I. Background and Summary

Friends of Moku'ula, Inc ("Friends") is a not for profit organization established in 1997. Its mission is to restore, protect and preserve Moku'ula island and Loko O Mokuhinia.

Established as a cultural preservation organization, the Friends intent is to re-establish the area of Moku'ula and Loko O Mokuhinia as a premier cultural and historic site in Lahaina, Maui. The history of this particular site has played a significant role in the history of Hawaii and Lahaina in particular:

Pre-contact to post contact. From the early 15th century under the protection of High Chief Piilani, the island of Maui saw the first unification action under this High Chief. Through the generations of descendants, Maui continued to re-assert itself as an independent body and land base until the arrival of Kamehameha and the first foreign ships.

Missionary Arrival. The arrival of the Missionary to the shores of Lahaina was at the behest of Keopuolani. Established on what was then Makila Beach, the thatched hut built to accommodate the daily prayer service of the Calvinist minister Richardson took place there until the construction of Wainee Church in 1831.

Creation of the Constitutional Monarchy. In 1839, Kauikeauoli penned the Declaration of Rights under which all Al'ii and Maka'ainana were given equal rights to the land and its resources in perpetuity. In 1840, Kauikeauoli, as Kamehameha III, declared the Constitutional Monarchy of the Kingdom of Hawaii, establishing a democratic governing body in which all native tenants had the right to vote and be represented in government.

Whaling period. Lahaina was recognized as the whaling capital of the world, at times harboring over 100 whaling ships off shore. Accommodating the ships were all the social and economic concerns including the need for a prison, law enforcement, prostitution, and communicable deseases.

Plantation period. During the Great Mahale, foreign interests were now able to acquire and own land, and began the diversion of the water resources. Diversion o of the surface water which fed Loko O Mokuhinia, the waters of the pond began to decrease and eventually became stagnant. This led to the burial of Mokuula and the Loko.

Tourist period. As more and more people began to come to Hawaii, the tourist industry found its feet in Kaanapali, Maui. Lahaina found itself turning its attention from agriculture to tourism, changing the face of this ancient place once again.

Goals and Objectives Related to this Request.

The purpose of this request is the restoration and preservation of the Moku'ula complex, including Mokuula Island, Loko O Mokuhinia and the beachfront now known as

Kamehameha Iki Park. This complex is a recognized Historic Site by both the National Park Service and the State of Hawaii.

The goals of the restoration project is to restore the island perimeter wall and part of the Loko, develop an appropriate cultural education program that will provide historical information from a Hawaiian perspective, and the indoctrination and training of lineal descendants of Mokuula for the maintenance and management of the island, pond and education program.

The objectives that will align the three components will incorporate the recommended activities as outlined by the recent Archaeological Inventory Survey by the County of Maui, in particular those recommendations made regarding the island perimeter restoration prior to the pond restoration.

Public purpose and need to be served

The State of Hawaii, as part of the agreement to statehood and the Hawaii State Constitution provides for the preservation of historic sites and history. This site was been hidden under a recreational area and park for 100 years. During which time, information and stories of Lahaina has been changed to suit the current economic trend. For example, the name Moku'ula was buried along with the island in favor of the name Malu-ulu-o-lele, a name given to a grove of ulu trees that grew mauka of Mokuula. This history of this place needs to be restored and preserved for both Native Hawaiians and the community at large, for the generations now and in the future.

Target population to be served. While the Mokuula complex serves the entire state of Hawaii as a historic site, its place in history needs to reach beyond the history books and can serve as a living part of the Hawaiian community. Native Hawaiians interested in pursuing higher education in the areas of science, history, conservation and education will find a immeasurable source of information and data that has the potential to provide opportunities in the restoration and preservation of other sacred sites in Hawaii.

