A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HOUSING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that from 2015 to 2025,
- 2 Hawaii will require an additional 64,700 housing units to meet
- 3 projected long-term housing demands. Of this amount, 22,247
- 4 households of all income levels will require rental units. The
- 5 legislature further finds that the need is greatest for
- 6 households with low to middle incomes.
- 7 Approximately ninety-three to ninety-five per cent of
- 8 rental unit tenants have a household income of less than one
- 9 hundred forty per cent of the Hawaii median income. Until now,
- 10 the private sector has been unable to produce sufficient rental
- 11 housing because of the difficult economics of building and
- 12 operating rental housing in Hawaii. The legislature further
- 13 finds that a group of private sector landowners, developers,
- 14 contractors, architects, engineers, and labor unions have agreed
- 15 to take meaningful steps to improve the economics of building
- 16 and operating rental housing in the State.



1	The purpose of this Act is to improve the economics of
2	building and operating rental housing in the State by:
3	(1) Expanding the types of rental housing projects that
4	can be exempt from general excise taxes; and
5	(2) Allowing the terms of collective bargaining agreements
6	and associated provisions to be deemed the prevailing
7	wages and terms serving as the basis of compliance
8	with chapter 104, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for the
9	construction of certain rental housing projects.
10	SECTION 2. Section 104-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
11	amended to read as follows:
12	"§104-2 Applicability; wages, hours, and other
13	requirements. (a) This chapter shall apply to every contract
14	in excess of \$2,000 for construction of a public work project to
15	which a governmental contracting agency is a party; provided
16	that this chapter shall not apply to experimental and
17	demonstration housing developed pursuant to section 46-15 or
18	housing developed pursuant to chapter 201H if the cost of the
19	project is less than \$500,000 and the eligible bidder or
20	eligible developer is a private nonprofit corporation.
21	For the purposes of this subsection:

- 1 "Contract" includes but is not limited to any agreement,
- 2 purchase order, or voucher in excess of \$2,000 for construction
- 3 of a public work project.
- 4 "Governmental contracting agency" includes:
- 5 (1) Any person or entity that causes either directly or
- 6 indirectly the building or development of a public
- 7 work; and
- 8 (2) Any public-private partnership.
- 9 "Party" includes eligible bidders for and eligible
- 10 developers of any public work and any housing under chapter
- 11 201H; provided that this subsection shall not apply to any
- 12 housing developed under section 46-15 or chapter 201H if the
- 13 entire cost of the project is less than \$500,000 and the
- 14 eliqible bidder or eliqible developer is a private nonprofit
- 15 corporation.
- 16 (b) Every laborer and mechanic performing work on the job
- 17 site for the construction of any public work project shall be
- 18 paid no less than prevailing wages; provided that:
- 19 (1) The prevailing wages shall be established by the
- 20 director as the sum of the basic hourly rate and the
- 21 cost to an employer of providing a laborer or mechanic

1		with fringe benefits. In making prevailing wage
2		determinations, the following shall apply:
3		(A) The director shall make separate findings of:
4		(i) The basic hourly rate; and
5		(ii) The rate of contribution or cost of fringe
6		benefits paid by the employer when the
7		payment of the fringe benefits by the
8		employer constitutes a prevailing practice.
9		The cost of fringe benefits shall be
10		reflected in the wage rate scheduled as an
11		hourly rate; and
12		(B) The rates of wages which the director shall
13		regard as prevailing in each corresponding
14		classification of laborers and mechanics shall be
15		the rate of wages paid to the greatest number of
16		those employed in the State, the modal rate, in
17		the corresponding classes of laborers or
18		mechanics on projects that are similar to the
19		contract work;
20	(2)	[The] Except for the prevailing wage established by
21		subsections (h) and (i) for section 201H-36(a)(5)

projects, the prevailing wages shall be not less than the wages payable under federal law to corresponding classes of laborers and mechanics employed on public works projects in the State that are prosecuted under contract or agreement with the government of the United States; and

- (3) Notwithstanding the provisions of the original contract, the prevailing wages shall be periodically adjusted during the performance of the contract in an amount equal to the change in the prevailing wage as periodically determined by the director.
- 12 No laborer or mechanic employed on the job site of any 13 public work of the State or any political subdivision thereof 14 shall be permitted or required to work on Saturday, Sunday, or a 15 legal holiday of the State or in excess of eight hours on any 16 other day unless the laborer or mechanic receives overtime 17 compensation for all hours worked on Saturday, Sunday, and a 18 legal holiday of the State or in excess of eight hours on any 19 other day. The rate for overtime compensation and any other 20 premium rates of pay shall be those rates specified in an

- 1 applicable collective bargaining agreement when the basic hourly
- 2 rate is established by a collective bargaining agreement.
- For purposes of determining overtime compensation under
- 4 this subsection, the basic hourly rate of any laborer or
- 5 mechanic shall not be less than the basic hourly rate determined
- 6 by the director to be the prevailing basic hourly rate for
- 7 corresponding classes of laborers and mechanics on projects of
- 8 similar character in the State.
- **9** (d) The contractor or the contractor's subcontractor shall
- 10 pay all mechanics and laborers employed on the job site,
- 11 unconditionally and not less often than once a week, and without
- 12 deduction or rebate on any account, except as allowed by law,
- 13 the full amounts of their wages including overtime, accrued to
- 14 not more than five working days prior to the time of payment, at
- 15 wage rates not less than those deemed to be prevailing,
- 16 regardless of any contractual relationship which may be alleged
- 17 to exist between the contractor or subcontractor and the
- 18 laborers and mechanics. The rates of wages to be paid shall be
- 19 posted by the contractor in a prominent and easily accessible
- 20 place at the job site, and a copy of the rates of wages required
- 21 to be posted shall be given to each laborer and mechanic

