In consideration of SENATE BILL 808, SENATE DRAFT 1, HOUSE DRAFT 1 RELATING TO THE HAWAII ASSOCIATION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

Senate Bill 808, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1 proposes to appropriate an unspecified amount of general revenues in Fiscal Year 2017-2018 and Fiscal Year 2018-2019 for operating expenses and staffing costs of the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (HACD). The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) supports this bill provided that its passage does not replace or adversely impact priorities indicated in our Executive Budget request.

The purpose of the Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) Program is to educate, construct, maintain, and assist in the development of conservation plans to protect soil and water resources. Each SWCD is operated by a five-member volunteer board. HACD is an umbrella organization formed by the 16 SWCDs under Chapters 180 and 180C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and administratively attached to the Department. In each of fiscal years 2015-2016 and 2016-2017, HACD and the SWCDs received \$322,500 in general funds, appropriated by Act 84, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015. The Department notes that the SWCD Program does not have a base budget appropriation and funding would be required for the continuance of their activities.

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Members of the Committee:

I am Michelle Watkins, Executive Director of the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts. HACD is comprised of 16 Hawaii Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) across the state. With the first District organized in 1948, the SWCDs are mandated by HRS §180 and comprised of volunteer directors. Many of the SWCD directors are also farmers and ranchers. They have a great understanding of the various issues related to agriculture, land use, conservation and the importance of servicing our communities.

The Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts strongly supports SB808,

providing funding for staffing and operations of HACD. HACD greatly appreciates the support provided by the legislature and the long standing contribution by the State of Hawaii to the SWCDs.

HACD and the 16 Hawaii SWCDs are a prime example of a successful partnership between the State, County, Federal and private partnerships, with funding requested by DLNR that represent the State's share of this unique partnership.

Public/Private Partnership for FY2016

- Federal (cash and in kind): \$500K State: \$332K County: \$500K
- SWCD board members and volunteers donate in excess of 17,280 hours annually.
 - Multiply this out by a nominal \$25/hr consulting rate and this adds \$432k to the value of the partnerships;
- State funding then becomes a modest investment, leveraging every State dollar (\$332K) 4.3 times to \$1432K of agricultural based services.

Resource conservation and Protection Projects (examples)

A conservation plan (similar to a blueprint for a house) is a blueprint for managing ranches, farms and conservation lands. This plan not only helps the owner of the plan, but also helps to protect neighboring properties from runoff and streams from being polluted by inadvertent practices.

By assisting farmers and ranchers with technical support and in developing and processing conservation plans, the SWCDs help to address such issues as erosion, grading and grubbing, runoff, and water quality in general. We also help to provide outreach and help educate our youth and the educators who teach them. Assisting the members in our community is a priority for HACD and the SWCDs, which benefits everyone throughout the state.

In addition to assisting farmers, ranchers and landowners prepare and implement conservation plans; the organization seeks funding and implements projects across the State. Examples include:

- On Maui, Water Source Development for the Community, e.g. Kahakapao Reservoirs
- On Kauai, Assisted DLNR in the Permitting and Construction Phase of the Hanalei Project
- On Hawaii, watershed-based plans like the Waiulaula Watershed Management project
- On Oahu, EPA-funded 319(h) Water Quality Projects, such as the Ala Wai Watershed Project to control and reduce soil erosion, and prevent and reduce sediment reaching the ocean waters
- On Molokai, the Moomomi Watershed Project with the same objectives

Increased need of services due to extremes in weather conditions; SWCDs actively implement programs to protect and restore communities from natural disasters. Forecasts indicate extreme drought and flooding in future years. Examples of implemented projects include:

- Lahaina Temporary Flood Control Project
- Funding to haul water to drought impacted farmers and ranchers.

The investment by the State of Hawaii is a critical component to enable our SWCDs to continue their programs, as listed above, and will be leveraged with Federal and County funds to help make the greatest impact. With all of our SWCD Directors being volunteers, we hope that the Legislature can see the value and importance that our program has made on our Island communities. We sincerely appreciate your time and respectfully request your **support in passing SB 808**.

Attached is a detailed accounting of our funding request and a brochure describing HACD activities. I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

The Hawaii Farm Bureau **strongly supports SB 808 SD1, HD1**, providing funding for staffing and operations of the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (HACD).

HFB appreciates the support provided by the legislature to the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts. This program is an excellent example of successful public-private partnerships that brings benefit not just to farmers and ranchers, but to everyone in the State of Hawaii. We support the position of HACD. Their services are essential for farmers and ranchers.

The Soil and Water Conservation Districts were born out of the efforts of farmers who saw the value in implementing conservation practices. No laws told them they had to do it. It was common sense. You protect the resource that grows the crops and raises the livestock that you depend on. These districts provide an excellent example of public private partnerships and how Federal, State and County governments can leverage resources to accomplish more than each can do for themselves.

Over the years, the Districts have also originated major water projects across the State bringing in Federal dollars to be matched by State resources. Today, we have two projects remaining and HACD continues to work with our Congressional Delegation to complete the Upcountry Dual line and the Lahaina Flood Control Projects. Drought mitigation is a major concern for farmers and ranchers. We are constantly looking for ways in which we can partner with USDA NRCS to implement programs in Hawaii. While the conservation districts are most often associated with preparation and approval of conservation plans, the scope of their activities are much broader. As part of the National Association of Conservation Districts, we have access to material that can help the state agencies meet regulatory requirements. For example, those Counties involved in MS4 or Municipal Stormwater requirements by EPA, have education requirements. Each year, there is a focus area across the country. 2017's topic is "Where does your Water shed?" educating children about where water comes from and the need to be cognizant about practices such as oil discharges from your cars that may end up in the storm drain or dumping hazardous wastes where it can end up in streams. These are programs that can be implemented by Districts as part of their outreach. By funding the Districts, you contribute to their capacity to carry out these tasks.

Another example is Soil Judging. Each year, students across the state enter a contest to test their abilities to correctly identify, evaluate, classify, and describe soil profiles and their applicability for various uses including housing. Did you know that Hawaii students have consistently placed in National competitions that take place in Oklahoma each year? Through these experiences, students have developed an interest in pursuing careers in agriculture.

HFB strongly supports the position as stated by HACD. We agree that placing this funding as a line item in the DLNR budget is prudent. <u>We respectfully request your strong</u> support of funding the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts and placing them as a line item in the DLNR budget. Thank you.

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Cullen, and Members of the Committee:

I am Michelle Watkins, Executive Director of the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts. HACD is comprised of 16 Hawaii Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs). With the first District organized in 1948, the SWCDs are mandated by HRS §180 and comprised of volunteer directors. Many of the SWCD directors are also farmers and ranchers. They have a great understanding of the various issues related to agriculture, land use, conservation and the importance of servicing our communities.

I strongly support SB808, providing funding for staffing and operations of HACD. HACD greatly appreciates the support provided by the legislature and the long standing contribution by the State of Hawaii to the SWCDs.

HACD and the 16 Hawaii SWCDs are a prime example of a successful partnership between the State, County, Federal and private partnerships, with funding requested by DLNR that represent the State's share of this unique partnership.

Public/Private Partnership for FY2016

- Federal (cash and in kind): \$500K State: \$332K County: \$500K
- SWCD board members and volunteers donate in excess of 17,280 hours annually.
 - Multiply this out by a nominal \$25/hr consulting rate and this adds \$432k to the value of the partnerships;
- State funding then becomes a modest investment, leveraging every State dollar (\$332K) 4.3 times to \$1432K of agricultural based services.

Resource conservation and Protection Projects (examples)

A conservation plan (similar to a blueprint for a house) is a blueprint for managing ranches, farms and conservation lands. This plan not only helps the owner of the plan, but also helps to protect neighboring properties from runoff and streams from being polluted by inadvertent practices.

By assisting farmers and ranchers with technical support and in developing and processing conservation plans, the SWCDs help to address such issues as erosion, grading and grubbing, runoff, and water quality in general. We also help to provide

outreach and help educate our youth and the educators who teach them. Assisting the members in our community is a priority for HACD and the SWCDs, which benefits everyone throughout the state.

In addition to assisting farmers, ranchers and landowners prepare and implement conservation plans; the organization seeks funding and implements projects across the State. Examples include:

- On Maui, Water Source Development for the Community, e.g. Kahakapao Reservoirs
- On Kauai, Assisted DLNR in the Permitting and Construction Phase of the Hanalei Project
- On Hawaii, watershed-based plans like the Waiulaula Watershed Management project
- On Oahu, EPA-funded 319(h) Water Quality Projects, such as the Ala Wai Watershed Project to control and reduce soil erosion, and prevent and reduce sediment reaching the ocean waters
- On Molokai, the Moomomi Watershed Project with the same objectives

The Land Use Research Foundation of Hawaii (LURF) is a private, non-profit research and trade association whose members include major Hawaii landowners, developers and a utility company. LURF's mission is to advocate for reasonable, rational and equitable land use planning, legislation and regulations that encourage well-planned economic growth and development, while safeguarding Hawaii's significant natural and cultural resources, and public health and safety.

LURF is in strong support of SB 808, SD1, HD1.

<u>SB 808, SD1, HD1</u>. This bill proposes to appropriate moneys from the general revenues of the State of Hawaii for the Hawaii Association of Conservation Districts (HACDs) to assist with its operational expenses and staffing costs.

LURF's Position. LURF is in **strong support** of this measure to appropriate funds the HACDs, because the soil and water conservation districts have worked to improve Hawaii's environment and economy through major projects over the past sixty years, such as improving farm practices, reducing erosion, augmenting ocean water quality, improving drinking water quality, and fighting invasive species.

In addition, the HACDs assist with reviewing each county's grading permits and conservation plans that are critical to proper county grading permit reviews, preserving the environment, stimulating the economy, and maintaining individual livelihoods. Soil and water conservation districts also provide educational and community support for conservation awareness, including introducing elementary school students to conservation principles and participating in high school resource conservation and development projects.

The demand and accompanying workload of the HACDs have increased dramatically with population growth and land use changes. The HACDs receive hundreds of requests for reviews of conservation plans and county grading permit each year. As a result, HACDs are currently struggling to keep pace with the demand, and adequate funding for the work of the HACDs is in serious jeopardy at a time of critical demand for its services.

For the above reasons, LURF <u>strongly supports</u> SB 808, SD1, HD1 and respectfully urges your favorable consideration.
