A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PHARMACISTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many Americans lack
- 2 adequate access to primary health care and this lack of access
- 3 is only expected to worsen as demand increases. Despite this
- 4 demand, however, pharmacists are conveniently accessible health
- 5 care professionals who are capable of playing a greater role in
- 6 the delivery of health care services. While pharmacists
- 7 primarily assist patients with access and information related to
- 8 prescription medications, pharmacists are also providing a broad
- 9 spectrum of services within their scope of practice, including
- 10 conducting health and wellness testing, managing chronic
- 11 diseases, performing medication management, administering
- 12 immunizations, and working in and partnering with hospitals and
- 13 health systems to advance health and wellness.
- 14 The purpose of this Act is to increase access and improve
- 15 the quality of health care by enabling pharmacists to provide
- 16 patient care services that are consistent with their education,
- 17 training, and license.



1 SECTION 2. Chapter 431, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to article 10A to be appropriately designated and to read as follows: 3 4 "§431:10A- Clinical pharmacy; patient care services 5 coverage. (a) Each individual or group accident and health or 6 sickness insurance policy, contract, plan, or agreement issued 7 or renewed in this State after December 31, 2017, shall provide 8 to insureds coverage for patient care services provided by a 9 registered pharmacist pursuant to section 461- . 10 (b) Coverage under this section may be subject to 11 copayment, deductible, and coinsurance provisions of an accident 12 and health or sickness insurance policy that are no less 13 favorable than the copayment, deductible, and coinsurance 14 provisions for other medical services covered by the policy." 15 SECTION 3. Chapter 432, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 16 amended by adding a new section to article 1 to be appropriately 17 designated and to read as follows: 18 "§432:1- Clinical pharmacy; patient care services 19 coverage. (a) Each individual or group hospital and medical 20 service corporation contract issued or renewed in this State 21 after December 31, 2017, shall provide to insureds coverage for

- 1 patient care services provided by a registered pharmacist
- 2 pursuant to section 461- .
- 3 (b) Coverage under this section may be subject to
- 4 copayment, deductible, and coinsurance provisions of a hospital
- 5 and medical service corporation contract that are no less
- 6 favorable than the copayment, deductible, and coinsurance
- 7 provisions for other medical services covered by the contract."
- 8 SECTION 4. Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 10 and to read as follows:
- 11 "§461- Authority to practice clinical pharmacy; patient
- 12 care services. (a) In accordance with rules adopted by the
- 13 board, a registered pharmacist may engage in the practice of
- 14 clinical pharmacy.
- 15 (b) The board shall adopt rules allowing a pharmacist to
- 16 provide patient care services pursuant to this section,
- 17 including the establishment of protocols for the provision of
- 18 patient care services."
- 19 SECTION 5. Section 432D-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended to read as follows:

- 1 "§432D-23 Required provisions and benefits.
- 2 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, each
- 3 policy, contract, plan, or agreement issued in the State after
- 4 January 1, 1995, by health maintenance organizations pursuant to
- 5 this chapter, shall include benefits provided in sections
- 6 431:10-212, 431:10A-115, 431:10A-115.5, 431:10A-116, 431:10A-
- 7 116.2, 431:10A-116.5, 431:10A-116.6, 431:10A-119, 431:10A-120,
- 8 431:10A-121, 431:10A-122, 431:10A-125, 431:10A-126, 431:10A-132,
- 9 431:10A-133, 431:10A-134, 431:10A-140, and [431:10A-134,]
- 10 431:10A- , and chapter 431M."
- 11 SECTION 6. Section 461-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended as follows:
- 1. By adding three new definitions to be appropriately
- 14 inserted and to read:
- ""Clinical pharmacy agreement" means an agreement between a
- 16 pharmacist and a health care organization or a practitioner that
- 17 permits the pharmacist to engage in the practice of clinical
- 18 pharmacy for the benefit of the patients of the health care
- 19 organization or practitioner.

1	"Pat	ient care services" means pharmacist services furnished
2	by a phar	macist, individually or on behalf of a pharmacy
3	provider:	
4	(1)	That the pharmacist is legally authorized to perform
5		in the State;
6	(2)	As would otherwise be covered if furnished by a
7		physician, or as an incident to a physician's service;
8		and
9	(3)	In a setting located in a health professional shortage
10		area as defined in section 332 of the Public Health
11		Service Act, medically underserved area, or medically
12		underserved population as defined in section 330 of
13		the Public Health Service Act.
14	"Pra	ctice of clinical pharmacy" means:
15	(1)	The health science discipline in which, in conjunction
16		with the patient's other practitioners, a pharmacist
17		provides patient care to optimize medication therapy
18		and to promote disease prevention and the patient's
19		health and wellness;
20	(2)	The provision of patient care services, including but
21		not limited to medication therapy management,

