
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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE AHA MOKU ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that over the past two 2 hundred years, Hawaii has experienced extensive changes, 3 including the deterioration of the Hawaiian culture, language, values, and land tenure system, which have, in part, resulted in 4 the over-development of the coastline, alteration of fresh water 5 streams, destruction of life-giving watersheds, decimation of 6 7 the coral reefs, and decline of endemic marine and terrestrial 8 species. As a result, in 2012, the legislature passed Act 288, 9 Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, which established the aha moku 10 advisory committee within the department of land and natural 11 resources for administrative purposes. Act 288 formally recognizes the aha moku system, a traditional system of best 12 13 practices of ahupua'a, regional site-specific geographic areas, 14 that acknowledges the natural contours of land, natural 15 resources located within those areas, and methodology necessary to sustain resources and the community. The role of the aha 16 moku advisory committee is to advise the chairperson of the 17



1 board of land and natural resources regarding the aha moku 2 system, on issues related to land and natural resources. 3 The legislature further finds that the aha moku advisory 4 committee has continued to fulfill its mission by working with 5 the eight main Hawaiian islands, which encompass forty-six 6 traditional moku, of which six hundred nine ahupua'a are listed. 7 Since 2012, the aha moku advisory committee has documented its 8 accomplishments in a report to the legislature and included 9 recommendations from all of the main Hawaiian islands. 10 Additionally, the reports list resource issues that came before 11 the department of land and natural resources divisions relating 12 to the aha moku system. Most of these issues were mitigated 13 within the department of land and natural resources at a 14 divisional level to the satisfaction of the inquiring 15 communities. 16 The success of the aha moku system also brings forth the

17 voices of the public trust, including native Hawaiians, to the 18 department of land and natural resources in regard to natural 19 and cultural resources, distinct environments, and specific 20 ecosystems independently of government influence. This autonomy 21 of being attached to, but not being under the jurisdiction of,

the department of land and natural resources ensures a
 collaborative rapport between the aha moku advisory committee
 and the department of land and natural resources, its divisions,
 and the board of land and natural resources.

5 The legislature further finds that although Act 288,
6 Session Laws of Hawaii 2012, included funding for the aha moku
7 advisory committee, the funds were never released. As a result,
8 it has been difficult for the aha moku advisory committee to
9 continue to fulfill its mission and duties.

10 The purpose of this Act is to:

11 (1) Require the department of land and natural resources 12 to include the expenses for conducting meetings and 13 other related functions of the state aha moku system 14 and aha moku advisory committee in the department's 15 budget and provide administrative support to the aha 16 moku advisory committee;

17 (2) Allow the special land and development fund to be used
18 for any expenses incurred by the aha moku advisory
19 committee; and

20 (3) Appropriate funds for expenses of the aha moku
21 advisory committee.

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1 SECTION 2. Section 171-4.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended to read as follows:

"[+]\$171-4.5[+] Aha moku advisory committee; established.
(a) There is established the aha moku advisory committee to be
placed within the department of land and natural resources for
administrative purposes. The committee may advise the
chairperson of the board of land and natural resources in
carrying out the purposes of this section.

The committee shall consist of eight members appointed 9 (b) 10 by the governor and confirmed by the senate from a list of 11 nominations submitted by the aha moku councils of each island. Oversight of the aha moku advisory committee shall be by the 12 13 chairperson of the board of land and natural resources. The 14 committee members shall select the committee chairperson from 15 among the members.

16 (c) The members shall not receive compensation for their
17 service, but shall be reimbursed for necessary expenses,
18 including travel expenses, incurred while participating in
19 meetings and events approved in advance by the chairperson of
20 the board of land and natural resources.

(7) Developing an administrative structure that oversees
 the aha moku system.

3 (e) The committee shall submit an annual report in English 4 and Hawaiian to the legislature and the chairperson of the board 5 of land and natural resources no later than twenty days prior to 6 the convening of each regular legislative session. The annual 7 report shall include a list of all recommendations made by the 8 committee and the resulting action taken by the department over 9 the course of the prior year.

