Dear President Kouchi, Speaker Saiki, and Members of the Legislature:

Re: SB2461 SD1 HD1 CD1

SB2461 SD1 HD1 CD1, entitled "A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO SERVICE ANIMALS" will become law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the State Constitution.

The purpose of this bill is to 1) establish a civil penalty for knowingly misrepresenting an animal as a service animal; and 2) conform existing Hawai'i law with the definition of "service animal" under the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.

Enforcement of this civil offense may be problematic because there is no official registry or form of recognized identification for a service animal. The ADA prohibits asking any questions beyond "is the dog a service animal, required because of a disability?" and "what task(s) has the dog been trained to perform?" In other words, the ADA makes it illegal to ask about the nature of the person's disability, require proof of the disability, and/or require the animal to perform the stated task. Additionally, owners are allowed to train their own animals, as opposed to being professionally trained.

None of the county police departments submitted testimony. However, it appears they would be the primary agencies responsible for enforcement. It may be difficult to prove in court by a clear and convincing standard that a person knowingly

misrepresented an animal as a service animal. However, it is worth noting that similar legislation is present in at least fifteen other states.

For the foregoing reasons, SB2461 SD1 HD1 CD1 will become law as ACT 217, Session Laws of Hawai'i 2018, effective July 10, 2018, without my signature.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

ACT 217

S.B. NO.

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RELATING TO SERVICE ANIMALS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that there is a growing 2 problem with people fraudulently representing untrained animals 3 as service dogs. This has resulted in legitimate service dogs 4 being needlessly distracted or even attacked by untrained dogs 5 or other animals, as well as in violations of the food and 6 sanitation code. Currently, there is no legal consequence for 7 misrepresenting a pet dog or other animal as a service animal.

8 The legislature further finds that, generally, a service animal is a dog that is individually trained to work or perform 9 10 tasks for people with disabilities. The work or task that a service animal has been trained to provide must be directly 11 related to a person's disability. The legislature affirms that 12 13 a dog or other animal whose sole function is to provide 14 companionship, comfort, or emotional support does not qualify as 15 a service dog under chapter 347, Hawaii Revised Statues, or the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA). 16



will discourage people from fraudulently representing their pets 1-2 as service animals in order to bring the animals into 3 restaurants, supermarkets, and other inappropriate locations. 4 The legislature also finds that statutory penalties will also 5 discourage persons from fraudulently misrepresenting a pet 6 animal as a service animal in order to gain housing amenities 7 which, but for otherwise lawful restrictions on pet ownership, 8 would not be available to residents of a dwelling or building. 9 The legislature finds that such penalties are not inconsistent 10 with the spirit of the ADA. The legislature also finds that an appropriate definition of "service animal" will help businesses 11 12 and other organizations to comply with the law.

13 It is not the legislature's intent to undermine the 14 valuable purpose and goals of the ADA or other applicable state 15 or federal laws. The United States Department of Justice has 16 issued guidance on the guestions that can be asked of a person 17 to determine if a dog is a bona fide service dog, suggesting 18 that it does not violate the ADA to ask questions concerning the 19 specific and appropriate training of a particular dog being 20 presented as a service animal. The legislature further 21 recognizes that more than fifteen states currently prohibit



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1	domestic, trained or untrained, are not service animals for the
2	purposes of this definition. The work or tasks performed by a
3	service animal must relate directly to the individual's
4	disability. Neither the potential crime deterrent effects of an
5	animal's presence nor the provision of emotional support,
6	comfort, or companionship by an animal constitutes work or tasks
7	for the purposes of this definition."
8	SECTION 5. Section 347-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
10	"(b) Every person who is blind, deaf, visually
11	handicapped, or otherwise disabled shall have the right to be
12	accompanied by a service [ <del>dog,</del> ] <u>animal,</u> especially trained for
13	the purpose of assisting the person in any of the places listed
14	in subsection (a) without being required to pay an extra charge
15	for the service [ <del>dog;</del> ] <u>animal;</u> provided that the person shall be
16	liable for any damage done to the premises or facilities by the
17	service [ <del>dog.</del> ] <u>animal.</u> No service [ <del>dog</del> ] <u>animal</u> shall be
18	considered dangerous merely because it is unmuzzled."
19	SECTION 6. Section 347-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended to read as follows:
