilities in school-age children. The studies found that higher concentrations of chlorpyrifos in the mothers' urine were linked to declines in working memory, processing speed, verbal comprehension, perceptual reasoning and IQ of their children. Children of mothers with the greatest urinary concentrations had an average deficit of seven IQ points compared with those in the lowest concentrations—the equivalent of being a half-year behind their peers, according to *The Nation*.

In California, quarter mile buffer zones around schools were put in place in two of the state's agricultural counties (Tulare and Kern) when local residents documented contamination in school air using PAN's Drift Catcher. The communities worked closely with Californians for Pesticide Reform to mount an effective campaign and win the protective buffer zones. Rates of illness connected to chemical exposure have significantly been reduced following implementation of these buffer zones.

We know that these chemicals are extremely dangerous—particularly to children. Even in an agricultural setting, these chemicals can have severe adverse effects on nearby, sensitive instillations like schools and hospitals. Creating a reasonable buffer zone around these fields is a matter of public health and safety, and it is now up to the state to protect its people. Please do the right thing: pass this bill out of committee and give it your full support going forward.

Hawai'i Center for Food Safety strongly supports: HB790 HD1

Dear Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Ichiyama, and members of the Committee,

My name is Dr. Ashley Lukens and I am the Hawai'i Director for the Center for Food Safety (CFS). CFS is a nationwide public interest, sustainable agriculture nonprofit organization whose mission centers on furthering the public's right to know how their food is produced, through labeling and other means. We have over 800,000 farmer and consumer members across the country, including nearing 10,000 in Hawai'i. On behalf of CFS and our members, I thank you for the opportunity to speak to you today regarding this important bill.

CFS has been dedicated to addressing the human health and environmental impacts of our increased reliance on pesticide use in agriculture, both in the State of Hawai'i and nationally. We were instrumental in providing legal and communications support in the passage of numerous ordinances relating to pesticide use and disclosure, such as Kaua'i's Bill 2491. Since 2014, as the inaugural director here in Hawai'i, I have worked closely with community members across the state, in all counties, and have played an instrumental role in the passage of Maui's moratorium on GE production until companies submit environmental and public health impact assessments.

I am also a former adjunct professor of Political Science at UH Mānoa and UH West O'ahu, where I have taught classes on food, agriculture, and policy from 2006-2014.

I am writing in strong support of HB790, which requires that the state protect keiki and kupuna health by requiring notification and disclosure of toxic restricted-use pesticides around sensitive areas like schools.

Modeled after the "Kauai Good Neighbor Program," this voluntary program was recently "expanded" by the Department of Agriculture so that companies operating on Oahu, Molokai, and Maui will have better access to data on pesticide use. To note, both KGNP and its yetlaunched expansion are voluntary programs. Although a good stepping-stone, voluntary programs are an unreliable compromise to mandatory disclosure. The data is not verified by any party nor mandatory for timely submission which leads to uncertainty at the validity of reporting.

Despite these shorecomings the Kaua'i Good Neighbor Program data show that, between

December 2013 to November 2016, 6,121.3 gallons and 5,102.34 pounds of concentrated restricted use pesticides were applied on Kaua'i by the five participating companies (Syngenta, DuPont-Pioneer, Dow AgroSciences, BASF and Kaua'i Coffee). The companies applied these restricted use pesticides to some portion of the **12,500 acres** they own or lease on Kaua'i. However, this program does not provide site-specific information regarding where the various restricted use pesticides were applied.

This measure, by mandating the timely disclosure of pesticide information to communities, acknowledges to the community's right to know about the chemicals applied where they live, work, and play, and takes seriously the need to put this requirement into statue so that the community feels the government is playing its proper regulatory role.

It is here that I want to distinguish acute exposure from chronic exposure and discuss the different regulatory burden of each. Recent Department of Agriculture initiatives to address community concerns about the risks of pesticides are designed to address pesticide "incidents" – that is, one-time (acute) exposure to large amounts of a pesticide, resulting in nausea, vomiting, difficulty breathing, and similar symptoms. These incidents are important and headline-grabbing. In 2016, 10 Syngenta field workers were hostptialized on Kauai after being exposed to chlorpyrifos – an insecticide so toxic that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency banned home uses 15 years ago, and early this year proposed to prohibit farm spraying as well. We also know of the many schoolchildren sickened in various pesticide drift incidents at Waimea Canyon Middle School, including some sent to the emergency room. And it's not just Kaua'i. Dozens of students and staff were sickened by off-school use of chemicals (most likely pesticides) at Kahulu'u Elementary School. These are just a few of many pesticide poisoning incidents that have occurred in the state. Many more likely go unreported.