1		comprehensive medication review, and post-diagnostic
2		disease state management services; and
3	(3)	The practice of pharmacy by a pharmacist pursuant to a
4		clinical pharmacy agreement."
5	2.	By amending the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to
6	read:	
7	""Pr	actice of pharmacy" means:
8	(1)	The interpretation and evaluation of prescription
9		orders; the compounding, dispensing, and labeling of
10		drugs and devices (except labeling by a manufacturer,
11		packer, or distributor of nonprescription drugs and
12		commercially legend drugs and devices); the
13		participation in drug selection and drug utilization
14		reviews; the proper and safe storage of drugs and
15		devices and the maintenance of proper records
16		therefor; the responsibility for advising when
17		necessary or where regulated, of therapeutic values,
18		content, hazards, and use of drugs and devices;
19	(2)	Performing the following procedures or functions as
20		part of the care provided by and in concurrence with a
21		"health care facility" and "health care service" as

1	defined in section 323D-2, or a "pharmacy" or a
2	licensed physician or a licensed advanced practice
3	registered nurse with prescriptive authority, or a
4	"managed care plan" as defined in section 432E-1, or
5	patient care services, in accordance with policies,
6	procedures, or protocols developed collaboratively by
7	health professionals, including physicians and
8	surgeons, pharmacists, and registered nurses, and for
9	which a pharmacist has received appropriate training
10	required by these policies, procedures, or protocols:
11	(A) Ordering or performing routine drug therapy
12	related patient assessment procedures;
13	(B) Ordering drug therapy related laboratory tests;
14	(C) Initiating emergency contraception oral drug
15	therapy in accordance with a written
16	collaborative agreement approved by the board,
17	between a licensed physician or advanced practice
18	registered nurse with prescriptive authority and
19	a pharmacist who has received appropriate
20	training that includes programs approved by the
21	American Council of Pharmaceutical Education

1		(ACPE), curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-
2		accredited college of pharmacy, state or local
3		health department programs, or programs
4		recognized by the board of pharmacy;
5	(D)	Administering drugs orally, topically, by
6		intranasal delivery, or by injection, pursuant to
7		the order of the patient's licensed physician or
8		advanced practice registered nurse with
9		prescriptive authority, by a pharmacist having
10		appropriate training that includes programs
11		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based programs
12		from an ACPE-accredited college of pharmacy,
13		state or local health department programs, or
14		programs recognized by the board of pharmacy;
15	(E)	Administering:
16		(i) Immunizations orally, by injection, or by
17		intranasal delivery, to persons eighteen
18		years of age or older by a pharmacist having
19		appropriate training that includes programs
20		approved by the ACPE, curriculum-based
21		programs from an ACPE-accredited college of

4	(ii) Vaccines to persons between fourteen and	d

11			other licensure is required; or
12		(I)	Dispensing an opioid antagonist in accordance
13	·		with a written collaborative agreement approved
14			by the board, between a licensed physician and a
15			pharmacist who has received appropriate training
16			that includes programs approved by the American
17			Council on Pharmaceutical Education (ACPE),
18	ı		curriculum-based programs from an ACPE-accredited
19			college of pharmacy, state or local health
20			department programs, or programs recognized by
21			the board; and

1	(3) The offering or performing of those acts, services,			
2	operations, or transactions necessary in the conduct,			
3	operation, management, and control of pharmacy."			
4	SECTION 7. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary,			
5	reimbursement for the provision of patient care services by			
6	registered pharmacists pursuant to this Act shall apply to all			
7	health benefits plans under chapter 87A, Hawaii Revised			
8	Statutes, issued, renewed, modified, altered, or amended on or			
9	after the effective date of this Act.			
10	SECTION 8. Reimbursement for the provision of patient care			
11	services by registered pharmacists pursuant to this Act shall			
12	apply to all plans under medicaid managed care programs in the			
13	State.			
14	SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed			
15	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.			
16	SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017;			
17	provided that section 8 shall take effect upon approval of the			
18	Hawaii medicaid state plan by the Centers for Medicare and			
19	Medicaid Services.

Pharmacists; Practice of Clinical Pharmacy; Patient Care Services; Mandatory Coverage; Medicaid

Description:

Authorizes pharmacists to practice clinical pharmacy, including providing patient care services. Defines "clinical pharmacy agreement", "patient care services", and "practice of clinical pharmacy". Requires all insurers in the State, including health benefit plans under chapter 87A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and medicaid managed care programs, to reimburse pharmacists who provide patient care services.
