Chair Woodson and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association <u>supports SB HCR 92/HR 54</u>, requesting the Department of Education and University of Hawai'i system to develop programming and educational supports for educational assistants and long-term substitute teachers to earn teaching degrees and become full-time certified teachers.

Hawai'i is experiencing a teacher shortage crisis. From 2011 to 2014, the DOE suffered an average of 359 unfilled vacancies per year. Yet, departmental data showed 531 vacancies for the 2016-2017 school year, a 45 percent increase from the 2013-14 school year.

Educational assistants are equipped with many of the fundamental skills necessary to embark on a successful teaching career. Many EAs assist with small group instruction, support students with disabilities, and perform administrative tasks needed to provide a quality learning environment.

Already, Leeward Community College offers an Associate in Arts in Teaching program that offers a Special Education/Inclusive Education Certificate with credits that are transferable to a state-approved teacher education program. Similarly, the INPEACE Kulia and Ka Lama Education Academy develops educational assistants

along the Waianae Coast, a hard-to-fill area for the DOE's recruitment and retention efforts.

Substitute teachers, too, can become effective full-time educators. Substitutes with at least a bachelor's degree have already demonstrated subject matter mastery and may be encouraged to become classroom teachers, if the high the cost of completing a state approved teacher education program can be mitigated. A 2014 study conducted by the New America Foundation found that "the average newly minted teacher in 2012 has to pay \$429 a month in student debt payments."

To help stem our teacher shortage crisis, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to **support** this resolution.
