### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EARLY LEARNING.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. The purpose of this Act is to:
2	(1)	Broaden the scope of the early learning program to
3		include early childhood development;
4	(2)	Expand the function of the early learning advisory
5		board beyond an advisory capacity and amend the
6		composition and powers of some board members; and
7	(3)	Allow the board to appoint and evaluate the director
8		of the executive office on early learning.
9	SECT	ION 2. Section 302L-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10	amended a	s follows:
11	1.	By adding two new definitions to be appropriately
12	inserted	and to read:
13	" <u>"</u> Ea	rly learning" means developmentally appropriate early
14	childhood	development and education for children from prenatal
15	care unti	.l the time they enter kindergarten.

1	"Early learning system" means a developmentally appropriate
2	early childhood development and education system for children
3	from prenatal care until the time they enter kindergarten."
4	2. By amending the definition of "advisory board" to read:
5	"[ <del>"Advisory board"</del> ] <u>"Board"</u> means the early learning
6	[advisory] board established pursuant to this chapter."
7	3. By amending the definition of "at-risk children" to
8	read:
9	""At-risk children" means children who, because of their
10	home and community environment, are subject to language,
11	cultural, economic, and other disadvantages that cause them to
12	be at risk for school failure, including children:
13	(1) Who are eligible for special education services;
14	(2) Who are English as a second language learners;
15	(3) Who reside within a public school district,
16	established under chapter 302A, that is in need of
17	improvement based on the criteria of the federal No
18	Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107-110), as
19	amended; or

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- (4) Whose family income is no more than [two] three
   hundred [fifty] per cent of the federal poverty
- 3 level."
- 4. By amending the definition of "center-based" to read:
- 5 ""Center-based" describes programs in which early
- 6 [childhood education and care] learning services are provided in
- 7 a facility, including private preschools, child care centers,
- 8 and head start programs, licensed, or excluded or exempt from
- 9 licensing, by the department of human services."
- 10 5. By amending the definition of "underserved children" to
- 11 read:
- 12 ""Underserved children" means children who have no access
- 13 to, or are not qualified to attend, other early [childhood
- 14 education] learning programs and whose family income is no more
- 15 than [two] three hundred [fifty] per cent of the federal poverty
- 16 level."
- 17 6. By repealing the definition of "early childhood
- 18 education".
- 19 [""Early childhood education" means a developmentally
- 20 appropriate early childhood development and education program

1 for children from birth until the time they enter 2 kindergarten."] SECTION 3. Section 302L-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 3 4 amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows: 5 "(b) The head of the executive office on early learning shall be known as the director of the executive office on early 6 7 learning, hereinafter referred to as director. The director 8 shall: 9 Be appointed by the [governor;] early learning board (1) 10 and evaluated annually by the board; 11 (2) Have professional training in the field of social 12 work, education, or other related fields[+], to 13 include major coursework in early childhood education 14 and child development, and preferably hold an academic 15 degree in the field of early childhood education and 16 child development; 17 Have direct experience in programs or services related (3) 18 to early [childhood education;] learning; 19 (4) Have recent experience in a supervisory, consultative, 20 or administrative position;

1	(5)	Be paid a salary set by the [governor] board that
2		shall not exceed ninety per cent of the salary of the
3		director of human resources development; and
4	(6)	Be included in any benefit program generally
5		applicable to the officers and employees of the State.
6	(c)	The director shall be responsible for:
7	(1)	Serving as the principal officer in state government
8		responsible for the performance, development, and
9		control of programs, policies, and activities [related
10		to a public-private comprehensive early childhood
11		system for children, under the jurisdiction of the
12		executive office on early learning from prenatal care
13		to entrance into kindergarten;
14	(2)	Overseeing, supervising, and directing the performance
15		of the director's subordinates in various activities,
16		including planning, evaluation, and coordination of
17		early learning programs;
18	(3)	Administering funds allocated for the office and
19		applying for, receiving, and disbursing grants and
20		donations from all sources for early learning programs

and services;

