I. Background and Summary

1. X A brief description of the applicant's background;

Mālama Kua'āina is a 501(c) (3) ("MK") organization formed in 2012 and established to provide information, education, advocacy and legal resources relating to public issues associated with the preservation and protection of public trust resources and the natural environmental of Kauai.

MK's primary work has been on shoreline and public trust issues, such as beach protection and beach access, planning for coastal hazards, working on community resilience projects, and community and coastal advocacy. Its work includes the restoration of critical habitat for endangered species and protecting dune and the near-shore marine environment for public use and enjoyment of Kauai's world-class resources. As Kauai is one of the most scenic places in the world; MK has worked on community and coastal advocacy to protect Kauai's culture and community. Much of this work has been focused on the North Shore of Kauai.

2. X The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of this Grant in Aid is to assemble, index and organize over 20,000 coastal photographs of Haena and Wainiha Beaches taken over a period of two decades to provide the State of Hawai'i, Department of Land and Natural Resources ("DLNR"), Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands ("OCCL"), and Department of Accounting and General Services ("DAGS") with digital and hardcopy reference tools. This photographic longitudinal survey establishes a historic reference to help identify the upper reaches of the wash of the waves and also track newly planted beach vegetation and the seaward migration and impacts of this "human-induced" vegetation over time on these beaches. The primary objective is to assemble and archive the best of this collection for the State Surveyor, DAGS and the OCCL in both digital and hard copy in a Tax Map Key ("TMK") format for use in shoreline certification and in enforcement of overgrowth of vegetation that inhibits lateral access and transit along the beach. Compilation of this private collection for the State's use, will give OCCL, DLNR and DAGS information to help locate the shoreline and for use in identification and enforcement of vegetative encroachments along these beaches. As many of these photographs predate the "digital" age, technology can now incorporate a geospatial overlay to these photographs offering much more detailed information. A secondary objective is to ensure that these privately held photographs are placed in the public domain

and that this project be used as a model for other communities throughout Hawaii as a means to place important private data in the public domain especially when historic observations are critical.

3. X The public purpose and need to be served;

The public purpose of this project is to protect beaches for public use and recreation in accordance with Haw. Rev. Stat. § 205A-2(b)(9). Public policy, as interpreted by the court, favors extending to public use and ownership as much of Hawai'i's shoreline as is reasonably possible. "Shoreline" means "the upper reaches of the wash of the waves, other than storm or tidal waves, at high tide during the season of the year in which the highest wash of the waves occurs, usually evidenced by the edge of the vegetation growth or the upper limit of debris left by the wash of the waves." The area seaward of the shoreline is part of the State's Conservation District and is regulated by the Department of Land and Natural Resources. In making a shoreline determination pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statues (HRS) §205A-42, the Board of Land and Natural Resources ("BLNR"), must consider the historical evidence of the upper reaches of the wash of the waves.

Unfortunately, windward facing land owners too often apply for shoreline certifications during the summer when the evidence of the upper wash of the waves reflect that season and not the highest wash of waves during the winter season. This project will serve the public interest as this historic collection is photographic evidence of the upper wash of the waves during the winter high wave season, capturing the high energy of Kauai's dynamic North Shore beaches year after year.

The boundary dividing private land from public beaches is the upper reaches of the waves typically represented by the edge of vegetation or the line of debris. The project information would be particularly useful in ensuring shorelines are not determined too far seaward as a result of human induced vegetation. Many years of unenforced vegetative encroachments along these beaches have hindered accurate location of the shoreline as does summer shoreline certification applications and site visits.

Haw. Rev. Stat. § 115-4 (1993) provides for the right of transit along the shorelines. Haw. Rev. Stat. § 115-5(a) (1993) states that the right of transit shall exist seaward of the shoreline and this area shall be defined as a beach transit corridor. Therefore, the location of the shoreline is essential to preserving the well-established public right of access to Hawai'i's shorelines.

This photographic documentation shows the shrinking beach corridor, not only due to sea level rise, but human induced planting of our beaches. Haw. Rev. Stat. § 205A-2 (Supp. 2001) sets forth the objectives and policies for the Coastal Zone Management Program. Among these is Haw. Rev. Stat. § 205A-2(c)(9)(D), which states that in connection with beach protection, it is a policy to prohibit private property owners from creating a public nuisance by inducing or cultivating the private property owner's vegetation in a beach transit corridor.

Through resulting policies and laws, the Hawaii legislature has found that there are many shoreline areas throughout the state where the overgrowth of vegetation inhibits lateral access and transit along the beach, thereby denying the public use and enjoyment of the public domain. The North Shore of Kauai exemplifies these problems and the experiences gleaned from this project can help serve as a model to

collect, develop and preserve information from other areas of the State with similar issues. This project serves the public interest by providing crucial information and documentation to decision makers that will help preserve Hawaii's sandy beaches.

4. X Describe the target population to be served; and

This project will serve every resident and visitor of Kauai who frequents its legendary beaches and could serve as a model for the importance of historic documentation to preserve other beaches throughout Hawaii. Hawaii's beaches are valued by both visitors and residents alike and are important cultural and economic resources.

This project will directly benefit State agencies including the Department of Land and Natural Resources, Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands, and the Department of Accounting and General Services, the agencies tasked with the responsibility of certifying shoreline boundaries.

Located on Kaua'i's North Shore, this project area focuses on Wainiha and Hā'ena Beaches, from Kepuhi Point to Hā'ena County Beach Park. This is in the North Shore Special Planning Area, known for its unique physical, sociologic and cultural characteristics. This area is extremely rich in natural resources and ecological significance. The 1980 North Shore Development Plan Update specifies "maintenance of the natural beauty and ecological systems that characterize the North Shore must take priority over any new development." Beach preservation is a priority in Hā'ena, which has been identified as having a "high statewide significance in the plan." These beaches are valued by both visitors and residents alike and are important cultural and economic resources.



