A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICATION SYNCHRONIZATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that more than twenty-2 three per cent of Americans currently use three or more 3 prescription medications, and eleven per cent of Americans take 4 five or more medications. According to the most recent data 5 from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the costs 6 of treating patients with chronic diseases account for eighty-7 six per cent of all health care costs in the United States. 8 However, only fifty per cent of those on maintenance medications 9 for chronic diseases adhere to their prescription therapies.

10 The legislature recognizes that studies have shown that 11 medication adherence is critical to long-term positive patient 12 outcomes, and that prescription medications are important tools 13 that can assist in the management of chronic diseases. However, 14 patients often delay or miss their medication refills due to 15 confusion over when prescriptions are needed for refills.

16 The legislature further finds that more than fifteen states17 have passed legislation that enables pharmacies and patients to



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1 work together with their practitioners to synchronize the 2 dispensing of medications. Medication synchronization 3 facilitates the coordination of medication refills so that 4 patients who take two or more maintenance medications for 5 chronic conditions can refill their medications on the same 6 schedule. Medication synchronization improves patient health by 7 improving medication adherence rates, minimizing disruptions in 8 treatment, simplifying patient and caregiver routines, 9 streamlining trips to the pharmacy, reducing costs to insurers, 10 promoting efficient workflow in pharmacies, and synchronizing 11 all of a patient's medications for one pickup day every month. 12 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to facilitate 13 medication synchronization by requiring health insurance plans 14 that provide prescription drug benefits to apply prorated daily 15 cost-sharing rates for prescriptions dispensed by pharmacies. 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 431, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 17 amended by adding a new section to part VI of article 10A to be 18 appropriately designated and to read as follows: 19 "§431:10A- Medication synchronization; proration;

19	that the patient requests or agrees to less than a thirty-day

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1 (F) As authorized by the written instructions of a 2 licensed physician or advanced practice 3 registered nurse with prescriptive authority, 4 initiating or adjusting the drug regimen of a patient pursuant to an order or authorization 5 6 made by the patient's licensed physician or 7 advanced practice registered nurse with 8 prescriptive authority and related to the 9 condition for which the patient has been seen by 10 the licensed physician or advanced practice registered nurse with prescriptive authority; 11 12 provided that the pharmacist shall issue written 13 notification to the patient's licensed physician 14 or advanced practice registered nurse with 15 prescriptive authority or enter the appropriate information in an electronic patient record 16 17 system shared by the licensed physician or advanced practice registered nurse with 18 19 prescriptive authority, within twenty-four hours;