Geographic coverage. The area of interest encompasses approximately 10 acres over three tax map keys. Historically, Mokuula and Loko o Mokuhinia at one time, is estimated to encompass approximately 20 acres of land and ponds.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

This project is 20 years in the making. The plans for the restoration of the island and pond include a careful uncovering of the layers of fill that was used starting in 1917. Both underground springs and surface water fed the pond from Kahoma and Kauaula streams. When sugar began water diversions, the pond became stagnant and a potential health hazard. At the same time the community was in need of a place for recreational activities. It was decided that they would fill the pond and use the area as a community recreational area. In total there were five layers of fill in the pond and over the island, including dredging material from the Lahaina harbor improvements in 1955.

Archaeological Surveys completed in 1993 and 1995 confirmed the existence of Moku'ula and the pond, along with several features of the area surrounding the pond. Our project scope will be focused on the restoration of these six areas, and will be primarily data recovery of any artifacts that are discovered.

A recent Archaelogical Inventory Survey (AIS) was completed in December 2017 as part of the restoration of Mokuhinia Pond Ecosystem currently being undertaken by the Army Corps of Engineers and the County of Maui. This AIS, mandated by the Department of Land and Natural Resources State Historic Preservation Division required the County of Maui to delineate the perimeter wall of Moku'ula and to determine a buffer area that would protect the island from further damage during the excavation of Mokuhinia Pond.

Findings contained in the AIS uncovered several hundred artifacts that included organic and non organic materials, evidence of human habitation including human skeletal remains, and further evidence of both pre-contact and early post contact materials. Findings also uncovered the history of the area and its various uses over the course of the last 100 years.

Recommendations and mitigation measures identified in the AIS addressed the two options for restoration activities that included what steps to take should the restoration of the pond begin first and what steps to take should the restoration of the island begin first.

With this new information now available, the community of Lahaina, particularly those families who are the lineal descendants of Pi'ilani, urged the Friends of Moku'ula to begin the process that would start the restoration activities of the island before any work on the pond begins.

Initial plans for the restoration of Moku'ula was based on data and findings of previous studies done on the project site. However, with the new information that has been published, additional work will need to be done to better address concerns and conditions found in the AIS.

However, the need to acquire the expertise both in the scientific fields and Native Hawaiian practitioners who are recognized experts in traditional rock wall building and pond restoration remain as a priority for the work that needs to be addressed. Such work

entail assessment activities that will allow us to better identify the restoration and preservation strategies for the long term.. The assessment will take into consideration the current condition of the area, its past condition as it presents today, and a plan of action that will repair and restore the area as close to its origin as possible. Once the assessment is complete, repair and restoration work will begin. These activities will include the implementation of a management plan for each part of the area restored.

As part of the restoration work, we anticipate the need to remove any water that may result from underground springs. Past work done on the site confirms a continuous flow of water that will rise to approximately two feet. During excavation, repair and restoration, this water will be pumped out and funneled to a retention basin established on property. As the section is improved, part of the final completion stages is the return of the natural flow of water. A maintenance crew of trained members of the community will monitor water flow and height measurements.

The request for funding will allow the Friends to identify, develop and implement a course of action that will result in the restoration of Moku'ula, measures and protocols to protect the area and a long term plan to preserve and manage the restored area.

We anticipate that during this grant period, the following activities will occur:

Identify and secure archaeological consultants for plan development:	30 days

The Executive Director will be responsible for the search of consultants and securing all commitments. In addition, the Executive Director shall be responsible for the reporting requirements and fiscal reporting necessary to meet the needs of this grant request.

III. Financial.

This request will be used to fund the development of the restoration plan of Moku'ula and part of Loko O Mokuhinia. The County of Maui has established a grant fund from revenue of the paid parking lot located on the corner of Shaw and Front Street estimated to be \$180,000. These funds have been dedicated to the preservation and restoration of Moku'ula. In addition, the Friends are continuing to seek and receive private donations of approximately \$15,000 per year, and will be seeking additional funds for the project. As of this submission date, the Friends are seeking an additional \$550,000 to complete our funding needs for this fiscal year. Should the Friends receive less than the requested amount from this request, continued efforts to secure the necessary funds will continue until project costs are met. This will include continued solicitations for donations and grant applications.

IV. Experience and Capability

A. Necessary Skills and Experience

The Friends of Moku'ula was founded on the vision of restoration of the Moku'ula and Loko O Mokuhinia. However, the organization has no known expertise in the field of archaeology or historic preservation. In addition, comprehensive research in other projects that would result in full restoration of a site of this nature have not been realized. While there are a host of examples that show excavation, and some rehabilitation, these projects largely involved the rehabilitation and restoration of existing buildings and other structures.

The development and implementation of this project and its work plan will be the result of hundreds of hours of consultations with community members, cultural and lineal descendants, community organizations, and experts in the field of archaeology, cultural anthropology and ethnohistory as well as Kupuna who shared their family history and memories. As such, the Friends will be undertaking this project with these experts in their respective fields and the guidance of traditional practitioners, cultural experts and community historians. While the Friends in and of itself has no experience in the area of restoration, the assembly of both scientific and cultural practitioners will bring the necessary skills and expertise to the project undertaking.

B. Facilities

Currently, the project site has no facilities to undertake the project. As such, any and all facilities will have to be brought on site or secured in close proximity to the project area.

Administration of the organization is located at 505 Front Street, across the street from the project site. The intention is to establish trailer offices and security containers on site that will be used by the project staff and labor force.

Other facilities necessary for an intended project of this scope will be identified as part of the plan development activities.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

The Friends of Moku'ula currently employ one full-time employee; the Executive Director.

The Executive Director is responsible for the day to day operations of the Friends, and will oversee all staff and contract personnel. The Executive Director works closely with the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors and maintains a strong relationship with the 5 member board of directors. The Executive Director works with program personnel in the implementation and continuation of program and event offerings for the residential and visitor community and maintains a strong relationship with the County of Maui administration and Maui County Council.

The Executive Director has over 30 years of experience in community development, affordable housing and health care, is a board member of another non-profit and is the President of the board on two other organizations, both of which are native Hawaiian community organizations. Her years in the community includes curriculum development for homeownership, policy development in the areas of economic development and housing, grantwriting and organizational development. The Executive Director is a Ford Foundation awardee recognized in the top 100 Leaders for a Changing World, one of only two in Hawaii to have received this award. She is a traditional practitioner in la`au lapa`au, hula, ocean resource management and has served as a strong advocate in Hawaiian Rights and traditional resource management practices.

Currently, the Friends have secured the assistance of an accountant who specializes in non profit accounting and will work with the Executive Director in fiscal reporting.

Staffing needs for the future will be based upon the level of work identified in the restoration plan, qualifications and training, and capacity.

C. Compensation

The Directors and Officers of the Friends receive no compensation for their services, but instead volunteer their time to the organization and project development. Current Paid Staff positions in place at the time of this submittal are the the Executive Director. The Executive Director salary range is currently at \$66,000 per year salary with taxes and assessments, and fringe benefits at 29% of gross.

VI. Other

A. Litigation

As of the submittal of this request, the Friends have no pending litigation to which we are a party.

B. Licensure or Accreditation

The Friends of Moku'ula is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and is registered as such with the State of Hawaii. There are no other special qualifications attached to this organization.

C. Private Educational Institutions

The Friends of Moku'ula and the University of Hawaii Maui Campus ("UHMC") on this project, in that graduate and undergraduate students will enter into an intern program for their Natural Sciences department; particularly in the area of Archaeology. UHMC will not gain any financial benefit from being a partner with the Friends in this endeavor. Funds requested will be used for the development of the restoration plan.

D. Future Sustainability Plan


For the purposes of this project, the plan development will be crucial to the development of a funding strategy for future work and are in the process of seeking out multiple funding sources to fund the planning efforts.