II. Service Summary and Outcomes

The scope of work includes:

- Review of over 20,000 photographs of original, predominately unsorted photograph
 documentation of the beaches of Wainiha and Haena for inclusion for photographic
 data set to be known as the Kaimana Collection. MK has been granted use and access
 of the photographic data to review, index and organize these photographs.
- The photographic documentation began in 1999, before the digital age. MK will review, sort, index and organize all hard copy photographs,
- Select and digitize the photographs with the best representation of beach area over time for the Kaimana Collection.
- The Kaimana Collection will be collated by Tax Map Key ("TMK") so each beach area is identifiable.
- The Kaimana Collection will be organized to produce a series of photographs that show many of these beaches as they transition from undeveloped, unspoiled sandy beaches to present condition.
- The Kaimana Collection will be organized to produce a series of photographs that show beach loss through beach planting and the seaward migration of vegetation on our priceless sandy beaches.
- The Kaimana Collection will be collated to produce a "before and after" photographic comparison for each beach area.

- The Kaimana Collection will be collated to produce a collection of high wash of the wave photographs spanning many years for each beach area.
- Digitize and catalog the Kaimana Collection to make accessible for governmental agencies and to keep it in the public domain.
- The amount of information and photographs of North Shore beaches available is unprecedented, through this project; a historic library of beach change will be generated for these Wainiha and Ha'ena beaches.
- The Kaimana Collection will be digitized and given to the State of Hawaii,
 Department of Accounting and General Services Land Survey Division ("DAGS")
 and the Office of Conservation and Coastal Lands ("OCCL").
- A traditional hard copy of the photographic Kaimana Collection will be given to the State of Hawai'i, DAGS, the OCCL and the State Archives.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

To be completed by the end of 2nd quarter:

- Review, sort, index and organization of all hard copy and digital photographs.
- The photographs will be organized to produce a collection of photographs that show beach loss through planting and the seaward migration of vegetation on our incomparable sandy beaches.
- The photographs will be collated to produce a "before and after" photographic comparison for each beach area.
- The photographs will be collated to produce a collection of high wash of the wave photographs spanning many years for each beach area.

To be completed by the end of 4th quarter:

- Compiling, printing, scanning and delivery of the completed Kaimana Collection for DAGS and OCCL.
- Commence the review of effectiveness.

MK is uniquely suited to work on the organization and indexing of 20 years of photographic documentation of Kauai's North Shore beaches. MK's board members and its Executive Director collectively have many years of experience in planning and land use issues, policy making, library and information sciences. They have been dedicated to protection of Kauai's unique and fragile natural resources and are intimately familiar with Wainiha and Hā'ena beaches. Their comprehensive backgrounds and knowledge of tasks to be completed (sort, identify, organize and index each photograph) will result in the Kaimana Collection, resulting in availability of this information to State agencies and decision makers who are required to consider historic evidence in the determination of setting the shoreline boundary.

The use of these types of photographic documentation was found credible in two landmark Hawaii Supreme Court decisions to accurately establish certified shorelines. MK Executive Director Caren Diamond (represented by Harold Bronstein, Esq.) has had three favorable successful Supreme Court decisions on coastal matters:

- 1. In Diamond v State of Hawaii, October 2006 known as Diamond I, the Supreme Court reaffirmed the shoreline is at the upper reaches of the wash of the waves, and rejected the use of induced vegetation as the vegetation line and shoreline. It reaffirmed the 1968 Ashford decision and the 1973 Sotomura decision, both written by the esteemed late Chief Justice William Richardson. Those opinions defined the state's policy as giving the public as much use and ownership of Hawaii's shoreline as is reasonably possible.
- 2. North Shore Ohana, Harold Bronstein and Caren Diamond v State of Hawaii, July 2007, The Supreme Court found in favor of the NS Ohana and protected the open space fronting the shoreline at the Wainiha Subdivision II, Naue.
- 3. Diamond and Blair v Dobbin and State of Hawai'i, Board of Land and Natural Resources, January 2014, known as Diamond II. In the landmark decision, the Hawaii Supreme Court reaffirmed its decades-old stance that the public is entitled to own and use as much of the beach as possible. The opinion, ordered the state to consider historical evidence in determining shorelines

 - Complies with all applicable federal and state laws prohibiting discrimination against any person on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, creed, sex, age, sexual orientation, or disability;
 - c) Agrees not to use state funds for entertainment or lobbying activities; and
 - d) Allows the state agency to which funds for the grant were appropriated for expenditure, legislative committees and their staff, and the auditor full access to their records, reports, files, and other related documents and information for purposes of monitoring, measuring the effectiveness, and ensuring the proper expenditure of the grant.
- If the applicant is an organization, the applicant meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
 - a) Is incorporated under the laws of the State; and
 - b) Has bylaws or policies that describe the manner in which the activities or services for which a grant is awarded shall be conducted or provided.
- If the applicant is a non-profit organization, it meets the following requirements pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes:
 - a) Is determined and designated to be a non-profit organization by the Internal Revenue Service; and
 - Has a governing board whose members have no material conflict of interest and serve without compensation.

Pursuant to Section 42F-103, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, for grants used for the acquisition of land, when the organization discontinues the activities or services on the land acquired for which the grant was awarded and disposes of the land in fee simple or by lease, the organization shall negotiate with the expending agency for a lump sum or installment repayment to the State of the amount of the grant used for the acquisition of the land.