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1	(4)	Assessing the policies and practices of other agencies
2		impacting early learning and conducting advocacy
3		efforts for early learning;
4	(5)	Advising agencies on new legislation, programs, and
5		policy initiatives relating to early learning;
6	(6)	Employing and retaining staff as may be necessary for
7		the purposes of this section; and
8	(7)	Contracting for services that may be necessary for the
9		purposes of this section, including through master
10		contracts, memoranda of understanding, and memoranda
11		of agreement with other state agencies receiving
12		federal and state funds for programs and services for
13		early learning, and purchase of service agreements
14		with appropriate agencies."
15	SECT	ION 4. Section 302L-1.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
16	amended t	o read as follows:
17	" [+]	§302L-1.6[] Early learning [advisory] board. (a)
18	There is	established an early learning [advisory] board, whose
19	members s	hall be appointed by the governor pursuant to section
20	26-34. T	he board shall have power, in accordance with law, to

1	formulate	statewide policy relating to early learning. The
2	[ <del>advisory</del> ]	board shall be responsible for:
3	(1)	[Advising] Directing the office on how best to meet
4		the <u>developmental and</u> educational needs of children,
5		from prenatal care to entry into kindergarten;
6	(2)	Providing recommendations to the office on improving
7		the quality, availability, and coordination of early
8		[childhood care and education] learning programs;
9	(3)	Promoting collaboration across agencies and
10		stakeholders serving young children; and
11	[ <del>(4)</del>	Being an independent voice for children's health,
12		safety, development, and learning.]
13	(4)	Appointing the director of the office and evaluating
14		the director on an annual basis.
15	(b)	The [advisory] board shall consist of the following
16	voting mer	mbers:
17	(1)	A representative of center-based program providers or
18		the representative's designee;
19	(2)	A representative of family child care program
20		providers;

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1	(3)	A representative of family-child interaction learning
2		program providers;
3	(4)	A representative of philanthropic organizations that
4		support early learning or the representative's
5		designee;
6	(5)	A representative from a head start provider agency;
7	(6)	A representative from the Hawaii Early Intervention
8		Coordinating Council;
9	(7)	A parent representative;
10	(8)	A representative from the Hawaii chapter of the
11		American Academy of Pediatrics;
12	(9)	A representative of home-visiting program providers;
13	(10)	A representative of Hawaiian medium early learning
14		providers; and
15	(11)	[Two representatives] A representative of the Hawaii
16		Council of Mayors, or [each] the representative's
17		[ <del>respective</del> ] designee.
18	The	superintendent of education, director of human
19	services,	director of health, and president of the University of
20	Hawaii sh	all serve as ex officio, [voting] non-voting members of
21	the [ <del>advi</del>	sory] board.

1	The	[advisory] board shall invite [the director of the
2	Hawaii he	ad start state collaboration office, ] the chief
3	executive	officer of Kamehameha Schools $[\tau]$ and the executive
4	director	of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools, or
5	their des	ignees, to serve as voting members of the [advisory]
6	board.	
7	(c)	Except for the superintendent of education, directors
8	of state	departments, president of the University of Hawaii,
9	[ <del>director</del>	of the Hawaii head start state collaboration office,
10	chief exe	cutive officer of Kamehameha Schools, and the executive
11	director	of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools, or
12	their des	ignees, the members of the [advisory] board shall serve
13	staggered	terms as follows:
14	(1)	The representative of center-based program providers
15		shall serve a two-year term;
16	(2)	The representative of family child care program
17		providers shall serve a three-year term;
18	(3)	The representative of family-child interaction
19		learning program providers shall serve a three-year
20		term;

