

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS AND THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII CENTER ON AGING TO CONVENE A WORKING GROUP TO REVIEW IN-HOME CARE SERVICES AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF CARE.

WHEREAS, by 2020, nearly three hundred thousand people will 1 be age sixty-five or older in Hawaii; and 2 3 WHEREAS, a significant percentage of these individuals will 4 5 need life sustaining assistance with the necessary activities of their daily lives, such as bathing, moving, eating, toileting, 6 preparing food, cleaning, and essential shopping, among others 7 8 to support their continued quality of life; and 9 WHEREAS, when given the choice, most individuals prefer to 10 receive care at home; and 11 12 WHEREAS, home care is less expensive than facility based 13 care; and 14 15 WHEREAS, families regularly report an inability to access 16 home care as a result of a shortage of available care workers; 17 and 18 19 20 WHEREAS, home care worker is the fastest growing job in the United States, and home care workers comprise a majority of the 21 22 total direct care workforce; and 23 24 WHEREAS, more than ninety percent of home care workers are women; and 25 26 WHEREAS, home care workers in Hawaii are increasingly 27 caring for highly complex client needs, including conditions 28 such as dementia, severe and persistent mental illness, 29 paraplegia, post-traumatic stress disorder, and multiple and 30

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complex chronic diseases which may require specialized training 1 2 or certification to treat properly; and 3 4 WHEREAS, there is a need to understand the correlation 5 between caregiver pay, benefits, and training, and the quality 6 of care provided; and 7 8 WHEREAS, there is a need to study the provision of home health care in Hawaii and make recommendations to improve the 9 system; now, therefore, 10 11 12 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 13 of 2018, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Labor and 14 Industrial Relations (DLIR) and the University of Hawaii (UH) 15 Center on Aging are requested to convene a working group to: 16 17 Review the provision of in-home care services in 18 (1)19 Hawaii; 20 (2) Make recommendations that will improve the quality of 21 22 care; and 23 24 (3) Include its review and recommendations in a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 25 26 Regular Session of 2019; and 27 28 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the DLIR and UH Center on Aging are requested to convene the in-home care services working group 29 30 no later than July 1, 2018; and 31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the in-home care services 32 working group's review of the provision of home care in Hawaii 33 and report include: 34 35 A description of the various ways in which people in (1)36 Hawaii receive home care; 37 38 A description of the home care workforce, including 39 (2) the relationship of home care workers to the people 40 41 they are caring for; 42