We know acute exposure to pesticides is a problem, and that in some cases it can lead to lasting health impairment. So the state's initiatives to educate homeowners about pesticide use, form rapid-response teams to better respond to pesticide poisoning episodes, and educate physicians to recognize symptoms of pesticide poisoning, are all welcome. But they are far from being enough. This is because the recent DOA initiatives do nothing to address the disease burden from chronic exposure to pesticides, as documented in the medical literature.

I cannot stress enough that mitigating potential chronic exposure through disclosure and notification takes a precautionary approach towards protecting the future of our keiki by providing doctors and the community with the necessary data they need to determine if adverse health outcomes in Waimea are linked to increased pesticide use by the GE Seed industry. Children can be exposed to pesticides applied on school grounds, pesticides that drift

onto school grounds from neighboring agricultural lands, or from pesticide residues.^{1,2} It is critical that the state take action to reduce childhood pesticide exposure because toxic exposure to pesticides during fetal,³ neonatal,⁴ and infant life can disrupt critical developmental processes.⁵ Early life pesticide exposure has been linked to long-term health effects including cancer,⁶ decreased cognitive function,^{7,8,9} behavior problems,^{10,11} birth defects and other adverse birth outcomes,^{12,13} and asthma.¹⁴

Specifically, according to a 2012 report by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) entitled "Pesticide Exposure in Children," children exposed to chronic, low-level exposure to restricted

used pesticides are at a risk of neurodevelopmental disabilities like autism and ADHD^{15,16,17,18}, leukemia^{19,20,21}, and asthma^{22,23,24}.

Chronic exposure is the expected outcome when a company sprays pesticides year-round, two of three days, up to 16 times a day, as is done for example by DuPont on Kauaʻi. i

Exposure is all the more likely under windy conditions (spray drift) and when it's still and hot (vapor drift). Although spraying is often officially prohibited under such conditions by on-label warnings, there is abundant evidence that it occurs, and occurs frequently, nonetheless. Pesticides can drift onto children playing out of doors, and can even infiltrate homes and classrooms.

Chronic exposure to pesticides is not effectively mitigated by forming interagency rapidresponse teams, educating homeowners, or resolving discrepancies in birth defects registries. Lessening exposure to pesticides requires full implementation of the measures recommended by the <u>Joint Fact-Finding Study Group (JFF)</u>, a committee of experts that undertook a year-long

investigation of the impacts of pesticide use by the GE seed industry and Kaua'i Coffee on Kaua'i. The JFF recommended that Governor David Ige and state agencies "undertake a major update to Hawai'i's pesticide laws and regulations." Recommendations included setting lower exposure limits for chronic exposure to hazardous pesticides; mandatory public disclosure of pesticide use by all large users; and establishment of a consistent, no-spray buffer zone policy around schools and other institutions where people congregate. HB790 is therefore a critical first step in ensuring that the State protect our keiki.

Last week, at a Senate Hearing on a similar measure, Dr. Lee Evslin, a member of the Kauai Joint Fact Finding Group testified:

"We found the Westside community to be one the least healthy communities in the state by many health measures. Our concern was heightened by increases in developmental disorders in children in these Westside Communities as compared to the other communities on Kauai. We also very clearly pointed out that due to the small population and the virtual lack of any environmental or biologic monitoring, we could not say with any certainty what was causing these adverse health findings. Our conclusion was that if any community in Hawaii wanted to really know if they are being affected by pesticide exposure there needs to be adequate testing of the environment and the population for pesticide exposure. This monitoring should be funded and there should be oversight and coordination of these studies and other efforts by a balanced, science- oriented pesticide committee."

Indeed, the direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts on public health regarding the long-term intensive commercial agriculture and associated use of pesticides have not been properly or independently evaluated. Existing federal and state oversight of pesticide exposure do not take into account chronic exposure to local pesticide use. Information pertaining to the intensive use of pesticides in large-scale commercial agriculture within the State is not readily available to the public. Thus, the public is unable to evaluate the full extent of negative impacts accruing to the residents and environment of Hawai'i.

The people of Hawai'i have the right to decide that the risks associated with the use of toxic pesticides in commercial agriculture are unacceptable, and take action to reduce and prevent the potential negative impacts of such use. Mandatory public disclosure of pesticide use, given the pesticide practices of the growing GE Seed Industry in Hawaii is a common sense next step in ensuring that the health of our communities is not sacrificed for industry profit.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony, and I am happy to provide further analysis or respond to any follow-up questions from the Committee.