1	(4)	The representative of philanthropic organizations that
2		support early learning shall serve a two-year term;
3	(5)	The representative from a head start provider agency
4		shall serve a three-year term;
5	(6)	The representative from the Hawaii Early Intervention
6		Coordinating Council shall serve a three-year term;
7	(7)	The parent representative shall serve a two-year term;
8	(8)	The representative from the Hawaii chapter of the
9		American Academy of Pediatrics shall serve a two-year
10		term;
11	(9)	The representative of home-visiting program providers
12		shall serve a three-year term;
13	(10)	The representative of Hawaiian medium early learning
14		providers shall serve a two-year term; and
15	(11)	[Of the two representatives] The representative of the
16		Hawaii Council of Mayors[ <del>, one shall serve a two year</del>
17		term, and the other] shall serve a three-year term [as
18		determined by the Hawaii Council of Mayors].
19	(d)	The [advisory] board shall select a chairperson by a
20	majority	vote of its voting members[; provided that the
21	ahairnara	on shall be a representative from the private sector

- 2 shall constitute a quorum to conduct business. The concurrence
- 3 of the majority of the voting members serving on the [advisory]

- 6 (e) The [advisory] board may form workgroups and
- 7 subcommittees, including with individuals who are not [advisory]
- 8 board members, to:
- 9 (1) Obtain resource information from early learning
- 10 professionals and other individuals as deemed
- 11 necessary by the [advisory] board;
- 12 (2) Make recommendations to the [advisory] board; and
- 13 (3) Perform other functions as deemed necessary by the
- 14 [advisory] board to fulfill its duties and
- responsibilities.
- 16 Two or more [advisory] board members, but less than a
- 17 quorum, may discuss matters relating to official [advisory]
- 18 board business in the course of their participation in a
- 19 workgroup or subcommittee, and such discussion shall be a
- 20 permitted interaction as provided for in section 92-2.5.

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- 1 (f) The [advisory] board may testify before the
- 2 legislature on any matter related to its duties and
- 3 responsibilities.
- 4 (g) Members of the [advisory] board shall serve without
- 5 compensation but shall be reimbursed for expenses, including
- 6 travel expenses, necessary for the performance of their duties."
- 7 SECTION 5. Section 302L-1.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended by amending its title to read as follows:
- 9 "[+] §302L-1.7[+] Early [childhood education] learning
- 10 facilities; pre-plus."
- 11 SECTION 6. Section 302L-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 12 amended to read as follows:
- "§302L-2 Early learning system[+ keiki first steps].
- 14 There is established an early learning system [, to be known as
- 15 keiki first steps, that shall ensure a spectrum of high-quality
- 16 early learning opportunities for children throughout the State,
- 17 from [birth] prenatal care until the time they enter
- 18 kindergarten, with priority given to underserved or at-risk
- 19 children. The early learning system shall be developed and
- 20 administered by the executive office on early learning to the
- 21 extent permissible by law. The early learning system shall:

	( 1 )	be widery accessible and voluntary for both those
2		served and program and service providers;
3	(2)	Be a cohesive, comprehensive, and sustainable system
4		in which:
5		(A) All existing early learning programs and
6		services, whether publicly- or privately-run,
7		which consist of a variety of early learning
8		approaches, service deliveries, and settings,
9		including center-based programs, family child
10		care programs, family-child interaction learning
11		programs, and home-based instruction programs
12		designed to promote early learning, are
13		coordinated, improved, and expanded;
14		(B) Public and private resources are maximized; and
15		(C) The use of public facilities for either publicly-
16		or privately-run early learning programs is
17		maximized;
18	(3)	Provide high-quality early learning experiences with:
19		(A) Standards-based content and curriculum, and
20		accountability; and

