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## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO A YOUTH ADVISORY COMMISSION.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that increasing youth 2 participation in the public policymaking process is a vital 3 state interest because Hawaii has the lowest voter participation 4 rate in the United States. In 2008, Hawaii had the lowest voter participation rate among eighteen to twenty-nine year olds in 5 6 the country, at thirty-one per cent, compared to fifty-seven per 7 cent voter participation among those thirty years of age and 8 older.

9 The legislature further finds that young people aged 10 sixteen and seventeen may work, pay taxes, marry, and drive. 11 However, they are denied a formal role in the political process 12 because they are prohibited from voting. Because young people 13 under the age of eighteen may not vote, they deserve access and 14 input through other means to the policymaking process.

Many of the most persistent issues facing the State, such as affordable housing, jobs, and education, primarily affect young people. Young people are the ones who need a place to live, depend on good employment to support themselves and their 2017-1284 SB1220 SD1 SMA.doc

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families, and seek quality education for their children. Yet
 after many decades, these issues remain among the most difficult
 to address.

4 The legislature further finds that a youth advisory 5 commission would enable a greater role for young people in the 6 policymaking process. Furthermore, the legislature and governor 7 would benefit from additional formal input from young people on 8 the effect of legislation on young people in the State.

9 The purpose of this Act is to:

Establish a youth advisory commission within the 10 (1)office of youth services to advise the governor and 11 legislature on the effects of legislative policies, 12 13 needs, assessments, priorities, programs, and budgets 14 concerning the youth of the State; and Appropriate funds for the hiring of one staff position 15 (2) 16 to administer the youth advisory commission. 17 SECTION 2. Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

18 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 19 and to read as follows:

# 20 "§352D- Youth advisory commission. (a) There is 21 established within the office of youth services, for

9	(1)	Five members shall be appointed by the governor;
10		provided that the governor shall ensure that each
11		county is represented by at least one appointment;
12		provided further that the governor shall ensure that
13		at least one member is a previous recipient of youth
14		services;
15	(2)	Five members shall be appointed by the president of
16		the senate; and
17	(3)	Five members shall be appointed by the speaker of the
18		house of representatives;
19	provided	that the president of the senate and the speaker of the
20	house of	representatives shall consider, to the extent feasible,
21	a diverse	cross section of race color religion creed sex

21 a diverse cross section of race, color, religion, creed, sex,



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1	sexual or	ientation, gender identity, national origin, ancestry,
2	age, vete	ran status, disability, genetic information, and
3	military	service when making their appointments.
4	<u>(c)</u>	Each member shall be appointed for a term of two
5	years; pr	ovided that the initial terms of the appointed members
6	shall be	staggered as follows:
7	(1)	Six members, two each appointed by the governor, the
8		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house,
9		to serve three-year terms;
10	(2)	Six members, two each appointed by the governor, the
11		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house,
12		to serve two-year terms; and
13	(3)	Three members, one each appointed by the governor, the
14		president of the senate, and the speaker of the house,
15		to serve one-year terms.
16	(d)	The members of the youth advisory commission shall not
17	be subjec	t to section 26-34. The members of the youth advisory
18	commissio	n shall be reimbursed for expenses, including travel
19	expenses,	incurred in their duties relating to the commission.
20	<u>(e)</u>	The youth advisory commission shall annually elect a
21	chairpers	on.

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1	(f) Eight members of the youth advisory commission shall				
2	constitute a quorum to do business. Any action taken by the				
3	commission shall be validated by a simple majority of the				
4	quorum.				
5	(g) The youth advisory commission members may invite other				
6	individuals to participate in commission activities as				
7	temporary, nonvoting members."				
8	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general				
9	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so				
10	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and				
11	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal				
12	year 2018-2019 for the hiring of one staff position to				
13	administer the youth advisory commission.				
14	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the office of				
15	youth services for the purposes of this Act.				
16	SECTION 4. New statutory material is underscored.				
17	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
