HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING VARIOUS GOVERNMENT ENTITIES TO DEVELOP, UPDATE, AND INTRODUCE POLICIES RELATED TO HELICOPTER AIR TOURS AT THE STATE AND NATIONAL LEVEL.

WHEREAS, the most popular helicopter tour destination on 1 2 the island of Hawai'i is Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, which recently celebrated its one hundredth anniversary; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park is managed by the Director of the National Park Service, which is a bureau of the 6 United States Department of the Interior, and has more non-7 8 essential tour helicopter overflights than any other individual park in the nation; and 9 10 WHEREAS, in 2015, 14,630 flights within Hawai'i Volcanoes 11 National Park were reported by the helicopter industry; and 12 13 WHEREAS, as one of only three national parks that collects 14 air tour fees, Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park collected \$356,850 15 in air tour fees in 2014; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, as of September 2016, up to fourteen helicopter tour companies operated within Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park 19 under interim operating authority; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, helicopter noise as a result of commercial air tour flights over residential areas in the east Hawai'i region of 23 the island of Hawai'i has reached an unprecedented level in 24 25 recent years; and 26 WHEREAS, residents in Hāmākua, Hilo, Mountain View, Puna, 27 Volcano, and Ka'ū have continued to raise issues of overflights, 28 noise complaints, and safety with the Hawai'i State Department of 29 Transportation, Honolulu Flight Standards District Office of the 30 Federal Aviation Administration, and air tour helicopter 31 32 operators; and



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1 WHEREAS, the National Parks Overflight Act of 1987 requires 2 3 a minimum of five thousand feet above ground level altitude over 4 any national park; and 5 6 WHEREAS, due to the absence of a congressionally mandated Air Tour Management Plan, some tour operators operating within 7 Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park are allowed to descend to five 8 hundred feet above ground level and as low as two hundred feet 9 10 above ground level over razorback ridges; and 11 12 WHEREAS, these operations are not just a noise issue, but a 13 flight safety issue as well; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the Federal Aviation Administration has jurisdiction over all airspace in the country and has the power 16 to regulate all aspects of civil aviation; and 17 18 19 WHEREAS, in 2000, the National Environmental Policy Act, in conjunction with the National Parks Air Tour Management Act of 20 2000, required an Air Tour Management Plan to be implemented at 21 22 various national parks throughout the country; and 23 24 WHEREAS, the objective of an Air Tour Management Plan is 25 "to develop acceptable and effective measures to mitigate or prevent the significant adverse impacts, if any, of commercial 26 27 air tour operations upon the natural and cultural resources, visitor experiences and tribal lands"; and 28 29 WHEREAS, in 2004, the Federal Aviation Administration and 30 31 National Park Service asked for comments on an Air Tour Management Plan Environmental Assessment relating to managing 32 33 commercial air tour overflights at Hawai'i Volcanoes National 34 Park; and 35 WHEREAS, in 2005, the project was upgraded to an 36 Environmental Impact Statement, and the Federal Aviation 37 38 Administration published a notice of opportunity for commercial air tour operators granted interim operating authority to review 39 and self-correct annual authorizations; and 40 41



1 WHEREAS, in 2007, a planning team composed of staff from 2 the Federal Aviation Administration, National Park Service, and 3 Volpe National Transportations Systems Center began work on 4 preliminary alternatives for air tour operations over Hawai'i 5 Volcanoes National Park; and 6 7 WHEREAS, in 2008, Federal Aviation Administration and 8 National Park Service staff met with Hawai'i air tour operators, 9 and acoustic monitoring of three sites at Hawai'i Volcanoes 10 National Park was conducted; and 11 WHEREAS, in 2011, a preliminary draft Air Tour Management 12 Plan for Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park was published, 13 14 identifying five alternatives for public comment, and three open 15 house public meetings on the draft plan were held in April 2011, in Volcano, Pahoa, and Na'alehu; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, seven years later, in 2018, there is still no final Air Tour Management Plan for Hawai'i Volcanoes National 19 Park; and 20 21 22 WHEREAS, additionally, after more than sixteen years, no Air Tour Management Plan for any national park in the nation has 23 24 been completed; and 25 26 WHEREAS, consequently, the only rules that govern 27 helicopter and fixed wing air tours over the airspace of the Hawaiian islands is the Hawai'i Air Tour Common Procedures 28 Manual, a Federal Aviation Administration document that was 29 issued in 2008; and 30 31 32 WHEREAS, the Hawai'i Air Tour Common Procedures Manual covers rules over all islands and air tour operators that have 33 34 been granted interim operating authority; and 35 36 WHEREAS, this manual is nearly ten years old, and its rules 37 and prescribed altitudes for overflights over land are unclear; and 38 39



1 WHEREAS, in 2010, the census for the State showed that the island of Hawai'i, particularly east Hawai'i, was the fastest 2 growing region in the State; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, the population of Puna has reached forty-five thousand residents, and the majority of air tour overflights 6 transit over these residential areas on their way to Hawai'i 7 8 Volcanoes National Park on a daily basis; and 9 10 WHEREAS, additionally, when air tours depart Hawai'i 11 Volcanoes National Park, they typically fly a route toward the waterfall attractions in North Hilo, traveling over Volcano, 12 13 Mountain View, Waiākea-Uka, Kaumana, North Hilo, Hāmākua, and 14 Honoka'a; and 15 WHEREAS, it is essential to achieve a balance between 16 17 residents and the tour industry that respects the peace and serenity that all residents in east Hawaii should be able to 18 19 enjoy; and 20 21 WHEREAS, visitors that come to Hawai'i Volcanoes National 22 Park from around the world should also be able to enjoy that same peace and tranquility, as well as the precious ecosystems 23 24 and wildlife that exist in Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park; now, 25 therefore, 26 27 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 28 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2018, the Senate concurring, that the respective government 29 30 entities are urged to develop, update, and introduce policies related to helicopter air tours at the state and national level; 31 32 and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Federal Aviation 35 Administration is urged to complete the Air Tour Management Plan for Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, Haleakala, and other 36 designated national parks throughout the nation; and 37 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of Transportation, Federal Aviation Administration, and Honolulu 40



1 Flight Standards District Office are urged to update the nearly decade old Hawai'i Air Tour Common Procedures Manual; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor, Hawai'i State 4 Director of the Transportation, Hawai'i State General Aviation 5 6 Officer, and Honolulu Flight Standards District Office are urged to work with community stakeholders and the local helicopter 7 tour industry to update air tour flight paths to include a 8 proposed off-shore route, altitudes, reporting procedures, and 9 noise mitigation operations that can alleviate helicopter noise 10 pollution, while also providing the highest level of safety for 11 helicopter tour operators; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawai'i congressional delegation is urged to introduce legislation addressing 15 helicopter tour operations and noise pollution surrounding 16 17 America's highly populated cities, towns, and communities; and 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawai'i air tour operators are urged to meet with community stakeholders once a quarter to work 20 21 together to address concerns related to noise complaints and 22 safety issues; and 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawai'i air tour operators are urged to operate helicopter air tours no earlier than sunrise 25 and no later than sunset on normal business days and no earlier 26 27 than one hour after sunrise and one hour before sunset on the 28 weekends and holidays; and 29 30 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Administrator of the 31 Federal Aviation Administration, Director of the United States 32 Department of Transportation, Deputy Director of the National 33 34 Park Service, Hawaii's congressional delegation, Manager of the 35 Honolulu Flight Standards District Office, Governor of the State of Hawai'i, Hawai'i State Director of Transportation, Hawai'i 36 37