1	(B) Sufficient numbers of well-qualified educators
2	and administrators who are fairly compensated and
3	have access to continuing professional
4	development;
5	(4) Offer opportunities for family and community
6	engagement and parent education and support; and
7	(5) Be sensitive to family choice and cultural diversity."
8	SECTION 7. Section 302L-3.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9	amended by amending its title and subsections (a) through (e) to
10	read as follows:
11	"§302L-3.5 [Advisory board] Board meetings by
12	teleconference. (a) Notwithstanding any law to contrary, the
13	[advisory] board may meet by teleconference.
14	(b) Each member of the [advisory] board participating in a
15	meeting by teleconference shall be considered present at the
16	meeting for purposes of determining quorum and participating in
17	all proceedings.
18	(c) A meeting by teleconference:
19	(1) Need not have a quorum present at any one location;
20	and

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- (2) Is subject to the notice requirements applicable to
   other [advisory] board meetings.
- 3 (d) The notice of each teleconference meeting shall
- 4 specify all physical locations from which members of the
- 5 [advisory] board will participate. The notice shall also
- 6 specify the physical location from which the presiding officer
- 7 of the [advisory] board will preside. All physical
- 8 teleconference locations shall be open to the public during the
- 9 open portion of the meeting.
- 10 (e) [Advisory board] Board materials that are to be
- 11 considered at the meeting shall be made available at all
- 12 physical teleconference locations."
- 13 SECTION 8. Section 302L-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended to read as follows:
- 15 "§302L-4 [Keiki first steps grant] Grant program;
- 16 establishment. (a) There is established, as part of the early
- 17 learning system, [the keiki first steps] a grant program, to be
- 18 developed by the office [and administered by the department of
- 19 human services]. The program shall increase early learning
- 20 opportunities that meet high standards of quality through the
- 21 awarding of grants to publicly- or privately-run:

3	(2)	Family child care programs, family-child interaction
4		learning programs, and other early learning programs
5		and services regardless of the age of children served
6	(b)	Eligibility criteria for grants. The [department of
7	human ser	vices] office may award grants [for the keiki first
8	<del>steps gra</del>	nt program] based on criteria that shall be developed
9	by the of	fice. The criteria shall include the requirement that
10	early lea	rning programs and services meet certain standards of
11	quality,	including:
12	(1)	The implementation of evidence-based and culturally
13		responsive models of service delivery;
14	(2)	The use of evidence-based curricula and methods;
15	(3)	Minimum scheduling requirements, as follows:
16		(A) For center-based programs: providing services
17		for a full school day and full school year;
18		(B) For family child care programs: providing
19		services for three hours daily for a full school
20		year;

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1		(C) For family-child interaction learning programs
2		operating in classroom-like settings: providing
3		early learning activities at least twice a week
4		for a full school year, and for a minimum of
5		three hours each day; and
6		(D) For home-based instruction programs: providing
7		early learning activities for no fewer than
8		thirty weeks within a school year;
9	(4)	Staff-to-child ratios and group size that meet or
10		exceed nationally recommended standards;
11	(5)	The employment of teachers and administrators who meet
12		the qualifications required by the office;
13	(6)	The incorporation of preschool content standards or
14		other early learning guidelines;
15	(7)	The implementation of health and developmental
16		screenings for children;
17	(8)	Opportunities for parent or family engagement and
18		parent education and support; and
19	(9)	Activities for monitoring and data collection to
20		evaluate early learning programs and services and
21		inform best practices.

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- 1 (c) Training; technical assistance; monitoring. The
- 2 [department of human services] office may offer technical
- 3 support to, and shall be responsible for monitoring to ensure
- 4 the accountability of programs and services within the [keiki
- 5 first steps] grant program, according to the standards developed
- 6 by the office."
- 7 SECTION 9. Section 302L-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 8 amended to read as follows:
- 9 "[+] §302L-6[+] Federal funds. The office may use and
- 10 expend federal funds for the purpose of early [childhood
- 11 education.] learning."
- 12 SECTION 10. Section 302L-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 13 amended to read as follows:
- "[+] §302L-7[+] Executive office on early learning public
- 15 prekindergarten program; public preschools. (a) There is
- 16 established within the early learning system an early childhood
- 17 education program to be known as the executive office on early
- 18 learning public prekindergarten program and to be administered
- 19 by the office pursuant to rules adopted by the office. The
- 20 program shall:

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L	(1)	Be provided through the executive office on early
2		learning, which may partner with the department of
3		education;

- (2) Prepare children for school and active participation in society through the use of either of the State's two official languages; and
- 7 (3) Provide access to high-quality early childhood
  8 education that addresses children's physical,
  9 cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional
  10 development.
- The program shall serve children in the year prior to 11 (b) the year of kindergarten eligibility, with priority extended to 12 underserved or at-risk children, as defined in section 302L-1. 13 [The department of education may grant geographic exceptions for 14 children to attend prekindergarten outside their assigned 15 service area, as the department of education deems appropriate; 16 provided that the department of education shall grant a request **17** for geographic exception to attend a prekindergarten in another 18 service area if the request is based on the employment location 19 of the parent or guardian of the student. Enrollment priority 20 shall be given but is not limited to children who attend. 21

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- 1 prekindergarten at schools to which the children will be
- 2 assigned upon entering kindergarten under section 302A-1143;
- 3 provided that priority shall be given to children whose family
- 4 income is at or below two hundred fifty per cent of the federal
- 5 poverty level.
- 6 (c) Enrollment in the program shall be voluntary. A child
- 7 who is enrolled in, or is eligible to attend, a public
- 8 elementary school, or who is required to attend school pursuant
- 9 to section 302A-1132, shall not be eligible for enrollment in
- 10 the program.
- (d) The program shall incorporate high-quality standards
- 12 pursuant to rules adopted by the office. High-quality standards
- 13 shall be research-based, developmentally-appropriate practices
- 14 associated with better educational outcomes for children, such
- 15 as:
- 16 (1) Positive teacher-child interactions;
- 17 (2) Use of individual child assessments that are used for
- ongoing instructional planning, based upon all areas
- of childhood development and learning, including
- 20 cognitive, linguistic, social, and emotional

1		approaches to learning and health and physical	
2		development;	
3	(3)	Family engagement; and	
4	(4)	Alignment with the Hawaii early learning and	
5		development standards, which align with department of	
6		education standards, state content and performance	
7		standards, and general learner outcomes for grades	
8		kindergarten to twelve, to facilitate a seamless and	
9		high-quality educational experience for children.	
10	The office shall monitor implementation of the high-quality		
11	education	al experience for children.	
12	<u>(e)</u>	Prior to opening a public prekindergarten class in a	
13	school, t	he principal, and other school personnel as required by	
14	the execu	tive office on early learning, shall participate in an	
15	early learning induction program.		
16	[ <del>(e)</del>	The office shall provide support to incorporate	
17	these hig	h-quality standards, including support related to	
18	teacher-c	hild interactions, individual child assessments, and	
19	family engagement.		

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- 1 [(f)] (q) The office shall coordinate with other agencies
- 2 and programs to facilitate comprehensive services for early
- 3 childhood education.
- 4 [<del>(g)</del>] (h) The office shall collect data to:
- 5 (1) Evaluate the services provided;
- 6 (2) Inform policy; and
- 7 (3) Make any improvements to the program.
- **8** [\(\frac{(h)}{l}\)] (i) The department of education and any public
- 9 charter school existing pursuant to chapter 302D, may use
- 10 available classrooms for public preschool programs statewide.
- 11 The office shall give priority to public charter schools that
- 12 serve high populations of underserved or at-risk children.
- 13 Preschool classrooms established pursuant to this section shall
- 14 be in addition to any classrooms used for the pre-plus program
- 15 established pursuant to section 302L-1.7.
- 16  $[\frac{(i)}{(j)}]$  (j) The office shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter
- 17 91 necessary to carry out the purposes of this section,
- 18 including compliance with all applicable state and federal
- 19 laws."

- 1 SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 2 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 3 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2051.
