- 1. A brief description of the applicant's background; Frank De Lima has been a pillar of Hawai'i's entertainment community for more than 40 years. His celebrity status coupled with his Bachelor's Degree in Sociology and Master's Degree in Divinity allows him to communicate his message of respect, happiness, tolerance, responsibility and honesty with the goal of instilling important behaviors during children's critical development years.
- 2. The goals and objectives related to the request; Mr. De Lima understands that growing up in today's society is difficult. Children are often confronted with negative influences including drugs, alcohol, smoking, peer pressure, bullying, bad nutrition, etc. Without the proper support and education, wrong decisions could have potentially damaging long-term effects on Hawai`i's keiki (i.e., failing/dropping out of school, incarceration, substance dependency, obesity, etc.) As a result, the Program provides vital guidance to Hawai`i's public and private elementary and middle/intermediate school students on the development of positive attitudes and values during their maturational process. The Program's objectives are to:
 - a. Provide drug education and drug abuse prevention to youth;
 - b. Assist students in developing positive values;
 - c. Assist youth in coping with life changes in their maturational process.

a. Tobacco Use. Every day, almost 3,000 children under 18 years of age try their first cigarette, and more than 710 of them will become new, regular daily smokers. Half of them will ultimately die from their habit. People who start smoking at an early age are more likely to develop a severe addiction to nicotine than those who start at a later age. Of adolescents who have smoked at least 100 cigarettes in their lifetime, most of them report that they would like to quit, but are not able to do so. If current tobacco use patterns persist, an estimated 5.6 million of today's youth under age 18 eventually will die prematurely from a smoking-related disease.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reports that factors associated with youth tobacco use include social and physical environments (seen as acceptable or normal among their peers), mental health (depression, anxiety and stress), personal perceptions (expectations of positive outcomes from smoking, such as coping with stress and controlling weight). Other influences that affect youth tobacco use include lower socioeconomic status including lower income or education, low levels of academic achievement and low self-image or self-esteem.

- b. Childhood Obesity. Childhood obesity is a national epidemic. Nearly 1 in 3 children (ages 2-19) in the United States is overweight or obese, putting them at risk for serious health problems. The most recent statistics from the CDC, 26% of Hawai'i's children are overweight or obese.
- c. Bullying. Bullying amongst children is a serious problem that is far too often written off as a rite of passage, or as "kids being kids." It is, however, a very dangerous form of aggression that causes injuries, fear, embarrassment, reduced self-esteem, and depression in the victim. Studies have shown that bullying occurs on the playground as often as every seven minutes. In the classroom, a child is bullied every twenty-five minutes. Even the Internet has turned into an instrument of aggression in the form of cyberbullying, which can take place at any time, day or night. Whether it occurs on the playground, in the classroom, or online, bullying can become so severe that some children may avoid going to school out of fear or embarrassment. In the most extreme cases, children have even committed suicide as a means to escape it. Despite its severity, little is done to put a stop it when it takes place. According to the National School Climate Center, eighty-five percent of the time there is no intervention from either other children or adults. About 28 percent of students ages 12-18 reported being bullied at school during the school year, according to the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) and National Center for Education Statistics Institute of Education Sciences (IES). Children cannot get a quality education if they don't first feel safe at school.
- 5. Describe the geographic coverage; Public and private schools in the State of Hawaii.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

It takes Mr. De Lima two school years to complete the entire school visitation cycle. Mr. De Lima exclusively conducts all presentations, which lasts approximately 20 minutes each. Participants are primarily grouped by grade levels and the presentation content is adjusted accordingly. School visitations are arranged prior to each school year between the Program and the Hawai'i Department of Education (DOE). The Program's administrative officer coordinates the visitation schedule with the DOE and the Program's executive director executes all school visitations and presentations. The presentation content varies upon the general age of the students with the core message focusing on "taking control of your lives." Thus, the Program is comprised of two components:
 - a. Elementary School Program. Consistency and repetition are key learning variables in helping students in grades K-3 absorb a simple but essential message: The importance of reading, studying, laughing and family. This message is conveyed in a fun yet meaningful manner.
 - b. Intermediate / Middle School Program, De Lima discusses the trials of "growing up" and the emotional "diseases" also known in the Hawaiian Pidgin language as "tidahitis" and "blalah-itis" that are commonly associated with this age group. These discussions are geared toward assisting students in having a positive attitude, which can make school and home life better.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service; School year 2018 2019. List of scheduled school visits is attached.




