With your support, these deputy prosecuting attorneys will have the tools necessary to protect the public from career criminals.

The Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui strongly supports SB 26. The purpose of this measure is to make an appropriation of \$ 200,000 to the Office of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Hawaii, for the Career Criminal Prosecution (CCP) Unit.

The CCP program was mandated to the counties with the enactment of Chapter 845, Hawaii Revised Statutes, back in 1979. The CCP program was created because the Legislature

found that "a substantial and disproportionate amount of serious crime is committed against the people by a relatively small number of multiple and repeat felony offenders." Further, the Legislature "intends to support increased efforts by prosecuting attorneys' offices to prosecute career criminals through organizational and operational techniques that have been proven effective in selected counties in other states."

In order to avoid the unfunded mandate prohibition under the Constitution of the State of Hawaii, it has long been the practice of the Legislature to provide funding for the CCP program. This bill will address the issue of shrinking funding from the State, while personnel expenses have increased. As with all counties, experienced deputy prosecutors and staff are assigned to the CCP program because of the serious nature of the offenses.

Accordingly, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui, requests that this measure be PASSED.