On behalf of HFRU I'm here today to advocate for our Right to Farm on behalf of Hawaii Island agricultural producers. Collectively, we represent 97% of all agricultural revenue on Hawaii Island; \$194 Million out of a total of \$202 total agricultural revenue, and almost 3,000 farmers and ranchers working on 630,000 acres of land.

We are opposed to HB 790 for many reasons. Primarily requiring the Good Neighbor Program to become Mandatory; burdening the farmers who can least afford it. In addition, mandatory buffer zones if needed are already being in place under Federal law based on the need of the specific crop protection method being applied.

The large scale agricultural operations are already reporting voluntarily. Why harm smaller farmers who are least able to comply with added regulation. Agriculture is already heavily regulated with more than 30 agencies having oversight of the average farm. There has been no indication of harm in any scientific based study or fact finding that reflects harm from farmers, so why are you allowing agriculture to be targeted again?

TESTIMONY FOR HOUSE BILL 790, HOUSE DRAFT 1, RELATING TO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

Honorable Chair McKelvey and committee members:

I am Kris Coffield, representing IMUAlliance, a nonpartisan political advocacy organization that currently boasts over 350 members. On behalf of our members, we offer this testimony <u>in strong support</u> of House Bill 790, HD 1, relating to environmental protection.

In the debate over regulating local agriculture, there is one thing that everyone should agree to condemn: causing harm to other people.

Unfortunately, Hawai'i's pesticide code allows chemical abuse to go unchecked. Today, the Department of Agriculture must warn pesticide abusers before investigating potential legal violations. A farm that fails to take caution when using harmful chemicals, therefore, may suffer no consequences for its actions, since the warning will give owners ample time to hide any evidence of their crimes. Even when caught, chemical criminals face minimal penalties. State law currently grades pesticide abuse as a misdemeanor offense, meaning farm operators who apply dangerous doses of restricted use pesticides are met with a maximum one-year prison sentence.

In the islands, pesticide misuse poses major health risks. According to an investigation conducted by the *Cascadia Times*, pesticide application by four large agrichemical companies on Kaua'i–Syngenta, BASF Plant Science, DuPont Pioneer, and Dow AgroSciences—is ten times the national average. In their report, *Cascadia* found that a number of restricted use pesticides were overused, including chlorpyrifos, atrazine, and paraquat. A study published in the medical journal *The Lancet Neurology*, in March of 2014, found that the neurotoxin chlorpyrifos led to developmental disabilities in children. Similarly, atrazine and paraquat are banned in the European Union. Atrazine is known to contaminate groundwater supplies, while paraquat has been linked to the onset of Parkinson's disease. Yet, both herbicides remain widely popular in the United States,

where the Environmental Protection Agency has prematurely declared with "reasonable certainty" that neither carry a significant risk of harm.

Pesticide abuse is not limited to the outer islands. On O'ahu, IMUAlliance has provided services to cancer-stricken sprayers of restricted use pesticides, some of whom have are also victims of labor trafficking. Not only were our clients provided with little to no information about the health risks of the pesticides placed in their hands, they were not given equipment to protect themselves from harm.

To protect against pesticide drift impacting sensitive educational areas and making children ill—as happened in 2007 at Kahuku High and Intermediate, in which a dozen students fell ill when a nearby sod farmer ignored windy weather while applying pesticides, and in 2008 in Waimea on Kaua'i, where dozens of students got sick after farmers applied pesticide on a nearby seed corn plot—it is incumbent upon lawmakers to pass legislation establishing buffer zones around schools from which the application of pesticides is restricted. We urge local lawmakers to also pass legislation eliminating all warning notice requirements from the state's pesticide code. That way, investigators will be able to fully probe allegations of noncompliance without tipping off their targets.

Policymakers should simultaneously raise penalties for restricted use pesticide violations that result in bodily harm or death. Carelessness should not excuse assault or homicide, even if industrial chemicals are the culprit. Finally, elected officials should make sure that the Department of Agriculture has the clear capability to refer potential violations to law enforcement for prosecution. Laws are only as good as their enforcement. It's time we started prosecuting those who sacrifice people's health to personal profit.

It is imperative that political leaders stand up for safety during this year's legislative session, given recent court rulings curtailing county jurisdiction over pesticide use, genetically modified organisms, and land management. If you wait, our children will breathe in the fallout for generations to come.

