# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. According to The Pew Center on the States, one 2 in thirty-two adults in Hawaii is under correctional control. 3 The legislature recognized that the financial, social, and economic costs of incarceration without adequate rehabilitation 4 are staggering, and thus enacted Act 8, Special Session Laws of 5 6 Hawaii 2007 (Act 8), also known as the Community Safety Act of 7 2007 and codified as chapter 353H, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 8 Act 8 established a comprehensive offender reentry system under 9 the purview of the department of public safety. One key 10 component of Act 8 required the department of public safety to submit annual reports relating to the implementation, progress, 11 12 and effectiveness of the various program components specified in
- While the department's annual report listed program

  activities and statistics, it did not include information on

  program outcomes. The legislature finds that use of performance

  indicators is an effective way to monitor and evaluate the

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- 1 philosophical change to the department's approach to
- 2 rehabilitation and reentry mandated by Act 8. Additionally, the
- 3 legislature requires specific data to accurately assess programs
- 4 and to continue to improve public policy.

3	(14)	The median length of incarceration, excluding inmates
4		who have received life sentences or been paroled;
5	(15)	The prison population forecast for the next decade;
6	(16)	The total number of pretrial detainees and the number

8		crime, bail amount, risk assessed, gender, race, and
9		age;
10	(17)	The number of pretrial detainees released or
. 11		discharged each month and the reason for the release
12		or discharge by type of crime, bail amount, risk
13		assessed, gender, race, and age;
14	(18)	The average length of stay for pretrial detainees by
15		reason for release or discharge, type of crime, bail
16		amount, risk assessed, gender, race, and age;
17	(19)	The number of pretrial detainees held on cash bail by
18		type of crime, bail amount, risk assessed, gender,
19		race, and age;

1	(20)	The average amount of time for completing and
2		verifying pretrial risk assessment by type of crime,
3		bail amount, risk assessed, gender, race, and age; and
4	(21)	The number of pretrial detainees readmitted by reason
5		for release, reason for readmission, type of crime,
6	,	bail amount, risk assessed, gender, race, and age.

8	program e	stablished pursuant to this chapter, the department
9	shall sub	mit a report to the legislature no later than the first
10	day of De	cember each year, beginning with the period ending on

12	indicator	s that track rehabilitation and reentry efforts for
13	individua	ls being prepared to exit the correctional system. The
14	report sh	all also include:

14	electroni	cally on the department's website in a timely manner."
15	SECT	ION 3. Section 353G-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended b	y amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
17	"(C)	The department of public safety, in conjunction with
18	the depar	tment of health, shall report on an annual basis to the
19	legislatu	re and to the governor, its findings concerning the
20	need for	and implementation of the various provisions of this

chapter. The report shall include information collected under

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1	subsection (a) and a synopsis of information or data necessary	
2	to determ	ine the impact, utility, and cost-benefits of the
3	provision	s of this chapter. The report shall also include:
4	(1)	A complete list of programs offered;
5	(2)	The length of each program;
6	(3)	Each program's success rate, including the percentage
7		of participant completion in the previous two years;
8	(4)	A description of participant criteria assessed by the
9		<pre>program for admittance;</pre>
10	(5)	The number of available positions with each program;
11	(6)	The number of potential participants on waiting lists;
12	(7)	The number of participants who do not complete the

15		complete a program; and
16	(9)	A complete list of programs no longer offered, with
