SENATE BILL NO. 773 SD1 RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Chairperson Tokuda and Members of the Committee:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on Senate Bill 773 SD1 which proposes to establish an industrial hemp special fund to carry out the industrial hemp pilot program, which was created by Act 228, SLH 2016. The bill also allots funds for positions to administer the Industrial Hemp Pilot Program. The department supports this bill.

To administer this program, the department will need to accept application fees, licensing fees, sampling fees and testing fees. To enforce this program, the department will need the ability to assess and accept fines. Currently, there is no fund established for the department to accept fees on behalf of the program. Without the fund, the program cannot function, nor have the chance of eventually sustaining itself.

Clarifying that cultivation of industrial hemp as an agricultural activity in Hawaii will prevent possible future disagreements and misunderstandings between individual grower's and counties in which they are cultivating hemp. This would also allow the growers to receive agricultural land and agricultural water use rates.

Restricting the growth of industrial hemp to within state agricultural land districts will help with the administration and enforcement of the program. This would likely prevent some small backyard hobbyist growing in urbanized areas where cultivation of hemp would be riskier and likely to affect the neighboring community.

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE

Senate Bill No. 773, S.D. 1, establishes the Industrial Hemp Special Fund (IHSF) to carry out the purposes of the Industrial Hemp Pilot Program (IHPP) by the Department of Agriculture (DOA) established through Act 228, SLH 2016. The IHSF would be funded through money appropriated through the Legislature, fees collected by the DOA for the purposes of the IHPP, and any interest or return earned from moneys in the special fund. This bill also requires each county to recognize the cultivation of hemp for the purposes of the pilot program as an agricultural product, use, and activity; specifies that any agricultural land used for cultivation of industrial hemp for the purposes of the pilot program shall qualify for the minimum dedication period and be assessed at the lowest percentage of fair market value; limit the cultivation of industrial hemp to licensed owners, lessees, or occupiers of lands within the State agricultural land district; and appropriates general revenues of \$258,298 in FY 18 and \$324,796 in FY 19 for a Program Coordinator and an Inspector in the DOA.

The Department of Budget and Finance, as a matter of general policy, does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need as demonstrated by the purpose, scope of work and an explanation why the program cannot be implemented successfully under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries or a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to Senate Bill No. 773, S.D. 1, it is difficult to determine if the proposed special fund would be self-sustaining.