My name is Dan Clegg. I am the Monsanto Hawaii Business Operations Lead. Our farms are located on Maui, Molokai and Oahu and we have about 700 full time employees and 200 seasonal workers at our peak.

Thank you for allowing us to testify in opposition to HB 790, HD 1.

Safety is Monsanto's number one priority. Safety for our employees, safety for our communities and neighbors, and safety for the environment. Monsanto is committed to being a responsible steward of the land. We utilize soil and water conservation practices and an integrated pest management program that implements all appropriate pest management options on all of our farms.

The Federal EPA reviews all safety, toxicology, and scientific data available for a registered pesticide to protect public health and the environment. This comprehensive regulatory and extensive review process is required of all pesticides. The State Department of Agriculture also has oversight and enforcement of pesticides used in Hawaii. Both the Federal and State work together to ensure that laws and regulations are enforced and enforced broadly and equally. Having a patchwork of county regulations that are inconsistent will make it challenging for those owning farms on each island while trying to be compliant on a state and national level.

Dear Chair McKelvey, Vice Chair Ichiyama and Members of the Committeel am writing to urge your st rong support of HB 790. This bill requires that the state protect our residents' health by requiring disclosure and notification of toxic pesticides around schools, healthcare facilities, childcare facilities, elder care facilities, and other environmentally sensitive areas.

I am deeply concerned with the effects long-term pesticide application and pesticide drift are having on our children at schools. According to a 2012 report by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) entitled "Pesticide Exposure in Children," children exposed to chronic, low-level exposure to Restricted Use Pesticides are at a risk of neurodevelopmental disabilities like autism and ADHD, as well as leukemia and asthma.

Currently there are at least 27 schools in Hawai'i located within a mile of fields where agrichemical companies like Monsanto and Dow Chemical spray restricted-use pesticides. Our keiki and faculty in these schools are at a heightened risk of exposure to pesticides that drift from these industrial operations. There is nothing more important than the health and safety of our keiki, which is why we must demand that these agrichemical companies say what they spray and give us space.

My personal testimony does not represent the position of the University of Hawaii nor the College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources.

HB 790 HD1 should be defeated. Please use facts to make decisions. The Kauai Joint Fact Finding report found NO evidence of health or environmental impacts associated with pesticide use. This bill places unnecessary restrictions on the best, most highly trained and careful applicators of pesticide in the State. Placing additional regulations on large agricultural operations is unnecessary. The large farms on Kauai, through the Good Neighbor program has been disclosing their usage of RUPs. Let's not put additional pressure on them.

The HDOA as well as the US EPA regulate the use of these pesticides and we don't need additional regulation.

I am married to Hanohano a Molokai Kane who was born and raised a paniolo and for last 16 years he has kiai loko or fishpond guardian at Keawanui Fishpond where we teach and host over 1000 people mostly school students from pre school to College and beyond. Everything we do there is deeply rooted in Aloha Aina. We reside as a family and live in Honouliwai on the Far East end of Molokai where we live very very close to the land. The stream provides our running water and the sun gives us our energy. We hunt and grow nearly 50 % of what our ohana consumes. Simply put, I walk the talk and I will never go back to the life that I had before I became conscious and formed an unbreakable bond with our natural environment. I am a child of the Pali, Ferreira, Rodrigues and Chang ohana I am a kanaka oiwi that is guided by my aumakua, kupuna, elders and my families needs. I am a fourth generation descendant from sugar plantation immigrants on 3 sides Pake, Portuguese and Puerto Rican Mother of three, devoted wife, Educator, gardener, artist, and Poe Aloha Aina. As a kumu Olelo Hawaii, Hawaiian cultural practitioner, SLAM poet, performing artist and Orator, Moolelo is my kuleana and is embedded in all that I do and teach. My responsibility is to create story tellers, orators of ancient stories that have solutions for modern day context, truly timeless lessons of Universal values, sustainable practices, and answers that were gifted to us. I want them to be able to tell their story. I have been blessed to be mentored by some of the most revered storytellers of our time and so I carry on the lamaku or torch. All of our islands tell stories of fierce guardians and protectors, and Molokai is no exception. It has a strong history of poe Aloha aina that planned rebellions, fought battles where women fought fearlessly alongside their men. It is an island where prayer could bring any ill intentions to its knees. So in modern day context these stories still hold understandings. But the most common thread with all of these moolelo is the importance of Aloha Aina and fierce protection. Before I share a few personal stories I wanted to share the meaning of the suffix Cide C * I * D * E 1. a learned borrowing from Latin meaning "killer," "act of killing," used in the formation of compound words: pesticide, homicide, suicide, genocide After 3 years of trying to become pregnant in 2008 it happened. By week 11 I had a Miscarriage. After confirming in the doctors office that there was no heartbeat I ask the midwife, "are there a lot of miscarriages here in Molokai?" She said more than she's

