A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 PART I SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Act 87, Session Laws 2 of Hawaii 2013, was enacted to: (1) remove the president of the 3 4 University of Hawaii from serving as the chief procurement 5 officer for the university for construction contracts and 6 professional services related to construction contracts; (2) 7 transfer authority over those contracts to the state procurement 8 office; and (3) establish an audit committee within the board of 9 regents to review public funds appropriated by the legislature 10 and expended by the university for construction. Since its 11 enactment, Act 87 has resulted in a bifurcated procurement 12 system at the university wherein a different set of rules and procedures applies depending on whether the procurement involves 13 14 construction or construction related professional services for 15 university construction projects. Requirements for construction 16 or professional services furnished by licensees under chapter 17 464, Hawaii Revised Statutes, must comply with the Hawaii public

- 1 procurement code and procedures governing state executive branch
- 2 agencies, while requirements for goods and services must comply
- 3 with the Hawaii public procurement code and university executive
- 4 and administrative procedures governing university transactions.
- 5 In January 2016, the state procurement office issued its
- 6 report to the legislature as required under Act 87, which
- 7 documents the extensive oversight, reviews, and coordination
- 8 between the university and the state procurement office on
- 9 procurement contracts involving construction and professional
- 10 services related to construction. The conclusion of the state
- 11 procurement office in the report was that "based on SPO's review
- 12 of 102 UH construction solicitations, UH's Administrative
- 13 Procedures, and 14 post-award Site Visits, SPO finds that UH is
- 14 conducting construction procurements in a compliant, efficient
- 15 and transparent manner." In the report, the state procurement
- 16 office further set forth minimal recommendations for improvement
- 17 and mentioned several university specific procedures as "best-
- 18 practices".
- 19 The purpose of this part is to reinstate and restore full
- 20 authority to the university president to act as the university's

17		improvement, or facility on any one or more of the

20	(2)	Construct and maintain university projects, including
21		a university project included or to be in a university

1		system; (provided that all procurements for
2		professional services furnished by licensees under
3		chapter 464 for construction projects shall be
4		coordinated with the department of accounting and
5		general services on behalf of the board; provided
6		further that the department of accounting and general
7		services shall not be responsible for procurements
8		determined by both the University of Hawaii and the
9		department of accounting and general services to be
10		professional services furnished by licensees under
11	•	chapter 464 for repair and maintenance;
12	(3)	Combine two or more university projects into a
13		university system on one or more of the areas on any
14		one or more of the educational institutions under the
15		jurisdiction of the board, and to maintain the system;
16	(4)	Combine two or more university projects, university
17		systems, or university projects and university systems
18		into a network, on any one or more of the areas on any
19		one or more of the educational institutions under the
20	t	jurisdiction of the board, and to maintain the
21		network;

(5)	Prescribe and collect rents, fees, and charges for the
	use of or services furnished by any university project
	and the facilities thereof, and pledge any
	appropriation to any university project and the
	facilities thereof that in aggregate, produces revenue
	of the university at least sufficient to comply with
	section 304A-2681;

- (6) With the approval of the governor, issue revenue bonds under this subpart in such principal amount as may be authorized by the legislature from time to time to finance in whole or in part the cost of construction or the cost of maintenance of any university project, including funding reserves therefor;
- (7) Pledge to the punctual payment of revenue bonds and interest thereon, all or any part of the revenue of the university, including any appropriation, in an amount sufficient to pay the revenue bonds and interest as the same become due and to create and maintain reasonable reserves therefor;

1	(0)	Escapitsh a roah program of a commercial paper program

4	(9)	Advance moneys of the university, not otherwise
5		required, and do any and all other lawful acts as may

8	SECT	ION 4. This part shall not be applied so as to impair
9	any contra	act existing as of the effective date of this Act in a
10	manner vi	olative of either the Hawaii State Constitution or
11	Article I	, section 10, of the United States Constitution.
12		PART II
13	SECT	ION 5. The legislature finds that the tuition schedule
14	establish	ed by the University of Hawaii board of regents has
15	created a	n unreasonable increase in the cost of attendance. For
16	example,	tuition fees for resident full-time undergraduate
17	students a	at the University of Hawaii Manoa has been steadily
18	increasing	g since academic year 2011-2012, by approximately 3.1
19	per cent	in 2012-2013, 5.5 per cent in 2013-2014, 7.6 per cent
20	in 2014-2	015, 5.1 per cent in 2015-2016, 5.1 per cent in 2016-

