A brief description of the applicant's background;

Golden Hawaii Inc. is a Hawaii corporation under the operation of Judy Liu, whom has over 10 years of development and consulting experience in agriculture for domestic and international markets. With her primary focus on Okinawan sweet potatoes, ginger, and herbs Ms. Judy Liu started as a volunteer assisting numerous farmers on Oahu, Kauai, and the Big Island to receive proper farming assistance from the extension program at UH College of Tropical Agricultural & Human Resources Department, the Hawaii Department of Agriculture, and USDA. In addition, she has established a good working relationship and partnership with various farm operations on Oahu, Kauai and Hawaii Island which has enabled her to have consistent access to products of premium and "off grade" sweet potatoes, ginger, and basil. Working alongside local treatment facilities, Ms. Liu has been successfully distributing "Grown in Hawaii" crops to mainland markets. "Grown in Hawaii" sweet potatoes, ginger, and herbs have seen great demand from both local and US markets, and Golden Hawaii Inc. is eager in providing that supply on a global scale.

The goals of Golden Hawaii Inc. are to establish Kia'i a'i (Food Guardian), a state-of-the-art chilled food processing and storage facility designed to reduce agriculture loss by processing "off grade" quality produce into valued-added food products. For example, this facility will promote Hawaiian-inspired sweet potato snacks, ginger condiments, and basil oils, etc. utilizing "Grown in Hawaii" crops. In addition, this establishment will allow other farmers to reduce their agriculture waste and increase profits through processing. This venture will also provide direct employment opportunities for operational and maintenance purposes. Initial start-up cost will require a minimum of six employees with an estimated payroll cost of approximately \$269,600.00 for the first year. Second-year sales projections are expected to double, increasing employment needs and demand.

The Kia'i a'i food processing center objectives are: 1) To meet Governor David Ige's Sustain Hawaii Initiative to double local food production by 2020; 2) Increase local food production yield and reduce our reliance on imported foods from outside markets; 3)

Preserve and restore local farms by processing "off grade" crops into value-added food products to serve Hawaii residents and world markets; 4) Minimize the effect of "off grade" produce that would impact the "market price" for premium grade crops. Being able to redirect "off grade" crops to value-added processing would help stabilize the "market price" which will protect and keep local farms sustainable; 5) Provide direct job creation for the agriculture industry and food production in Hawaii.

United States import \$36,943,841 worth of ginger in 2000, the demand on ginger spice has been increasing and the valued added for ginger valued added product ranging from ginger puree, ginger candy to ginger drink as a healthy supplement drink will dramatically increase the demand on the spice beyond kitchen table and restaurant.


In 2015, U.S. sweet potato exports reached a record-high 409 million pounds and exports for 2016 are poised to reach approximately the same level. Both internationally and here in the U.S., sweet potatoes are increasingly becoming a colorful addition to holiday-and everyday-dining tables.

Domestic consumption of sweet potatoes has grown considerably since 2000 with annual per capita availability (a proxy for consumption) rising from 4.2 pounds to reach a record-high 7.5 pounds in 2015. The marked rise in domestic demand has been encouraged by promotion of the health benefits of sweet potatoes – rich in vitamins A and C, high in fiber. Expanded demand has also been supported by the increasing variety of sweet potato products available in restaurants and for home preparation.

Sales of raw and processed food products will also help raise the value and brand of "Grown in Hawaii" crops to domestic and international markets worldwide.

Providing employment opportunities is another vital aspect for Golden Hawaii Inc. aimed to bring awareness, pride, and ownership of family-farm operations capable of sustaining supply & demand for a food processing facility. Such an establishment can provide the tools, equipment and labor for ALL members of the agriculture industry.

The importance of self-preservation and self-reliance can be beneficial to communities, small businesses, government programs, etc. located throughout Hawaii by reducing its dependence on imports, that can be readily produced locally to fulfill the needs of the island's population.

The ideal target population for our food processing products will be to serve the entire State of Hawaii's 1.45 million-plus residents, armed forces, and countless visitors, averaging 9 million-plus yearly. Production will be manufactured onsite at our interactive facility, which will cater to local stores and restaurants, along with wholesalers and importers interested in "Grown in Hawaii" products sold in other locations around the world. Another area of interest will be to promote sales online and through the various venues of the internet to boost recognition and profits respectively.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The geographic coverage for our value-added processing center is catered to processed off grade ginger and sweet potatoes from existing farms at Kauai and Hawaii Island, and subsequently to other farms across Hawaii. While, the value added processed food products derived from the production are position to serve the entire State of Hawaii, US Mainland and the Asia market.

Golden Hawaii Inc.'s chilled processing facility will implement an operational plan to monitor and evaluate the efficiency of the facility performed daily when the facility is in operation. A sales matrix will be implemented on each of the processed items per quarter to determine cost and profits. A measure will be in place to calculate sales projection versus the actual sale for sweet potatoes, ginger, and basil processing. Year one projection of sales on Okinawan sweet potatoes is estimated around \$500,000.00 dollars. Sales from ginger are estimated around \$500,000.00 dollars. And, sales from basil are estimated around \$500,000.00 dollars. Second year predictions of sales will double in capacity due to experienced team members and the addition of other value-added products to promote market expansion.

A quarterly report monitoring plan will be established using an equation based on the total weight of premium and "off grade" crops and total sales of value-added food products. Once a baseline is achieved, it will be the model used to measure against the quarterly plan and monitor for improvement. It will help to assist each farm operation in establishing a growing plan based on demand for the processed food products. As a certified facility, Golden Hawaii Inc. will provide insight into a variety of methods to process farm products to accommodate suppliers and customers with desirable "Grown in Hawaii" goods.

The Kia'i a'i food processing center objectives foremost is to establish a are: 1) To meet Governor David Ige's Sustain Hawaii food processing production Initiative to double local food production by 2020; 2) Increase local food production yield and reduce our reliance on imported foods from outside markets; 3) Preserve and restore local will be utilized for farms by processing "off grade" crops into valueadded food products to serve Hawaii residents and world markets; 4) Minimize the effect of "off grade" produce that would impact the "market price" for premium grade crops. And, sales from basil are estimated around \$500,00.00 dollars. Second year predictions of sales will double in capacity due to experienced team members and the addition of other value-added products to promote market expansion.

The responsibilities of the facility will expand in stages based on the capacity of sales accumulated and the quantity of production. Ownership will delegate operational procedures and policies as permitted by law and follow stringent guidelines to ensure the safety and health of employees and products. Staffing personnel to oversee the various operational duties will be conducted by management to ensure protocol is documented and recorded in the various departments: Sales & Marketing, Accounting, Warehouse, Sanitation, Maintenance, and Delivery.

A quarterly report monitoring plan will be established using an equation based on the total weight of premium and "off grade" crops and total sales of value-added food products. Once a baseline is achieved. it will be the model used to measure against the quarterly plan and monitor for improvement. It will help to assist each farm operation in establishing a growing plan based on demand for the processed food products. As a certified facility, Golden Hawaii Inc. will provide insight into a variety of methods to process farm products to accommodate suppliers and customers with desirable "Grown in Hawaii" goods