seen in any other town she's worked in. Molokai midwifes usually have 3-4 year contracts so most have serviced a good amount of communities. This was alarming, I surely wasn't alone when I was going through my grieving period as so many other women that heard of my loss shared their stories. Fast forward 3 years when my mother who just recently moved to Molokai to be near her moopuna was diagnosed with breast cancer. She asked me to please get a mammogram so I did. I went to Molokai General Hospital to do it and as I was uncomfortably being handled I asked to radiologists," is there a lot of cases of breast cancer on Molokai. With a very remorseful voice and face she answered, "not just breast, all kinds of cancer, there's so many on Molokai, it's so sad." I wonder when we as a collective will start questioning, we shouldn't just hope it's safe, we need to stand up for our livelihood and well being of our loved ones and that land which provides. My children have to go to the only high school and immersion school on island which is located directly north of the fields. Kona winds is not good. I question my parenting everyday when I send them off on the bus into this danger zone of pesticide residues. I don't want to just hope today isn't the day. I want to know that everything is being done to protect our air, water, soil and our children. All of our Schools need to be safe and nurturing. No compromises, No more plantation mentality. I Chose to break those chains that clouded my grandparents and my parents brains. I am no longer Suppressed into silence. I urge all of you to make this story our story one worth telling for generations to come.

I strongly support disclosure for large commercial farmers so we know and can study what we are being exposed to. This is long overdue and residents on all islands are very concerned over our health and that of the environment. Residents on Maui, Kauai, and the Big Island passed laws to create pesticide safety. In appeal the 9th district court ruled that the state is the proper jurisdiction and has the responsibility to pass laws regarding pesticide safety to protect the health of citizens.

This bill is a beginning to address our concerns about pesticide safety. It is much easier and more accurate to do testing if we know what we have been exposed to. Researchers know where to start and can study findings of studies done elsewhere and medical researchers can correlate increased health conditions to certain chemicals if they know what patients have been exposed to. People who are sensitive can choose to stay away from dangerous areas. Doctors are better able to diagnose patients if they know what they have been exposed to. This is particularly important for children, health compromised, and the elderly. There is hormone disruption associated with any pesticide and many conditions have a higher risk with increased amount and combinations of pesticide exposure. It is the states responsibility to monitor and inform citizens of known health risks such as transmitted diseases such as typhus and dengue, natural risks such as volcanic vog and in the case of man-made pesticides to regulate or ban them to safe levels. This is critically important to those near commercial agriculture that uses high volumes and experimental GMO test fields that are trying to create by selection plant traits that can tolerate higher pesticide levels. I have lived in Paia Maui almost 40 years in the middle of HCS sugar plantation. As part of a non mandatory good neighbor policy HC&S posted to the State Dept of Agriculture website the usage of 62,400 lbs of atrazine used on 36,000 acres on Maui in 2015. Extrapolated over 30 years that an estimated eighteen million, seven hundred and twenty thousand lbs of atrazine. The other multitude of concerning pesticides such as ametryn, 24-D, and glyphosate have not been revealed. On Oct 22, 2016 Scott Enright State Department of Agriculture Director revealed to me that 80% of all pesticide use in the state was applied by HC & S on Maui. It is very bitter sweet and concerning that this partial disclosure occurred only after HC & S has announced ending sugar growing. I am concerned about the cumulative affects of what I have been exposed to and I certainly would not have bought a home in Paia if I had known in advance the level of pesticide exposure I would be receiving. This can never happen again. We have a right to health and I am fighting for pesticide safety. -Stephen Paselk, Paia, Maui.

Dear Chair, Vice Chair and Members:

A couple of weeks ago, I filed testimony in opposition to HB790, for which I understand your committee has scheduled a hearing next week. I wanted to reemphasize and expand on that opposition today to two of the bill's provisions. As you may know, I also published an op-ed in the Honolulu Star-Advertiser a few days ago focusing on the ill-advised nature of the provision of the bill that gives counties individual authority to regulate pesticides. I continue to believe this is terrible public police idea, for reasons reiterated below.