- 1 2017, and tuition fees are scheduled to increase by another 1.9
- per cent in 2018-2019.
- 3 The legislature recognizes that universities need funds to
- 4 operate, and that the University of Hawaii is trying to address
- 5 a substantial deferred repair and maintenance backlog. However,
- 6 the legislature finds that tuition costs at the university have
- 7 consistently and significantly been on the rise, even in recent
- 8 years, such as 2008-2010, during which time the university
- 9 received greater amounts of general fund appropriations from the
- 10 legislature.
- In addition, the legislature is concerned about the
- 12 University of Hawaii's significant increase in spending in
- 13 recent years for personnel expenses, and the lack of
- 14 demonstrated efforts to restructure and use financial resources
- 15 efficiently for the benefit of students. The legislature finds
- 16 that faculty provide a direct connection to university students
- 17 and students' concerns, and that faculty are not currently
- 18 represented on the board of regents.
- 19 The legislature finds that the cost of tuition and fiscal
- 20 administration at the University of Hawaii is a matter of
- 21 statewide concern and that it is in the best interests of the

- 1 State to ensure that all students have affordable access to
- 2 higher education and that state funds are used efficiently by
- 3 the University of Hawaii system for the benefit of students.
- 4 Therefore, the purpose of this part is to:
- (1) Require that two members of the University of Hawaiiboard of regents be faculty members;
- 7 (2) Prohibit the University of Hawaii board of regents
 8 from increasing tuition fees until an unspecified
 9 date; and
- 10 (3) Require the university to provide the legislature with
 11 an analysis of whether current tuition increases are
 12 helping address the university's repair and
 13 maintenance backlog.
- 14 SECTION 6. Section 26-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) The University of Hawaii shall be headed by an executive board to be known as the board of regents.
- The board shall consist of fifteen members. At least one member shall be a University of Hawaii student at the time of the initial appointment. This member may be reappointed for one
- 21 additional term even though the member may no longer be a

- 1 student at the time of reappointment. One member shall be a
- 2 faculty member of a University of Hawaii community college and
- 3 one member shall be a faculty member at the University of Hawaii
- 4 at Manoa, University of Hawaii at Hilo, or University of Hawaii
- 5 West Oahu; provided that the two faculty members shall not be
- 6 faculty members at campuses in the same county; provided further
- 7 that the faculty members shall be exempt from any conflict of
- 8 interest based solely on their positions as faculty within the
- 9 University of Hawaii system. The governor shall reduce the
- 10 terms of those initially appointed to each seat on the board of
- 11 regents to provide, as far as practicable, for the expiration of
- 12 three terms each year; provided that the term of the student
- 13 member shall not be reduced.
- At least twelve members, except for the student [member,]
- 15 and faculty members, shall represent and reside in the specified
- 16 geographic areas as follows:
- 17 (1) Two members from the county of Hawaii;
- 18 (2) Two members from the county of Maui;
- 19 (3) One member from the county of Kauai; and
- 20 (4) Seven members from the city and county of Honolulu.

1	The board shall have the power, in accordance with the
2	Hawaii constitution and with law, to formulate policy and to
3	exercise control over the university through its executive
4	officer, the president of the university. The board shall have
5	exclusive jurisdiction over the internal organization and
6	management of the university. The board may establish board
7	policies necessary to address any potential conflict of interest
8	issues for the two faculty members of the board."
9	SECTION 7. Section 304A-401, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
11	"(a) The board of regents may charge resident and
12	nonresident tuition fees for regular courses of instruction at
13	any University of Hawaii campus, including any community
14	college $[\div]$; provided that the board of regents shall not approve
15	any increase in regular credit or summer session tuition fees
16	until ."
17	SECTION 8. The requirements of section 26-11(a), Hawaii
18	Revised Statutes, as amended by section 2 of this Act, shall
19	apply as follows:
20	(1) Upon the expiration of the term of the at-large member

of the University of Hawaii board of regents whose

12	SECTION	N 9. The University of Hawaii shall submit a report
13	to the legis	slature no later than twenty days before the
14	convening of	f the regular session of 2018 regarding the status of
15	the univers	ity's repair and maintenance costs and whether the
16	tuition inc	reases effective for the 2018-2021 academic years are
17	assisting in	a addressing the repair and maintenance backlog.

Report Title:

University of Hawaii; President; Chief Procurement Officer; Board of Regents; Faculty Members; Tuition; Limits; Repair and Maintenance Costs

Description:

Reinstates the President of the University of Hawaii as the chief procurement officer for contracts for construction and construction related professional services furnished by licensees under chapter 464, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Requires that two members of the University of Hawaii board of regents be faculty members. Prohibits the University of Hawaii board of regents from increasing tuition fees until an unspecified date. Requires the university to report to the legislature regarding tuition increases and the university's repair and maintenance costs. (Proposed SD1)
