A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LASER DEVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that a new law is needed
2	due to the recent incidents in which aircraft have become
3	targets of green laser lights while flying or landing at an
4	airport. Hawaii's existing penal code does not adequately
5	address situations in which an offender injures or causes delays
6	in flight schedules. Although pointing a laser at an aircraft
7	is not yet a pervasive problem in Hawaii, it is a problem across
8	the country and its frequency in the State is increasing.
9	Between 2006 and 2016, 21,500 incidents involving laser devices
10	and aircraft were reported by pilots to the Federal Aviation
11	Administration.
12	The purpose of this Act is to establish definitions for
13	"aircraft", "laser", and "laser scope", as well as to make it:
14	(1) A misdemeanor offense to intentionally or knowingly
15	project a beam of light from a laser or laser scope at
16	an occupied aircraft; and

1	(2) A class C felony offense if the foregoing act renders
2	the pilot unable to operate the aircraft safely or
3	causes injury to the pilot, crew, or passengers.
4	SECTION 2. Chapter 136, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
5	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
6	and to read as follows:
7	"§136- Directing lasers at aircraft; prohibitions;
8	penalties. (a) If a person intentionally or knowingly directs
9	a beam of light from a laser or laser scope, which produces over
10	five milliwatts of energy, at an occupied aircraft, that person
11	shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
12	(b) If the act in subsection (a) renders the pilot unable
13	to safely operate the aircraft or causes injury to the pilot,
14	crew, or passengers on board the aircraft, that person shall be
15	guilty of a class C felony.
16	(c) This section shall not apply to activities carried on
17	for the Department of Defense, the Department of Homeland
18	Security, or police officers acting in their official capacity
19	for research governed by standards of accepted development,
20	operations, testing, or training."

1 SECTION 3. Chapter 136, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by amending its title to read as follows: 3 "LASER [POINTING] DEVICES" SECTION 4. Section 136-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 5 amended by adding three new definitions to be appropriately 6 inserted and to read as follows: 7 ""Aircraft" means any vehicle that is designed for flight 8 in the air by buoyancy or by the dynamic action of air on the 9 vehicle's surfaces, including powered airplanes, gliders, and **10** helicopters. 11 "Laser" means any device that is designated or used to 12 amplify electromagnetic radiation by stimulated emission that 13 emits a beam designed to be used by the operator as a pointer or 14 highlighter to indicate, mark, or identify a specific position, **15** place, item, or object, or any device that emits light which 16 simulates the appearance of a laser. 17 "Laser scope" means a portable battery-powered device 18 capable of being attached to a firearm and capable of projecting 19 a laser light on objects at a distance."

- 1 SECTION 5. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
- 2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
- 3 begun before its effective date.
- 4 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 5 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 6 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
