A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CRIME REDUCTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that weed and seed is a 2 strategy sponsored by the United States Department of Justice 3 and is administered locally by the United States Attorney's 4 Office for the District of Hawaii. Initiated in 1992, weed and 5 seed was developed to demonstrate an innovative and comprehensive approach to law enforcement and community 6 7 revitalization. 8 The weed and seed strategy is a collaborative effort among 9 law enforcement agencies at the federal, state, and county levels, social service agencies, private businesses, nonprofit
- 10 organizations, and residents to reclaim, restore, and rebuild 11 12 communities.
- 13 The four key elements of the weed and seed strategy are:
- 14 (1) Law enforcement:
- 15 (2) Community policing;
- 16 (3) Prevention, intervention, and treatment programs; and
- 17 (4)Neighborhood restoration.

- 1 The legislature finds that the weed and seed strategy is
- 2 currently being implemented in over one hundred fifty
- 3 communities across the country. The State has benefited greatly
- 4 from weed and seed programs at sites on Oahu that encompass Ala
- 5 Moana, Chinatown, downtown Honolulu, Kalihi, Waipahu, and Ewa
- 6 Beach. Since the implementation of the strategy, crime in those
- 7 areas has been reduced significantly. The legislature further
- 8 finds that the strategy's success warrants maintaining the
- 9 operations of the weed and seed program in these communities,
- 10 and expanding it to other communities in the future.
- 11 The purpose of this Act is to establish a permanent weed
- 12 and seed strategy within the department of labor and industrial
- 13 relations, and make an appropriation for the weed and seed
- 14 strategy.
- 15 SECTION 2. Chapter 371K, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 16 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 17 and to read as follows:
- 18 "§371K- Weed and seed strategy. (a) There is
- 19 established within the department of labor and industrial
- 20 relations the weed and seed strategy to reduce crime and improve
- 21 the quality of life for residents and neighborhoods in the

13	(b)	The office of community services shall:	
14	(1)	Administer appropriations and other funding for the	
15		weed and seed strategy; and	
16	(2)	Identify or assist in identifying those areas to	
17	•	implement for the weed and seed strategy.	
18	(c)	The weed and seed strategy shall be guided by an	
19	advisory	committee, exempt from section 26-34, composed of	
20	representatives selected by the executive director of the offic		

1	of community services from various public and private sectors,		
2	including:		
3	(1)	Federal agencies, including the United States	
4		Attorney's Office, the United States Drug Enforcement	
5		Administration, and the United States Department of	
6		Housing and Urban Development;	
7	(2)	State agencies, including the department of education	
8		department of health, department of human services,	
9		department of labor and industrial relations,	
10		department of public safety, Hawaii public housing	
11		authority, the office of the governor, and the office	
12		of the lieutenant governor;	
13	(3)	County agencies, including the mayor, the prosecuting	
14		attorney, the chief of police, and other appropriate	
15		departments and agencies; and	
16	(4)	Community organizations engaged in providing health	
17		and human services.	
18	(d)	The weed and seed advisory committee shall, no later	
19	than twen	ty days prior to the convening of each regular session	
20	of the legislature, submit a report to the legislature and the		
21	governor on its activities, including projects completed or		

1 ongoing, funds expended, and other relevant data or information 2 on the weed and seed strategy." 3 SECTION 3. Section 371K-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 5 There is established within the department of labor 6 and industrial relations, for administrative purposes only, an office of community services. The following shall be among the 7 programs to be under the auspices of and coordinated through the 8 9 office: 10 (1) Progressive neighborhoods program; 11 (2) Hawaii office of economic opportunity; 12 (3) Refugee resettlement program; [and] 13 (4)State immigrant services center [-]; and (5) 14 Weed and seed strategy." 15 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 16 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 17 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 18 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year

2018-2019 to maintain the weed and seed strategy in areas

the weed and seed strategy into other areas of the State;

currently designated for weed and seed strategy and to expand

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- 1 provided that any appropriation shall be conditioned on
- 2 obtaining federal funding for the weed and seed strategy in a
- 3 designated area.

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- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 7 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 8 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

Weed and Seed Strategy; Appropriation

Description:

Creates a permanent weed and seed strategy within the department of labor and industrial relations, office of community service. Appropriates funds subject to federal funding.

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
