
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII ASSOCIATION OF CONSERVATION DISTRICTS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii
2 association of conservation districts, through coordination,
3 facilitation, and partnerships, assists government agencies in
4 identifying and implementing culturally-sensitive projects and
5 practices to ensure the protection of Hawaii's environment.
6 Chapter 180, Hawaii Revised Statutes, authorizes the soil and
7 water conservation districts to operate as government
8 subdivisions to educate the public and construct and maintain
9 conservation projects and programs in Hawaii. The Hawaii
10 association of conservation districts is composed of sixteen
11 districts representing every community on all major islands of
12 Hawaii. Each of the sixteen districts is governed by five
13 volunteer directors and is supported by staff. The department
14 of land and natural resources provides administration and
15 maintains oversight authority of the soil and water conservation
16 districts.



1 Soil and water conservation districts have worked to
2 improve Hawaii's environment and economy through major projects
3 over the past sixty years. Collaborative efforts with partners
4 and government agencies have brought millions of dollars to
5 Hawaii to improve farm practices, reduce erosion, improve ocean
6 and drinking water quality, fight invasive species, improve
7 public safety, protect property, conserve water, and strengthen
8 the economy. The soil and water conservation districts also
9 provide educational and community support for conservation
10 awareness. The districts participate in resource conservation
11 and development projects and statewide high school programs.
12 The districts also introduce conservation principles in
13 elementary schools.

14 Additionally, the soil and water conservation districts
15 assist with reviewing each county's grading permits and
16 conservation plans. County grading permit reviews and
17 conservation plans are critical to preserving the environment,
18 stimulating the economy, and maintaining individual livelihoods.
19 The demand and accompanying workload of the conservation
20 districts have increased dramatically with population growth and
21 land use changes. The districts receive hundreds of requests



1 for conservation plans and county grading permit reviews each
2 year. As a result, districts are currently struggling to keep
3 pace with the demand, and adequate funding for the work of the
4 Hawaii association of conservation districts is in serious
5 jeopardy at a time of critical demand for its services. Soil
6 and water conservation districts are authorized to accept
7 contributions in the form of money, services, materials, or
8 otherwise from any source, and use or expend these contributions
9 in carrying out their operations.

10 The legislature also finds that the lack of funding for the
11 Hawaii association of conservation districts results in many
12 negative impacts on agriculture, despite efforts to build the
13 agricultural industry in Hawaii. Due to funding shortages,
14 services provided by the Hawaii association of conservation
15 districts are limited to entities within priority watershed
16 areas that have approved watershed plans, although many of
17 Hawaii's farming areas are not within priority watersheds.
18 Additionally, many farmers in Maui county who require a grubbing
19 and grading permit and are referred by the county to a soil and
20 water conservation district will go unassisted due to funding
21 shortages. The service of farm plan preparation will no longer



1 be available to landowners who are requested by Maui county to
2 obtain a farm plan. Furthermore, new farmers, many of whom are
3 immigrants and thus often unfamiliar with the laws of the United
4 States, will not be educated by soil and water conservation
5 district staff on conservation measures or advised to pursue
6 environmental stewardship as a core value while seeking economic
7 viability.

8 The purpose of this Act is to make an appropriation for the
9 operational expenses and staffing costs of the Hawaii
10 association of conservation districts.

11 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
12 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
13 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2018-2019 for the
14 operational expenses and staffing costs of the Hawaii
15 association of conservation districts.

16 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
17 land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.

18 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