- 1 employed under the contract by the contractor at the time each
- 2 laborer and mechanic is employed, except that where there is a
- 3 collective bargaining agreement the contractor does not have to
- 4 provide the contractor's employees the wage rate schedules.
- 5 (e) The governmental contracting agency may withhold from
- 6 the contractor so much of the accrued payments as the
- 7 governmental contracting agency may consider necessary to pay to
- 8 the laborers and mechanics employed by the contractor or any
- 9 subcontractor on the job site the difference between the
- 10 prevailing wages and the wages received and not refunded by the
- 11 laborers and mechanics.
- 12 (f) Every contract in excess of \$2,000 for construction of
- 13 a public work project and the specifications for such contract
- 14 shall include provisions that set forth the requirements of
- 15 subsections (a) to (e); provided that failure by the contracting
- 16 agency to include those provisions in the contract or
- 17 specifications shall not be a defense of the contractor or
- 18 subcontractor for noncompliance with the requirements of this
- 19 chapter.
- 20 (g) For any public work project that is subject to this
- 21 chapter but not directly caused by a governmental contracting

- 1 agency, the director shall be responsible for enforcement of
- 2 this chapter, including the collection and maintenance of
- 3 certified copies of all payrolls that are subject to this
- 4 chapter. The director shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91
- 5 to effectuate the purposes of this section.
- **6** (h) When:
- 7 (1) The department of budget and finance enters <u>into</u> a

 8 project agreement with a project party, as those terms

 9 are defined in chapter 39A, to finance or refinance a

 10 project with the proceeds of special purpose revenue

 11 bonds;
- 12 (2) The project party has entered into a collective
 13 bargaining agreement with a bona fide labor union
 14 governing the project party's workforce; and
- 15 (3) The collective bargaining agreement has been properly

 16 submitted to the director under section 104-34,
- 17 the terms of the collective bargaining agreement and associated
 18 provisions shall be deemed the prevailing wages and terms
- 19 serving as the basis of compliance with this chapter for work on
- 20 the project by the project party's workforce; provided that this
- 21 subsection does not affect the director's enforcement powers

1	contained	in subsection (g). If the terms of the collective
2	bargainin	g agreement and associated provisions do not include
3	wages, th	en the prevailing wage shall be no less than the wages
4	payable u	nder federal law to corresponding classes of laborers
5	and mecha	nics employed on housing projects in the State that are
6	prosecute	d under contract or agreement with the government of
7	the Unite	d States.
8	<u>(i)</u>	When:
9	(1)	The Hawaii housing finance and development corporation
10		has approved and certified for exemption from general
11		excise taxes a qualified person or firm involved with
12		a newly constructed, or moderately or substantially
13		rehabilitated project under section 201H-36(a)(5);
14	(2)	The qualified person or firm has entered into a
15		contract with a general contractor or subcontractors
16		whose workforce is subject to either:
17		(A) A collective bargaining agreement with a bona
18		fide labor union and for which a special
19		prevailing wage schedule for the laborers and
20		mechanics employed for the construction project
21		has been approved by the director; or

1	<u>(B)</u>	A project labor agreement with a group whose
2		wages are reflected in the Hawaii prevailing wage
3		schedule for which a prevailing wage for section
4		201H-36(a)(5) projects, for the laborers and
5		mechanics employed for the construction project
6		has been approved by the director; and
7	<u>(3)</u> <u>The</u>	qualified person or firm has received no other
8	dire	ct or indirect financing for the construction
9	proj	ect from any other governmental contracting agency
10	incl	uding the Hawaii housing finance and development
11	corp	oration,
12	the terms of t	he prevailing wages for section 201H-36(a)(5)
13	projects shall	be deemed the prevailing wages serving as the
14	basis of compl	iance with this chapter for work on the project."
15	SECTION 3	. Section 201H-36, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended by ame	ending subsection (a) to read as follows:
17	"(a) In	accordance with section 237-29, the corporation
18	may approve an	d certify for exemption from general excise taxes
19	any qualified	person or firm involved with a newly constructed,
20	or moderately	or substantially rehabilitated project:
21	(1) Deve	eloped under this part;

7		of Housing and Urban Development, of which at least
8		twenty per cent of the available units are for
9		households with incomes at or below eighty per cent of
10		the area median family income as determined by the
11		United States Department of Housing and Urban
12		Development; provided that the tax exemption
13		established under this paragraph shall be available
14		for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2017."
15	SECT	ION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stric	ken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECT	ION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050, and
18	shall be	repealed on ; provided that sections 104-2 and
19	201H-36,	Hawaii Revised Statutes, shall be reenacted in the form
20	in which	they read on the day prior to the effective date of
21	this Act.

Description:

Allows the terms of collective bargaining agreements and associated provisions to be deemed the prevailing wages and terms serving as the basis of compliance with chapter 104, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for the construction of certain rental housing projects.