I write in the capacity of a private citizen. I am aware that I have become somewhat prominent on Kauai as an opponent of unreasonable regulation of GMO agriculture and the scarcely camouflaged effort to turn the anti-GMO movement into a movement to demand more pesticide regulation. As I have been publicly speaking out on these issues for more than three years, I am aware there are those in the anti-GMO/pesticide arena who contend that I am somehow a paid agent of, or beholden to, agrochemical and seed companies. This is not and never has been true.

In this letter, I want to comment again on Sect. 149A-G (Authority of local government) and *de novo* on Sect. 149A-F (Penalties and Citizen Suits.)

In the case of Sect. 149A-G, this bill seeks, again, to empower individual counties to enact their own pesticide regulatory schemes, with no requirement that such regulation have any basis in science or fact. Under this bill, a county could ban pesticide use simply because the members of its County Council don't like the color of the label on the product.

Hawaii agriculture could not survive this kind of piecemeal, inconsistent, contradictory regulation. Two U.S. District Court Judges and the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals have noted that the Hawaii legislature reserved to itself the statewide duty to regulate pesticides. Counties do not have the expertise, personnel, funds or experience to get into the pesticide regulation business. That authority must remain at the state level.

Significantly, the Hawaii Department of Agriculture has recently stepped up its focus on pesticide enforcement, introducing statewide programs with great promise. This initiative is the best approach, not creation of an inscrutable regulatory hodgepodge county by county.

I am taking the liberty of attaching my recent Star-Advertiser essay, as it sets forth this reasoning in more detail.

As to Sect. 149A-F, a provision entitling anyone to sue any agricultural enterprise at any time for alleged violation of the provisions of HB790 is a very poorly concealed attempt to threaten court system chaos and to overload the already jammed judicial system with more frivolous litigation. The bill essentially invites litigation to enjoin agricultural practices. It is easy to imagine the business of farming in Hawaii grinding to a halt because of the filing of dozens, or hundreds, of injunctive actions, which would be all the more encouraged by the promise that the filer would incur no financial costs, but would instead stand to gain from the amorphously identified "reasonable costs and attorney's fees incurred in investigating and prosecuting an action."

This is simply a sham provision intended to throw the litigation and regulatory system into chaos, with the objective of harming companies that produce GMO crops.

For all of these reasons, I urge you, again, to reject HB790 and allow the Hawaii Department of Agriculture's initiatives on pesticide regulation to mature and take hold. Hawaii has already had too much of this destructive war over GMOs. What is needed now is peace and the ability to rebuild social trust. This bill would do just the opposite. It must not be enacted.

Aloha to members of the house committee. I am Lee A. Evslin, MD and I am testifying in strong support of HB790. I am a Board Certified Pediatrician. I was one of the two physician members of Kauai's Joint Fact Finding task force (JFF) and I was formally the CEO of Kauai Medical Clinic and Wilcox hospital.

The opening concept in the American Academy of Pediatrics 2012 Policy Statement on Pesticides is that pesticides are "inherently toxic", "designed to kill or harm living organisms" and there is "increasing concern" about the adverse health effects of "low level exposures".

The large-scale agricultural farms in Hawaii use large amounts of restricted use pesticides. (RUPS) On Kauai during an 18-month period 18 tons were applied at rates that generally exceeded mainland rates.

The courts have made it very clear that any regulating of these pesticides must come from the state and unfortunately the White House is making it very clear that federal protection of the environment is not a priority.

The American Academy of Pediatrics also made it very clear that "right to know" is one of the concepts that pediatricians should help to establish. The JFF recommended that the disclosure aspects of the Good Neighbor Policy (GNP) be mandatory and statewide. A review of the GNP by a professional group done while the JFF was doing its work also called for a "verifiable" regularly produced report on what was being sprayed and where.

The bottom-line is that the public has the right to know if they will be exposed to potentially toxic chemicals. In addition, good science concerning possible adverse effects from these exposures cannot be done without knowledge of what is being sprayed and where it is being sprayed.

The large scale agricultural companies already carefully collect the information being asked for, this bill merely insures that information is provided to those at risk in a timely and verifiable manner.

In the past, small farmers concerned about increasing regulatory burden have lobbied against this type of legislative request. It must be clearly pointed out that this legislation would only affect the large users of RUPs.

Please pass the bill. Our citizens and our fragile ecosystems need your protection. Thank you for allowing this testimony.