10 The budgetary requirements for conducting meetings and (f) other related functions of the state aha moku system and aha 11 moku advisory committee, including the salaries of the executive 12 director and administrative assistant, shall be included in the 13 14 budget of the department of land and natural resources. The 15 department shall provide administrative support to the aha moku 16 advisory committee. If appropriate, federal moneys and other 17 moneys that become available to the department may be used to 18 offset administrative costs incurred by the department for the 19 purposes of this subsection." SECTION 3. Section 171-19, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 20

21 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:



1 "(a) There is created in the department a special fund to 2 be designated as the "special land and development fund". 3 Subject to the Hawaiian Homes Commission Act of 1920, as amended, and section 5(f) of the Admission Act of 1959, all 4 5 proceeds of sale of public lands, including interest on deferred 6 payments; all moneys collected under section 171-58 for mineral and water rights; all rents from leases, licenses, and permits 7 derived from public lands; all moneys collected from lessees of 8 9 public lands within industrial parks; all fees, fines, and other 10 administrative charges collected under this chapter and chapter 11 183C; a portion of the highway fuel tax collected under chapter 12 243; all moneys collected by the department for the commercial 13 use of public trails and trail accesses under the jurisdiction 14 of the department; transient accommodations tax revenues 15 collected pursuant to section 237D-6.5(b)(5); and private 16 contributions for the management, maintenance, and development 17 of trails and accesses shall be set apart in the fund and shall 18 be used only as authorized by the legislature for the following 19 purposes:

20 21 (1) To reimburse the general fund of the State for advances made that are required to be reimbursed from



1		the proceeds derived from sales, leases, licenses, or
2		permits of public lands;
3	(2)	For the planning, development, management, operations,
4		or maintenance of all lands and improvements under the
5		control and management of the board pursuant to title
6		12, including but not limited to permanent or
7		temporary staff positions who may be appointed without
8		regard to chapter 76; provided that transient
9		accommodations tax revenues allocated to the fund
10		shall be expended as provided in section
11		237D-6.5(b)(5);
12	(3)	To repurchase any land, including improvements, in the
13		exercise by the board of any right of repurchase
14		specifically reserved in any patent, deed, lease, or
15		other documents or as provided by law;
16	(4)	For the payment of all appraisal fees; provided that
17		all fees reimbursed to the board shall be deposited in
18		the fund;
19	(5)	For the payment of publication notices as required
20		under this chapter; provided that all or a portion of
21		the expenditures may be charged to the purchaser or

1		lessee of public lands or any interest therein under
2		rules adopted by the board;
3	(6)	For the management, maintenance, and development of
4		trails and trail accesses under the jurisdiction of
5		the department;
6	(7)	For the payment to private land developers who have
7		contracted with the board for development of public
8		lands under section 171-60;
9	(8)	For the payment of debt service on revenue bonds
10		issued by the department, and the establishment of
11		debt service and other reserves deemed necessary by
12		the board;
13	(9)	To reimburse the general fund for debt service on
14		general obligation bonds issued to finance
15		departmental projects, where the bonds are designated
16		to be reimbursed from the special land and development
17		fund;
18	(10)	For the protection, planning, management, and
19		regulation of water resources under chapter 174C;

1	(11) For any expenses incurred by the aha moku advisory
2	committee; and
3	$\left[\frac{(11)}{(12)}\right]$ For other purposes of this chapter."
4	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
5	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$350,000 or so much
6	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
7	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
8	2018-2019 for expenses of the aha moku advisory committee;
9	provided that \$100,000 of the funds appropriated shall be
10	divided proportionately as determined by the aha moku advisory
11	committee, among the eight areas represented by the aha moku
12	advisory committee members, and to fund the annual Puwalu event.
13	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
14	of land and natural resources for the purposes of this Act.
15	SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
16	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
17	SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
