A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MARINE EVENTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature recognizes that marine events 1 2 often require more than one year of advance planning in light of 3 the many responsibilities involved. For example, if ocean 4 access during an event will be from private property, the permit 5 applicant must provide proof of permission from the landowner 6 before a permit may be issued. Event organizers experience hardships when the department of land and natural resources is 7 unable to approve or deny permit applications well in advance of 8 9 proposed events. The legislature finds that many individuals have expressed interest in applying to the department of land 10 and natural resources for marine event permits up to one year in 11 12 advance of an event. The legislature is also aware of the immense popularity of regattas, marine parades, surfing contests, and other marine
- 13 14 15 events in the State. During these events, ocean conditions can 16 be extremely hazardous to both participants and spectators.
- 17 Furthermore, spectators may use vessels, thrill craft, drones,

- 2 an event organizer's exclusive use of areas designated for use
- 3 during the event, and put event participants at risk of serious
- 4 injury or death. These issues arose during recent surf
- 5 contests, such as the Peahi Challenge and the Quiksilver in
- 6 Memory of Eddie Aikau.

- 8 (1) Prohibit the holding of a marine event without a
- 9 permit from the department of land and natural
- 10 resources or prior authorization from the United
- 11 States Coast Guard;
- 12 (2) Allow individuals to apply for marine event permits up
- to one year in advance of the date of a proposed
- 14 marine event; and
- 15 (3) Authorize the department of land and natural resources
- 16 to adopt rules to mitigate the hazards posed by
- vessels, thrill craft, drones, and other means used by
- 18 spectators to observe or record regattas, marine
- 19 parades, surfing contests, and other marine events in
- the waters of the State.

14		designated for use during the marine event, to the
15		exclusion of all others who are not the applicant or
16		event participants; provided that the department shall
17		charge an exclusive marine use permit fee for the
18		permit, which shall be higher than the permit fee
19		charged pursuant to paragraph (5); and
20	<u>(7)</u>	Any applicant who has been granted a permit under this
21		section and wants to cancel the permit shall request a

1	cancernation from the department in writing. If an
2	applicant who has been granted a permit under this
3	section submits a cancellation request to the
4	department less than ninety calendar days before the
5	scheduled date of the marine event, the department may
6	assess a cancellation fee.
7	The marine use permit fee, exclusive marine use permit fee,
8	and cancellation fee amounts to be charged by the department
9	pursuant to this subsection shall be determined by the
10	department.
11	(c) The department may adopt rules, pursuant to chapter
12	91, necessary to effectuate this section.
13	(d) As used in this section, "marine event" means an
14	organized water event of limited duration that is conducted
15	according to a prearranged schedule, and by its nature,
16	circumstances, or location, will introduce extra or unusual
17	hazards to the safety of persons or property in the waters of
18	the State.
19	§200- Event spectators; hazards; mitigation. The
20	department may adopt rules, pursuant to chapter 91, to mitigate
-21	the hazards posed by vessels, thrill craft, drones, and other

- means used by spectators to observe or record regattas, marine 1
- 2 parades, surfing contests, and other marine events held in the
- 3 waters of the State; provided that the department shall consult
- 4 the department of transportation and the Federal Aviation
- Administration before adopting rules regulating the use of 5
- 6 drones."
- 7 SECTION 3. The department of land and natural resources
- 8 shall submit a report of its progress in implementing the
- 9 permitting process and adopting rules pursuant to section 2 of
- this Act, including any proposed legislation, to the legislature 10
- no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the regular 11
- session of 2019. 12
- SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored. 13
- SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2018. 14
