A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO VACATION RENTALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the increase in
- 2 popularity of online vacation rental platforms means that some
- 3 visitors to Hawaii are turning to alternative lodging options,
- 4 such as short-term vacation rentals, as part of their
- 5 accommodations to the State. As a result, online vacation
- 6 rental platforms are disrupting the State's tourism industry and
- 7 economy, as the owners and operators of some of these short-term
- 8 vacation rentals are not paying transient accommodations taxes
- 9 or general excise taxes, resulting in a loss of state revenue.
- 10 Counties are also losing revenue when an owner of a vacation
- 11 rental receives "home owners" discounts on property taxes paid
- 12 for a residential home that is used for commercial purposes
- 13 without a commercial property rate. Furthermore, some
- 14 properties that are being leased out as vacation rentals are
- 15 properties that could have been added to the stock of affordable
- 16 housing available for lease or sale to Hawaii's residents,
- 17 thereby ameliorating the State's affordable housing crisis.

- 1 vacation rentals may not be getting what is advertised, as some
- 2 vacation rentals are falsely advertised and even unsafe for
- 3 group occupancy. Unsafe stays and unfavorable reviews or
- 4 references of such stays can be detrimental to Hawaii's
- 5 reputation as an elite tourist destination.
- 6 The legislature further finds that the regulation of short-
- 7 term vacation rentals has been contentious not only in Hawaii,
- 8 but other places as well. For example, the city of San
- 9 Francisco recently passed legislation that subjects hosting
- 10 platforms, including online vacation rental platforms, to
- 11 criminal penalties and fines if they provide a booking service
- 12 for residential units to be used for tourist or transient use
- 13 without registering with the appropriate government entity. As
- 14 a result, there is currently pending litigation between online
- 15 vacation rental platforms and the city of San Francisco in
- 16 federal court.
- 17 Because online vacation rental platforms affect state and
- 18 county interests in many ways, it is critical that data
- 19 collection on this industry be accurate, timely, and
- 20 informative. The collection of the transient accommodations tax
- 21 and general excise tax is the responsibility of the State, but

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- 1 the counties receive a large portion of the transient
- 2 accommodations tax and the city and county of Honolulu
- 3 additionally receives most of the surcharge on the general
- 4 excise tax for a rail transit system. The State has a vested
- 5 interest in effectively and independently monitoring whether
- 6 persons engaging in online short-term vacation rentals are
- 7 paying taxes owed. Additionally, the State and counties share
- 8 an interest in identifying and tracking the number of housing
- 9 units that are dedicated to short-term vacation rentals and
- 10 calculating the projected short- and long-term impacts that
- 11 these rentals have on existing housing for Hawaii residents.
- 12 Lastly, better data collection on online short-term vacation
- 13 rentals will better ensure adherence to laws and codes that
- 14 protect the safety of occupants and help perpetuate Hawaii's
- 15 brand as a high-quality and safe vacation destination.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to establish an online vacation
- 17 rental working group to develop effective data collection
- 18 methods that can assist state and county governments in
- 19 monitoring the impact that short-term vacation rentals have on
- 20 tax collections, housing stock, and the State's brand as a
- 21 vacation destination.

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1	SECTION 2. (a) There is established an online vacation						
2	rental working group that shall be administratively attached to						
3	the department of business, economic development, and tourism.						
4	(b)	The online vacation rental working group shall consist					
5	of the fo	of the following members:					
6	(1)	The director of taxation, or the director's designee;					
7	(2)	The director of commerce and consumer affairs, or the					
8		director's designee;					
9	(3)	The attorney general, or the attorney general's					
10		designee;					
11	(4)	The president and chief executive officer of the					
12		Hawaii tourism authority, or the president and chief					
13		executive officer's designee;					
14	(5)	A representative of the Hawaii hotel and lodging					
15		industry to be selected by the Hawaii Lodging and					
16		Tourism Association;					
17	(6)	A representative of the Hawaii Association of					
18		REALTORS;					
19	(7)	A representative of Unite Here, Local 5;					

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1	(8)	Two representatives from businesses that operate	
2		short-term rental internet platforms, to be selected	
3		by the governor;	
4	(9)	Two individuals who operate currently licensed short-	
5		term vacation rentals in good standing in residential	
6		communities in the State, to be selected by the	
7		governor;	
8	(10)	Two members of publicly elected community	
9		organizations, such as neighborhood boards, who are	
10		from communities with a higher-than-average number of	
11		vacation rentals listed online, to be selected by the	
12		governor;	
13	(11)	One representative from each respective county, to be	
14		appointed by its respective county mayor;	
15	(12)	One individual to be appointed by the senate	
16		president; and	
17	(13)	One individual to be appointed by the speaker of the	
18		house of representatives.	
19	(c)	The members of the online vacation rental working	
20	group sha	ll select the chairperson of the working group from	
21	among themselves. Members of the online vacation rental worki		

1	group shall serve without compensation for their service on the					
2	working g	roup	but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses,			
3	including	trav	rel expenses, incurred for serving on the working			
4	group.					
5	(d)	The	online vacation rental working group shall:			
6	(1)	Deve	elop effective data collection, including:			
7		(A)	Establishing a means by which counties and state			
8			government can monitor the number of units being			
9			offered as part-time and full-time vacation			
10			rentals and the number of multi-unit operators			
11			versus in-home operators;			
12		(B)	Projecting growth and locations of vacation			
13			rental markets by region; and			
14		(C)	Identifying impacts, if any, on local and			
15			regional real estate markets, long-term rental			
16			housing availability and rate of rents, and			
17			property tax rates; and			
18	(2)	Crea	ate effective proposals in which government-			
19		subs	sidized rental housing and long-term leasehold			
20		hous	sing can be assured to remain in long-term rental			
21		or e	eligible rental use for a mandatory time period.			

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- 1 (e) The online vacation rental working group shall submit
- 2 a report of its findings, recommendations, and proposed
- 3 legislation to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 4 to the convening of the regular session of 2018, and shall be
- 5 dissolved on June 30, 2018.
- 6 (f) The online vacation rental working group may call upon
- 7 various state and county government entities to assist with
- 8 gathering information and drafting of its report, including the
- 9 department of business, economic development, and tourism's
- 10 research and economic analysis division; housing officers at
- 11 state and county levels; and planning officials at state and
- 12 county levels.
- 13 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 15 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 for
- 16 the online vacation rental working group to perform its duties
- 17 pursuant to this Act.
- 18 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 19 business, economic development, and tourism for the purposes of
- 20 this Act.
- 21 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

Report Title:

Online Vacation Rental Working Group; Establish; Data Collection; Appropriation

Description:

Establishes an online vacation rental working group to develop effective data collection methods that can assist state and county governments in monitoring the impact that short-term vacation rentals have on tax collections, housing stock, and the State's brand as a vacation destination. Appropriates funds for the working group to perform its duties. (SD1)

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
